NEW Local Information, Action, & Recommendations

 Mono County Presumptive Positive COVID-19 Case: March 21, 2020 – 8:00am: Mammoth Hospital has identified a patient who is presumptively positive for COVID-19. The patient is a male who was hospitalized March 15, 2020, and has been maintained in isolation while receiving treatment. The patient is in good condition.

Mono County Public Health Department has been actively identifying contact history for the patient. Individuals who have had contact are self-isolating at home with Health Department supervision. The investigation and monitoring is ongoing. To read the complete press release visit:

• Inyo County Public Health Order: Inyo County Public Health Officer issued a Public Health Order reinforcing Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-33-20 by explicitly prohibiting any non-essential professional, social, or community gathering, and specifically ordering the temporary closure of non-essential businesses. This Order applies within the County of Inyo, beginning March 20, 2020 at 5:00 p.m. and continues until rescinded by the Health Officer. To read the complete Order please visit:

Inyo County SAR – Do Not Take Part in High-risk Outdoor Activity: The Inyo County Sheriff's Office, on behalf of Inyo County Search and Rescue (SAR), requests that people do not take part in high risk outdoor activities at this time. Activities include backpacking, climbing, peak bagging, backcountry skiing, or anything that puts you at risk for potential rescue. If you get sick, lost or injured and require SAR assistance, the responding team of volunteers will have to break social distancing and State mandated isolation by sharing rescue equipment, radios, and vehicles. You will be potentially taking those rescuers out of service for weeks due to post-mission quarantine protocols. In addition, many SAR teams, including ours, are operating at a diminished capacity due to many members practicing social distancing and not responding to operations due to age or other risk factors. Your preventable backcountry injury will also stress ambulance and emergency room services. It is highly unlikely helicopters are available to assist in your rescue. Inyo County Sheriff's Office DOES NOT own or operate any air assets, and our allied agency helicopters are currently operating at a very limited capacity.

NEW Statewide/ Federal Information, Action, & Recommendations

• **Shelter in Place Order:** Effective March 19th, Governor Gavin Newsom issued an order to all individuals living in the State of California to stay home except as needed to maintain

continuity of operations of critical infrastructure sectors, and to conduct essential activities like shopping for food or seeking medical care. When people need to leave their homes or places of residence to facilitate authorized necessary activities, they should at all times practice social distancing.

Essential services will remain open, such as:

- Gas stations
- Pharmacies
- Food: Grocery stores, farmers markets, food banks, convenience stores, take-out and delivery restaurants
- o Banks
- Laundromats/laundry services
- Essential state and local government functions will also remain open, including law enforcement and offices that provide government programs and services. In order to practice social distancing, many government offices will be closed to walk-in traffic, but will provide service by phone or other means.

What's closed?

- Dine-in restaurants
- Bars and nightclubs
- Entertainment venues
- Gyms and fitness studios
- Public events and gatherings
- o Convention Centers
- Hair and nail salons
