Local Information, Action, & Recommendations

- Inyo County Modified Re-Opening: As of Monday, August 31st, hair salons and barber shops can
 resume indoor operations. This does not apply to nail salons and other personal care services which
 must continue to operate outdoors. To view and track Inyo Count's current status within the new 4tiered process for loosening and tightening restrictions based primarily on case rates and test
 positivity rates, please visit: https://covid19.ca.gov/safer-economy/
- Verily Bishop Site: Community-based COVID-19 testing at the Verily site in Bishop will not be available Monday, September 9th to Thursday September 10th. Testing will resume on September 14th. Lone Pine testing is not affected.

- Blueprint for a Safer Economy: On August 28th Governor Gavin Newsom today unveiled the Blueprint for a Safer Economy, a statewide, stringent and slow plan for living with COVID-19 for the long haul. The plan imposes risk-based criteria on tightening and loosening COVID-19 allowable activities and expands the length of time between changes to assess how any movement affects the trajectory of the disease. Based on recent data, each county will fall into one of four colored tiers Purple (Widespread), Red (Substantial), Orange (Moderate) and Yellow (Minimal) based on how prevalent COVID-19 is in each county and the extent of community spread. That color will indicate how sectors can operate; Inyo County is currently in the "purple" category. - Guidance for In-Person Supervision of Groups of Children: On August 25th the California Department
 of Public Health today released guidance regarding the in-person supervision of cohorts of children or
 youth in educational and childcare settings. A cohort is a stable group of no more than 14 children or
 youth and no more than two supervising adults in a supervised environment in which the adults and
 children stay together for all activities and avoids contact with people outside of their group in the

- COVID-19 Testing Expansion: On August 26th Governor Gavin Newsom announced that California has signed a groundbreaking contract with a major diagnostics company, which will allow California to process up to an additional 150,000 COVID-19 diagnostic tests a day, with a contractual turnaround time of 24-48 hours. The goal is to stand up a laboratory facility and begin processing tens of thousands of additional tests by November 1 and run at full capacity by -no later than March 1, 2021.
