SUMMARY/JUSTIFICATION:

In 2019, Info-Tech Research Group conducted a CIO Diagnostic evaluation to evaluate the level of services provided by Information Services to the other County Departments. Part of that diagnostic evaluation identified that the ratio of the number of employees in our department to the number of employees in the County government was about 2-3 FTE lower than other organizations of similar size and type. Additionally, with the increased reliance on enterprise-class systems at the county and the ever-increasing demands for network and system security, the depth of knowledge required to support the County systems continues to increase.

As a result the findings in the report and subsequent discussions, the Information Services Department requested an additional position that was approved in the FY2020-2021 budget. This position is intended to afford the department a more targeted approach to providing support for enterprise and security systems.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY OF BOARD ACTIONS:

ALTERNATIVES AND CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Your Board could choose to not approve this request. This alternative is not recommended, as not filling this position will require that we continue to distribute support tasks to several members of the department, resulting in less-than-desirable, non-targeted support for users of the County's enterprise systems.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Request Board approve a request a change in ownership for commercial cannabis business license number 000136, Inyo Cannabis Village, LLC, contingent on submission and approval of appropriate background checks.

SUMMARY/JUSTIFICATION:

Inyo County code section 5.40.130 allows a change in ownership with the approval of your board. The Agricultural Commissioner's Office received a commercial cannabis business permit change request asking to change ownership information for license 000136. The request (attachment A) includes a reorganization in ownership percentages within the LLC that owns the business, Inyo Cannabis Village, LLC. The request reassigns ownership from 65% Steven McNeal and 35% Ken Sobel to 65% Ken Sobel, 25% CannaVia Holdings, LLC, and 10% Steve McNeal.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY OF BOARD ACTIONS:

Your board approved this license, located in zone 5G for the cultivation activity type, on January 8, 2019. Since that time, the licensee has submitted a request to change ownership which must be approved or denied by your board pursuant to Inyo County code section 5.40.130. This entity has applied for a conditional use permit with Inyo County Planning.

ALTERNATIVES AND CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Your board could decide not to grant this change in ownership. This would have unknown consequences to the viability of the business.



- 4. Licenses must be displayed in a conspicuous place at all times at the business location. If the business has no fixed location, this license shall be carried at all times during any actions related to the conduct of carrying on the licensed commercial cannabis activity, and shall exhibit it, whenever requested, to any person. When a licensed commercial cannabis retail business with a fixed location is conducting deliveries, a copy of this license shall be carried by the delivery person at all times, and the delivery person shall exhibit it, whenever requested, to any person.

Since the cost of this project exceeded \$10,000, Information Services posted an RFP to obtain competitive bids for equipment pricing. We received responsive pricing proposals from the following vendors:

The GHA pricing proposal was the lowest cost, and since we're only buying equipment with no value-added services, there were no other factors to consider. All vendors are authorized resellers for Alcatel-Lucent networking equipment.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Tri-Valley Groundwater Management District Request to Mono County

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Request Board: A) review the Tri-Valley Groundwater Management District's request to Mono County that Mono County leave the Owens Valley Groundwater Authority; and B) provide direction to staff regarding a draft letter to Mono County for its anticipated consideration of Tri-Valley's request.

SUMMARY/JUSTIFICATION:

This item requests the Board to consider whether to comment on Mono County's anticipated consideration of the Tri-Valley Groundwater Management District's (TVGMD) request that Mono County leave the Owens Valley Groundwater Authority (OVGA). As you are aware, the OVGA implements the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) as the local Groundwater Sustainability Agency (GSA). The apparent purpose of TVGMD's request is to bolster their attempt to claim GSA status for that portion of the groundwater basin. Since the Basin is low priority, if granted GSA status, the Tri-Valley would not be required to prepare and submit as GSP.

As we are aware, SGMA requires the sustainable management of California's groundwater resources. After the passage of SGMA, Inyo County spearheaded an effort to organize local agencies overlying the Owens Valley Groundwater Basin (the "Basin") to form the Owens Valley Groundwater Authority (OVGA) JPA and act as the local GSA for the Basin. This staff report will not review the entire history of the OVGA's membership but, relevant to today's discussion, the remaining members of the OVGA include Inyo County, Mono County, the City of Bishop, Big Pine CSD and the Indian Creek Westridge CSD. As presently constituted, the OVGA has jurisdiction to implement groundwater management throughout the entire basin. The TVGMD previously requested that their OVGA membership be terminated, which the OVGA Board chose to support.

When the OVGA was formed the Basin was designated as a "medium priority" basin requiring the creation and implementation of a Groundwater Sustainability Plan (GSP). TVGMD and Mono County representatives on the OVGA Board consistently indicated that their primary purpose in joining the OVGA was due to the GSP mandate and the cost of developing that GSP, which would be lessened by virtue of the OVGA's member contributions to the GSP Development Budget, and the OVGA's access to grant funding from the State (initially acquired directly by Inyo County). TVGMD and Mono County have also generally expressed their concern about a GSP having a significant negative effect on the agricultural economy in the Tri-Valley region.

In 2019, the Basin was re-prioritized to be "low priority." SGMA does not require a GSP to be developed and implemented in a low priority basin. Prior to that change in status, and after spending some grant funding in

hand, the remaining members of the OVGA at that time, including Mono County and TVGMD, affirmatively decided to continue to move forward developing a GSP at the OVGA's October 10, 2019 meeting. This decision was supported by your Board at the Inyo County Board meeting on or about October 10, 2019.

The OVGA is currently drafting a GSP to cover the entire Basin. The cost of this effort is largely being covered by a grant funding agreement with the State. That grant funding agreement requires, among other things, preparation of a GSP for the Owens Valley Groundwater Basin a grant completion report including a description how the grant funded work addresses the goals of the GSP and sustainable groundwater, a final draft GSP and implementation plan, and proof of final GSP submittal to DWR. Failure to implement the project in compliance with the grant agreement could result in repayment of the grant advance or withholding of disbursements and/or funds retained by the State until project completion.

Recent developments call into question the future ability of the OVGA to create a GSP and fulfill its mission of safeguarding the sustainability of the Basin through management of groundwater resources. Specifically, the TVGMD directed its staff to formally request Mono County withdraw from the OVGA in order to facilitate the TVGMD becoming an exclusive GSA for the Tri-Valley portion of the Basin. The absence of Mono County from the OVGA creates a potential GSP development and implementation problems given that the OVGA will no longer have a member whose boundaries cover the Tri-Valley or Mono County areas of the Basin. This concern is not simply academic.

Although the Basin is low priority, there are documented concerns about unsustainable groundwater use in the Tri-Valley area. The best information available shows a persistent groundwater level decline with the potential to negatively impact agricultural and domestic well owners. The overdraft is also possibly contributing to a documented decline in spring discharge supporting habitat in Fish Slough and associated reduced groundwater discharge to the portions of the Basin south of the County line.

The validity of a basin-wide GSP may also be called into question if there is no agency overlying the Mono County portions of the Basin, with SGMA jurisdiction, participating in the OVGA JPA. If the Basin is reprioritized, the entire Basin will again be subject to SGMA requirements that the Basin be managed in compliance with an approved GSP. The OVGA or its successor(s) would also need to re-establish the GSA governance structure and update the GSP with the accompanying monetary and staff resource costs. OVGA staff is also investigating the potential for its grant funding to be revoked if Mono County is terminated from the OVGA. While the potential impacts to Tri-Valley ag users and domestic well owners are more directly pertinent to Mono County policy concerns, the other potential effects present more direct issues for Inyo County.

Inyo County's recent experience as a member of the Indian Wells Valley Groundwater Authority is also informative. There, the greater Ridgecrest community ignored known severe overdraft issues for decades. That overdraft is also primarily caused by agricultural pumping. Because of their failure to address the overdraft, that community is now facing a possibly-immediate elimination of most agricultural pumping due to the cost of water importation, as well as potentially drastic reductions in all pumping across the Indian Wells Valley Groundwater Basin. These consequences will likely come at great cost to the existing communities and stifle their future ability to thrive and evolve. Because of this, they are now seeking to acquire water out of the Owens Valley Groundwater Basin to alleviate their overdraft problem.

Based on the above, this agenda item seeks direction on whether Inyo County will comment on Mono County's anticipated future consideration of TVGMD's request.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY OF BOARD ACTIONS:

ALTERNATIVES AND CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Make no comment. Mono County may not agree with TVGMD's request. Mono County may also take offense to an Inyo County posture it may perceive to be paternalistic (no matter how legitimate Inyo's concerns).

Additionally, Mono County is prohibited by the OVGA JPA (Article VI Section 1.1) from unilaterally withdrawing from the OVGA, and the OVGA may not agree to allow its membership termination.

Even if Mono County is granted its request to be terminated from the OVGA, the OVGA will still be able to draft and locally approve a GSP encompassing the entire Basin. Once approved, the OVGA can implement the GSP where it has jurisdiction. If Mono is not a member, the OVGA will not be able to exercise its SGMA powers north of the County line. The GSP would be available in case the priority of the Basin changes and a GSP is then required but it likely would need updating and the steps to re-establish the compositions of the OVGA to permit implementation. Alternatively, Mono County's membership termination could affect the budget should the OVGA vote to refund a portion of their funding commitment. In the longer term, the absence of Mono County would require greater reliance on the funding commitments of the remaining agencies in the OVGA.

Additionally, other regulating agencies such as Cal CDFW, and environmental agencies such as the OVC or the Sierra Club, have their own potential ability to affect groundwater pumping if it is negatively impacting wildlife habitat and will potentially address that concern through their own processes.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Request Board ratify and approve the Memorandum of Understanding between the County of Inyo and the California Department of Public Health for the provision of Emergency Medical and Health Disaster Assistance relating to COVID-19 Case Investigation and Contact Tracing beginning November 24, 2020 and in effect until terminated by either party, and authorize the HHS Director to sign.

SUMMARY/JUSTIFICATION:

Inyo County Health and Human Services' Public Health Division has been using County employees to support our case investigation and contact tracing needs locally. As our numbers of COVID-19 cases increase, the capacity of our internal team has been taxed significantly. Additionally, our Public Health has observed the need to increase our Spanish-language capacity in conducting case investigations and contact tracing as our Latinx community is disproportionately represented in our positive case counts. Our Deputy Director of Public Health and Prevention made a request to the California Department of Public Health through our MHOAC on or about November 16 for up to five (5) bilingual case investigators/contact tracers. The state has authorized Inyo County up to ten (10) case investigators/contact tracers to support our local COVID-19 response efforts. Two bi-lingual case investigators/contact tracers have already been assigned and are actively working with our Public Health team. The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) allows for flexibility to request additional support, as needed. The attached (MOU), which does not have a financial obligation, was reviewed by County Counsel and signed by the Director of Health and Human Services in order to ensure timely and immediate access to these resources. The Department respectfully requests your Board review, ratify and approve the MOU as presented.

Memorandum of Understanding between the California Department of Public Health and the County of INYO

for Emergency Medical and Health Disaster Assistance relating to Case Investigation and Contact Tracing in INYO County for COVID-19

This Agreement, dated for reference purposes November 25, 2020, is made and entered into by and between the County of INYO ("County") and the State of California Department of Public Health ("CDPH"), hereinafter jointly referred to as "Parties" and each individually as a "Party."

WHEREAS, California Governor Gavin Newsom issued a Proclamation of a State of Emergency on March 4, 2020 based on the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic; and the County proclaimed a local emergency and a local health emergency on March 16, 2020, which were ratified by its Board of Supervisors on March 17, 2020; and those emergency declarations remain in effect based on ongoing emergency conditions relating to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the State of California ("State") identified State employees for redirection to assist local public health jurisdictions with contact tracing efforts, and these State employees were mission-tasked to perform contact tracing work as Disaster Service Workers ("DSW"), as defined in the California Government Code, Sections 3101, 8628, and 8595; and

WHEREAS, CDPH, the lead department for the California Connected program, a State program, is responsible for the deployment of State DSW to counties and municipalities to perform contact tracing work to support the State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on November 16, 2020, the County, through its Medical Health Operational Area Coordinator, submitted a request to CDPH for up to FIVE bilingual State employees to assist the County with critically needed case investigation and contact tracing ("CICT") efforts within INYO County to contain the spread of COVID-19, and the County and CDPH mutually wish to deploy State employees for this purpose through the State's mutual aid system, free of charge;

NOW THEREFORE, it is agreed as follows:

1. CDPH shall assign up to TEN (10) State employees ("State CICT Personnel") to assist the County with CICT work, as required to meet the County's needs. The term of this Agreement shall be from November 23, 2020 to June 30, 2021. The timing and duration of deployment of State CICT Personnel shall be by mutual written agreement between the County and CDPH. State CICT Personnel may be assigned to the County from any State agency. Should State CICT Personnel be deployed for CICT work for County prior to execution of this Agreement, all items stated in this Agreement shall apply as of the earliest date the State CICT Personnel are deployed.

- 2. At any time during the term of this Agreement, CDPH reserves the right to remove any State CICT Personnel assigned to the County in order to respond quickly to emergent COVID-19 outbreaks in other counties, or for any other reason. In the event CDPH decides to remove any State CICT Personnel, CDPH shall provide fourteen (14) calendar days of prior written notification to the County via the contact information listed in Section 11 of this Agreement. However, CDPH may remove all State CICT Personnel without prior written notice to the County in the event the County allows State CICT Personnel to access a County System without written approval from CDPH, as defined in Section 9, or in the event the County assigns State CICT Personnel to case investigation work without written approval from CDPH, as defined in Section 8.
- 3. State CICT Personnel shall remain employees of the State of California, with no impact on their salaries, benefits, or state service credits. This Agreement shall not establish any joint employer relationship between CDPH and the County nor any employment relationship between the State CICT Personnel and the County for any purposes, including, but not limited to, the application of the Fair Labor Standards Act, California Labor Code and Wage Orders; Federal Insurance Contribution Act; the Social Security Act; the Federal Unemployment Tax Act; the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, the State Revenue and Taxation Code relating to income tax withholding at the source of income; the Workers' Compensation Insurance Code; 401(k), pension, health, or other fringe or employee benefits; or third-party liability claims. Each Party shall indemnify and hold harmless the other party for any claims raised by the Party's employees, contractors, or volunteers for claims for wages, income, or other employee benefits.
- 4. The State shall retain sole responsibility to provide the wages and benefits of the State CICT Personnel, including accurate timekeeping and payroll, which CDPH shall ensure by providing the pre-deployment State agencies and State supervisors of the State CICT Personnel with completed timesheets for their respective State CICT Personnel. State CICT Personnel services shall be provided to the County at no cost to the County. Each Party shall bear and be solely responsible for its own costs and expenses necessary to its own compliance with this Agreement.
- 5. The State shall retain responsibility for providing office space, equipment, and supplies to the State CICT Personnel, and CDPH shall retain responsibility for training and supervising the State CICT Personnel for the purpose of providing CICT services to the County. The County may add localized workflows to existing CDPH scripts and shall provide training and support to State CICT Personnel on any such localized workflows. The County shall also provide the State CICT Personnel with any required County-specific trainings, and CDPH shall make the State CICT Personnel available for that purpose.
- 6. The County reserves the right to immediately remove any State CICT Personnel from performing the County's CICT work for any reason. In the event the

County decides to remove any State CICT Personnel, the County shall provide notice to CDPH via the contact information listed in Section 11 of this Agreement.

- 7. The Parties shall collaborate and jointly establish a process for the scheduling of work shifts for the State CICT Personnel.
- 8. State CICT Personnel will be assigned to the County to perform contact tracing work. The County may identify State CICT Personnel to perform case investigator work. Due to the complexity of case investigation as compared to contact tracing, the approval of both Parties is required for assignment of each individual State CICT Personnel to the role of case investigator. State CICT Personnel shall complete case investigator training before performing case investigator work for the County and training may be provided either through the Virtual Training Academy (a total of four (4) additional training hours above the contact tracing training provided to all State CICT Personnel) or by the County. The County agrees to provide one-on-one mentorship of newly trained case investigator State CICT Personnel by advanced communicable disease investigator County staff as appropriate, including all State CICT Personnel work in the California Confidential Network for Contact Tracing ("CalCONNECT") and California Reportable Disease Information Exchange ("CalREDIE") systems. The County may make a request to CDPH for CalREDIE access for State CICT Personnel who work as case investigators and State CICT Personnel shall not access CalREDIE without written approval from CDPH.
- 9. All work performed by State CICT Personnel assigned to the County shall be conducted within the CalCONNECT system. If the County is using a tool, solution or system for CICT ("County System") instead of, or to augment the CalCONNECT system, then the County may propose to CDPH that State CICT Personnel use a County System to perform CICT work. CDPH shall review such a proposal on a case-by-case basis and inform County in writing of its decision. The County's proposal shall provide details on the technology to be used by State CICT Personnel including a description of the County System and the mechanism to provide remote access to CICT Personnel, the information security and privacy policies applicable to the County System, and the training, support, and quality assurance that County will provide to State CICT Personnel to ensure successful adoption of the County System. State CICT Personnel shall not access a County System without written approval from CDPH. State CICT Personnel shall complete training on a County System before performing CICT work for the County in that County System and training shall be provided by the County.

The County may make a request to CDPH for CalREDIE access for State CICT Personnel who use a County System and State CICT Personnel shall not access CalREDIE without written approval from CDPH.

- 10. CDPH shall comply with all confidentiality obligations under federal and state laws, including but not limited to the California Code of Regulations, Title 17, Section 2502, Subdivision (f), as applicable.
- 11. Either Party to this Agreement may terminate its participation in this Agreement for any reason by providing thirty (30) calendar days' advance written notice to the other Party, sent to:

- 12. Each Party shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the other Party and its officers, agents and employees from any claim, liability, loss, injury or damage arising out of, or in connection with, performance of this Agreement by the Party and/or its agents, employees or sub-contractors, including but not limited to any claim based on or arising out of any unauthorized disclosure of Confidential Information by the Party and/or its agents, employees or sub-contractors, excepting only loss, injury or damage caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of personnel employed by the other Party. It is the intent of the Parties to this Agreement to provide the broadest possible coverage for each Party. Each Party shall reimburse the other Party for all costs, attorneys' fees, expenses and liabilities incurred with respect to any litigation in which a Party contests its obligation to indemnify, defend and/or hold harmless the other Party under this Agreement and does not prevail in that contest.
- 13. Each Party shall maintain general liability insurance and workers' compensation insurance, or self-insurance, and may be required to provide the other Party with satisfactory evidence of such coverage or self-insurance. Neither Party shall provide individual coverage for the other Party's employees nor be responsible for accepted claims of the other Party's employees, with each Party being responsible for coverage of its own employees. Each Party shall immediately provide proof of insurance or self-insurance, including Workers' Compensation and General Liability, covering its employees, upon request of the other Party.
- 14. The Agreement expresses all understandings of the Parties concerning all matters covered and shall constitute the entire Agreement, whether by written or verbal understanding of the Parties, their officers, agents or employees. No change or revisions shall be valid unless made in the form of a written amendment to this Agreement that is formally approved and executed by all the Parties.

- 15. This Agreement shall be binding upon the Parties and inure to the benefit of any successor entity which may assume the obligations of any Party. However, no assignment of this Agreement or of the rights and obligations hereunder shall be valid without the prior written consent of the other Party.
- 16. Ownership, use and disclosure of any data associated with performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the California COVID-19 Contact Tracing Data Management System (DMS) Data Use And Disclosure Agreement between the County Public Health Department and CDPH, executed on November 24, 2020.
- 17. This Agreement does not, and is not intended to, confer any rights or remedies upon any person or entity other than the Parties.
- 18. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which together will constitute one and the same instrument. The Parties agree that an electronic copy of a signed contract, or an electronically signed contract, shall have the same force and legal effect as a contract executed with an original ink signature. The term "electronic copy of a signed contract" refers to a transmission by facsimile, electronic mail, or other electronic means of a copy of an original signed contract in a portable document format. The term "electronically signed contract" means a contract that is executed by applying an electronic signature using technology approved by the Parties.

Upon timely receipt of the statement by the fifth (5th) day of the month, County shall make payment to Contractor on the last day of the month.

F. Federal and State taxes.

- (1) Except as provided in subparagraph (2) below, County will not withhold any federal or state income taxes or social security from any payments made by County to Contractor under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- (2) County will withhold California State income taxes from payments made under this Agreement to non-California resident independent contractors when it is anticipated that total annual payments to Contractor under this Agreement will exceed one thousand four hundred ninety nine dollars (\$1,499.00).
- (3) Except as set forth above, County has no obligation to withhold any taxes or payments from sums paid by County to Contractor under this Agreement. Payment of all taxes and other assessments on such sums is the sole responsibility of Contractor. County has no responsibility or liability for payment of Contractor's taxes or assessments.
- (4) The total amounts paid by County to Contractor, and taxes withheld from payments to non-California residents, if any, will be reported annually to the Internal Revenue Service and the California State Franchise Tax Board. To facilitate this reporting, Contractor shall complete and submit to the County an Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Form W-9 upon executing this Agreement.

4. WORK SCHEDULE.

Contractor's obligation is to perform, in a timely manner, those services and work identified in Attachment A which are requested by the County. It is understood by Contractor that the performance of these services and work will require a varied schedule. Contractor will arrange his/her own schedule, but will coordinate with County to ensure that all services and work requested by County under this Agreement will be performed within the time frame set forth by County.

5. REQUIRED LICENSES, CERTIFICATES, AND PERMITS.

A. Any licenses, certificates, or permits required by the federal, state, county, municipal governments, for contractor to provide the services and work described in Attachment A must be procured by Contractor and be valid at the time Contractor enters into this Agreement or as otherwise may be required. Further, during the term of this Agreement, Contractor must maintain such licenses, certificates, and permits in full force and effect. Licenses, certificates, and permits may include, but are not limited to, driver's licenses, professional licenses or certificates, and business licenses. Such licenses, certificates, and permits will be procured and maintained in force by Contractor at no expense to the County. Contractor will provide County, upon execution of this Agreement, with evidence of current and valid licenses, certificates and permits which are required to perform the services identified in Attachment A. Where there is a dispute between Contractor and County as to what licenses, certificates, and permits are required to perform the services identified in Attachment A, County reserves the right to make such determinations for purposes of this Agreement.

B. Contractor warrants that it is not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in covered transactions by any federal department or agency. Contractor also warrants that it is not suspended or debarred from receiving federal funds as listed in the List of Parties Excluded from Federal Procurement or Non-procurement Programs issued by the General Services Administration available at: http://www.sam.gov.

6. OFFICE SPACE, SUPPLIES, EQUIPMENT, ET CETERA.

Contractor shall provide such office space, supplies, equipment, vehicles, reference materials, and telephone service as is necessary for Contractor to provide the services identified in Attachment A to this Agreement. County is not obligated to reimburse or pay Contractor, for any expense or cost incurred by Contractor in procuring or maintaining such items. Responsibility for the costs and expenses incurred by Contractor in providing and maintaining such items is the sole responsibility and obligation of Contractor.

7. COUNTY PROPERTY.

- A. <u>Personal Property of County.</u> Any personal property such as, but not limited to, protective or safety devices, badges, identification cards, keys, etc. provided to Contractor by County pursuant to this Agreement are, and at the termination of this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of County. Contractor will use reasonable care to protect, safeguard and maintain such items while they are in Contractor's possession. Contractor will be financially responsible for any loss or damage to such items, partial or total, which is the result of Contractor's negligence.
- B. <u>Products of Contractor's Work and Services</u>. Any and all compositions, publications, plans, designs, specifications, blueprints, maps, formulas, processes, photographs, slides, video tapes, computer programs, computer disks, computer tapes, memory chips, soundtracks, audio recordings, films, audio-visual presentations, exhibits, reports, studies, works of art, inventions, patents, trademarks, copyrights, or intellectual properties of any kind which are created, produced, assembled, compiled by, or are the result, product, or manifestation of, Contractor's services or work under this Agreement are, and at the termination of this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of the County. At the termination of the Agreement, Contractor will convey possession and title to all such properties to County.

8. INSURANCE.

For the duration of this Agreement Contractor shall procure and maintain insurance of the scope and amount specified in Attachment **C** and with the provisions specified in that attachment.

9. STATUS OF CONTRACTOR.

All acts of Contractor, its agents, officers, and employees, relating to the performance of this Agreement, shall be performed as independent contractors, and not as agents, officers, or employees of County. Contractor, by virtue of this Agreement, has no authority to bind or incur any obligation on behalf of County. Except as expressly provided in Attachment A, Contractor has no authority or responsibility to exercise any rights or power vested in the County. No agent, officer, or employee of the Contractor is to be considered an employee of County. It is understood by both Contractor and County that this Agreement shall not under any circumstances be construed or considered to create an employer-employee relationship or a joint venture. As an independent contractor:

- A. Contractor shall determine the method, details, and means of performing the work and services to be provided by Contractor under this Agreement.
- B. Contractor shall be responsible to County only for the requirements and results specified in this Agreement, and except as expressly provided in this Agreement, shall not be subjected to County's control with respect to the physical action or activities of Contractor in fulfillment of this Agreement.
- C. Contractor, its agents, officers, and employees are, and at all times during the term of this Agreement shall, represent and conduct themselves as independent contractors, and not as employees of County.

10. DEFENSE AND INDEMNIFICATION.

Contractor shall hold harmless, defend and indemnify County and its officers, officials, employees and volunteers from and against any and all liability, loss, damage, expense, costs (including without limitation costs and fees of litigation) of every nature arising out of or in connection with Contractor's performance of work hereunder or its failure to comply with any of its obligations contained in the agreement, except such loss or damages which was caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the County.

11. RECORDS AND AUDIT.

- A. <u>Records</u>. Contractor shall prepare and maintain all records required by the various provisions of this Agreement, federal, state, county, municipal, ordinances, regulations, and directions. Contractor shall maintain these records for a minimum of four (4) years from the termination or completion of this Agreement. Contractor may fulfill its obligation to maintain records as required by this paragraph by substitute photographs, microphotographs, or other authentic reproduction of such records.
- B. <u>Inspections and Audits</u>. Any authorized representative of County shall have access to any books, documents, papers, records, including, but not limited to, financial records of Contractor, which County determines to be pertinent to this Agreement, for the purposes of making audit, evaluation, examination, excerpts, and transcripts during the period such records are to be maintained by Contractor. Further, County has the right, at all reasonable times, to audit, inspect, or otherwise evaluate the work performed or being performed under this Agreement.

12. NONDISCRIMINATION.

During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor, its agents, officers, and employees shall not unlawfully discriminate in violation of any federal, state, or local law, against any employee, or applicant for employment, or person receiving services under this Agreement, because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, age, or sex. Contractor and its agents, officers, and employees shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code section 12900, et seq.), and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder in the California Code of Regulations. Contractor shall also abide by the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) and all amendments thereto, and all administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to said act.

13. CANCELLATION.

This Agreement may be canceled by County without cause, and at will, for any reason by giving to Contractor thirty (30) days written notice of such intent to cancel. Contractor may cancel this Agreement without cause, and at will, for any reason whatsoever by giving thirty (30) days written notice of such intent to cancel to County.

14. ASSIGNMENT.

This is an agreement for the services of Contractor. County has relied upon the skills, knowledge, experience, and training of Contractor as an inducement to enter into this Agreement. Contractor shall not assign or subcontract this Agreement, or any part of it, without the express written consent of County. Further, Contractor shall not assign any monies due or to become due under this Agreement without the prior written consent of County.

15. DEFAULT.

If the Contractor abandons the work, or fails to proceed with the work and services requested by County in a timely manner, or fails in any way as required to conduct the work and services as required by County, County may declare the Contractor in default and terminate this Agreement upon five (5) days written notice to Contractor. Upon such termination by default, County will pay to Contractor all amounts owing to Contractor for services and work satisfactorily performed to the date of termination.

16. WAIVER OF DEFAULT.

Waiver of any default by either party to this Agreement shall not be deemed to be waiver of any subsequent default. Waiver or breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach, and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement unless this Agreement is modified as provided in paragraph twenty-two (22) below.

17. CONFIDENTIALITY.

Contractor further agrees to comply with the various provisions of the federal, state, and county laws, regulations, and ordinances providing that information and records kept, maintained, or accessible by Contractor in the course of providing services and work under this Agreement, shall be privileged, restricted, or confidential. Contractor agrees to keep confidential all such information and records. Disclosure of such confidential, privileged, or protected information shall be made by Contractor only with the express written consent of the County. Any disclosure of confidential information by Contractor without the County's written consent is solely and exclusively the legal responsibility of Contractor in all respects.

Notwithstanding anything in the Agreement to the contrary, names of persons receiving public social services are confidential and are to be protected from unauthorized disclosure in accordance with Title 45, Code of Federal Regulations Section 205.50, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, and Sections 10850 and 14100.2 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, and regulations adopted pursuant thereto. For the purpose of this Agreement, all information, records, and data elements pertaining to beneficiaries shall be protected by the provider from unauthorized disclosure.

18. CONFLICTS.

Contractor agrees that it has no interest, and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of the work and services under this Agreement.

19. POST AGREEMENT COVENANT.

Contractor agrees not to use any confidential, protected, or privileged information which is gained from the County in the course of providing services and work under this Agreement, for any personal benefit, gain, or enhancement. Further, Contractor agrees for a period of two years after the termination of this Agreement, not to seek or accept any employment with any entity, association, corporation, or person who, during the term of this Agreement, has had an adverse or conflicting interest with the County, or who has been an adverse party in litigation with the County, and concerning such, Contractor by virtue of this Agreement has gained access to the County's confidential, privileged, protected, or proprietary information.

20. SEVERABILITY.

If any portion of this Agreement or application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, or if it is found in contravention of any federal, state, or county statute, ordinance, or regulation, the remaining provisions of this Agreement, or the application thereof, shall not be invalidated thereby, and shall remain in full force and effect to the extent that the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

21. FUNDING LIMITATION.

The ability of County to enter this Agreement is based upon available funding from various sources. In the event that such funding fails, is reduced, or is modified, from one or more sources, County has the option to cancel, reduce, or modify this Agreement, or any of its terms within ten (10) days of its notifying Contractor of the cancellation, reduction, or modification of available funding. Any reduction or modification of this Agreement made pursuant to this provision must comply with the requirements of paragraph twenty-two (22) (Amendment).

22. AMENDMENT.

This Agreement may be modified, amended, changed, added to, or subtracted from, by the mutual consent of the parties hereto, if such amendment or change is in written form and executed with the same formalities as this Agreement, and attached to the original Agreement to maintain continuity.

23. NOTICE.

Any notice, communication, amendments, additions, or deletions to this Agreement, including change of address of either party during the terms of this Agreement, which Contractor or County shall be required, or may desire, to make, shall be in writing and may be personally served, or sent by prepaid first class mail to, the respective parties as follows:

Legal assistance services shall include some in-person assistance, including but not limited to on-site visits to regional Senior Centers (including, but not limited to, via electronic videoconferencing or other electronic video capability). Each site shall have no less than two, and ideally, four in-person appearances annually, including time slots reserved for private, confidential meetings with individual older adults, as coordinated with ESAAA staff. "(Contractor shall make best efforts to make the above in-person appearances to regional senior centers in a safe manner, taking into consideration the status of the COVID-19 pandemic and recommended practices and precautions from government health authorities)"

Specifically, CONTRACTOR shall provide brief legal consultation/advice/education and referral on all legal matters to targeted senior residents of Inyo and Mono Counties, and shall determine whether specific identified concerns require a legal remedy, a referral to a non-legal entity, or a referral to private attorneys if direct legal representation is required. Fee-generating cases shall be referred to the private bar. In no case will ESAAA nor the County of Inyo be responsible for costs of continued legal work on such cases.

CONTRACTOR shall comply with program monitoring by ESAAA staff as required by the State, or otherwise determined.

During FY 2020/2021 with the additional CARES funding, CONTRACTOR shall provide legal services or advice related to issues arising from the COVID-19 pandemic or government responses to the pandemic.

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L PREFACE

The Older American Act (OAA) of 1965, as amended, designates legal assistance as a priority service funded under Title 111B [42 U.S.C. § 3026(a)(2)]. As such, the funding of legal assistance by each Area Agency on Aging is mandatory, and services must be accessible and available throughout each of the 33 Planning and Service Areas (PSAs) in California.

The Statewide Guidelines for Legal Assistance in California [hereinafter Guidelines] were originally developed by the Legal Services Developer within the California Department of Aging (CDA) in conjunction with representatives from the Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs), Legal Services Providers (LSPs), Ombudsmen, California Association of Area Agencies on Aging (C4A) and the California State Bar. The purpose of the Guidelines is to provide guidance and technical assistance to the AAAs and LSPs on the delivery of quality legal assistance to older individuals, pursuant to the Older Americans Act (OAA) of 1965, as amended. These Guidelines were designed to outline the elements of a quality legal services program and how to promote an effective legal assistance delivery system throughout the state.

On April 7 & 8, 2015, the Model Approaches Grant Partners - CDA, Legal Services of Northern California and the Legal Aid Association of California convened an in-person meeting of a Task Force in San Francisco for the purpose of updating the Guidelines. The Task Force consisted of representatives from CDA, AAAs, LSPs, C4A, Ombudsmen and the California State Bar. The task force was facilitated by Penelope Hommel, Co-Executive Director of The Center for Social Gerontology, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

The Guidelines were circulated to the members of the Task Force in draft form for comments. Following these revisions, the Task Force members, in turn, circulated a draft to their various members and obtained input. Most comments that were consistent with the consensus reached during the in-person meeting were incorporated into the Guidelines, where feasible. This document is now the final update of the Guidelines.

It is important to emphasize that the implementation of the updated Guidelines will not only help ensure compliance with the Older Americans Act and consistency with the Older Californians Act, but will also help to focus the delivery of legal assistance to at risk older individuals in California and promote effective advocacy.

On behalf of the California Department of Aging, I wish to thank my Grant Partners, each member of the Task Force and everyone who contributed or participated in this process.

II. DEFINITIONS

For purpose of these Guidelines, the following definitions are applicable. Many of these definitions mirror those found in the Older Americans Act (OM) to whatever extent possible and appropriate. Any term not otherwise defined will have its general meaning.

<u>Abuse</u> -the willful: (a) infliction of injury, unreasonable confinement, intimidation, or cruel punishment with resulting physical harm, pain, or mental anguish; or (b) deprivation by a person, including a caregiver, of goods or services that are necessary to avoid physical harm, mental anguish or mental illness. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 3002(1).

Accessible - the practical availability of legal services to the target population groups.

Adult Protective Services (APS) -those preventive and remedial activities performed on behalf of elders and dependent adults who are unable to protect their own interest, harmed or threatened with harm, caused physical or mental injury due to the action or inaction of another person or their own action as a result of ignorance, illiteracy, incompetence, mental limitation, substance abuse or poor health, lacking in adequate food, shelter or clothing, exploited of their income and resources, or deprived of entitlement due them. See Cal. Welf. & Inst. Code§ 15610.10.

Advance Directive - a document executed under the California Health Care Decisions Act (Cal. Prob. Code §§ 4600-4805) designating an agent for making health care decisions in case of the principal's incapacity and or expressing the principal's health care and related choices.

<u>Americans with Disabilities.Act</u> - a-federal remedial statute designed to eliminate discrimination against individua1s with disabilities and to integrate individuals with disabilities in all areas of society.

<u>Area Agency on Aging</u> - the agency on aging designated in a planning and service area to develop and administer the area plan for a comprehensive and coordinated system of services for older people. *See* 42 U.S.C. § 3025(b).

<u>Community Legal Education</u> - An essential system of outreach to inform elders, other service providers and concerned parties of the legal rights of older people in community education forums, which will vary based on the literacy, sophistication, predominant language, available resources, and geographic dispersion of clients. CommLJnity legal education is specifically discussed in Standard 3.6 of the "ABA Standards for the Provision of Civil Legal Aid," where it is described as an important tool for providers and which is available from the State Legal Services Developer.

<u>Conservatorship</u> - a court proceeding to appoint a manager for the financial affairs and/or the personal care of an adult who is either physically or mentally unable to handle either or both.

<u>Legal Assistance</u> - (a) means legal advice and representation provided by an attorney to older individuals with economic or social needs; and (b) includes - (i) to the extent feasible, counseling or other appropriate assistance by a paralegal or law student under

the direct supervision of an attorney; and (ii) counseling or representation by a nonlawyer where permitted by law. See 42 U.S.C. § 3002(33). Direct legal assistance may be provided face-to-face, by telephone, or by electronic communication and includes, but is not limited to, advice and consultation, litigation, administrative representation, brief services, preparing legal documents and pro se assistance.

<u>Direct Supervision</u> - oversight of the provision of services by a professional licensed to provide such services, so as to ensure appropriate quality and scope of services. Direct supervision necessarily includes, but is not limited to, a substantial degree of personal review of work product, and availability to respond to questions from the persons being supervised.

Exploitation - (a) the fraudulent or otherwise illegal, unauthorized, or improper act or process of an individual, including a caregiver or fiduciary, that uses the resources of an older individual for monetary or personal benefit, profit, or gain, or that results in depriving an older individual of rightful access to, or use of, benefits, resources, belongings, or assets; (b) In subparagraph (a), the term "caregiver" means an individual who has the responsibility for the care of an older individual, either voluntarily, by contract, by receipt of payment for care, or as a result of the operation of law and means a family member or other individual who provides (on behalf of such individual or of a public or private agency, organization, or institution) compensated or uncompensated care to an older individual. See 42 U.S.C. § 3002(18).

Greatest economic need -the need resulting from an income level at or below 125% of the current official Federal Poverty Guideline amounts, consistent with financial eligibility policies of the Legal Services Corporation and the Uniform Reporting System for California. See 45 C.F.R § 1611.3. This includes exceptions to the income ceiling for those at 200% or less of the Federal Poverty Guidelines amounts in certain circumstances as enumerated in the Legal Services Corporation regulations. Id. at § 1611.5. (Providers may also take the California Elder Economic Security Index into account, as Area Agencies do during their mandated planning process when identifying those in greatest economic need. See Cal. Welf. & Inst. Code§ 9400.)

Greatest social need - the need caused by non-economic factors, which include:

- (A) physical and mental disabilities;
- (B) language barriers, and
- (C) cultural, social or geographical isolation, including isolation caused by race or ethnicity, sexual orientation or gender identity, or housing status or mobility issue that:
 - (i) restricts the ability of an individual to perform normal daily tasks;
 - (ii) or threatens the capacity of the individual to live independently.

<u>Legal Services Provider (LSP)</u> - an entity that is funded to deliver legal services to older people pursuant to the OAA. Note that this definition shall include, and these Guidelines thus shall apply to any OAA Title IV funded hotline, should one exist.

<u>Legal Services Corporation (LSC)</u> - a private, non-membership nonprofit corporation, that provides financial support for legal assistance in non-criminal proceedings or matters to people financially unable to afford legal assistance. See 42 U.S.C. § 2996b(a).

Long Term Care Ombudsman Program - a program established by the OAA using State-certified paid and volunteer ombudsman representatives and volunteers who advocate on behalf of residents of long-term care facilities (and potentially individuals receiving long term services and supports in the community) to seek remedies for both individual and systemic issues, and investigate complaints of elder abuse within these facilities. See 42 U.S.C. § 3058g.

<u>Medi-Cal</u> - California's Medicaid, the federal and state program of medical assistance for needy and low-income people.

<u>Medicare</u> - a federal health insurance program administered by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) in the Department of Health and Human Services. that is available regardless of income. Most people 65 years of age or older and certain disabled or blind people, regardless of age, are covered.

Monitoring Tool - instrument used to provide specific information about legal services, including staffing, targeting, intake and outreach. Monitoring tools should include components that enable AAAs and provid rs to assess contractual compliance, ensure consistency with these Guidelines, evaluate the quality and impact of programs, and review program goals and outcomes.

Older Americans Act of 1965 (OAA) - a federal Act to provide assistance in the development of new or improved programs to help older people, through grants to states for community planning and services and for training, through research, development, or training project grants, and to establish within the Department of Health and Human Services an operating agency to be designated as the Administration on Aging (Note that the Administration on Aging is now a part of the Administration for Community Living, established in April 2012 by bringing together the Administration on Aging, the Office on Disability and the Administration on Developmental Disabilities and is part of the Department of Health and Human Services). See 42 U.S.C. § 3001 et seq.

<u>Outreach</u> - the process of informing potential clients regarding legal information, legal issues, available services and how to access those services. This may include specific information about available services or general education on legal and other relevant issues. Outreach is the key to implementing the targeting and priority setting goals in the OAA. Outreach may also include communication with other organizations or agencies that serve elders targeted under the OAA, such as APS, law enforcement, and community organizations.

<u>Paralegal</u> - a person who is qualified by education, training, or work experience, who either contracts with, or is employed by, an attorney, law firm, corporation, governmental agency, or other entity, and who performs substantial legal work under the direction and supervision of an active member of the State Bar of California.

<u>Planning and Service Area</u> - a geographic area that is designated for purposes of planning, development, delivery, and overall administration of services under an area plan. See 42 U.S.C. § 3025.

<u>Program Staff</u> - includes attorneys, law students, paralegals or unlicensed attorneys, lay advocates, and legal secretaries acting under the supervision of a licensed attorney or as provided by California law, who are employed by a legal services provider and whose primary job duties concern providing legal services to target populations pursuant to the OAA.

<u>State Legal Service Developer</u> - a person whose position is mandated by the OAA and whose mission providing state leadership in a) developing legal assistance programs for older people (42 U.S.C. § 3027(a)(13)), and b) securing and maintaining legal rights of older persons (42 U.S.C. § 3058).

<u>State Unit on Aging</u> - the California Department of Aging, which administers programs that serve older adults, including legal services programs, administers funds allocated under the federal OAA and the Older Californians Act; referred to throughout this document as "the State."

<u>Targeting</u> - the requirement in the OAA that services reach older people with greatest economic and social need, with particular attention to low-income individuals, low-income minority individuals, older individuals residing in rural areas, with limited English proficiency, with severe disabilities (physical and/or mental), isolated because of sexual orientation or gender identity, at risk for institutional placement, or other isolated older individuals.

III. MISSION STATEMENT

Ensure justice, dignity, health, security, maximum autonomy and independence to older Californians, particularly those in greatest need, by protecting and enforcing the legal rights of individuals and by promoting social change through broad elder rights advocacy.

IV. PROGRAM PURPOSE

The purpose of the Legal Services Program is to deliver high quality, high-impact, costeffective services designed to address the unmet legal needs of vulnerable older people throughout the State of California.

In the development and implementation of local legal services programs, OAA Title 111-8 legal services providers ("LSPs"), along with their partners, AAAs, Ombudsman programs and the State are to be guided as follows:

- All partners should recognize that LSPs are a part of the continuum of aging services and coordinate with other Older American Act programs to economize costs and develop systems for greatest impact.
- All partners should communicate to each other and to outside interested parties the important impacts of legal services.
- LSPs and AAAs should work together to identify target population those in greatest social or economic need, or otherwise vulnerable older adults.
- LSPs and AAAs should work together to identify priority legal issues, using this
 document and the OAA as a guide, but more specifically delineating priorities for
 each service area in a given time period.
- LSPs and AAAs should work together with a mutual understanding that, where
 possible, efforts should be made to focus on priority legal issues as designated in
 this document and further delineated in each service area.
- LSPs and AAAs should work together to make a positive impact on the lives and well being of disadvantaged or vulnerable older persons by balancing serving many individuals with targeting services to specific populations and focusing on their most critical legal issues.
- LSPs should address all OAA legal services needs

V. TARGET POPULATIONS

The OAA, as amended, specifies that services be targeted to those people in greatest social or economic need, including but not limited to low-income individuals, minorities, rural elders, and those with limited English proficiency. Recognizing that the resources of the OAA are inadequate to meet the legal needs of all older adults, legal assistance services must be targeted to specific populations of older adults.

The target populations shall be determined after consideration of the personal and issue-specific risk factors outlined herein. LSPs and AAAs should collaborate to the greatest extent possible and appropriate to identify what populations are in the greatest social or economic need in their service area. Identified populations will vary from program to program to reflect the needs of the particular geographic locale served by each program. This identification can be achieved through formal or informal legal needs assessments, interviews with other service providers, and input from the targeted client groups.

After identifying appropriate target groups, AAAs and LSPs should again collaborate to the extent possible and appropriate to jointly develop a plan to ensure that legal services are targeted to those populations. In developing plans for targeting of legal services to specific groups of older persons, consideration is to be given to ways the legal assistance program can assist such groups to achieve their desired outcome.

Both identification of target groups and plans for targeting and outreach should be reassessed on a regular basis.

Examples of groups, within the broad categories of those with greatest economic or social need are listed below. This list is not exhaustive, mandatory or in priority order; rather it represents a range of possibilities.

- Homebound or limited mobility
- Residing in long-term care facility
- Without access to transportation
- Living alone with no support or otherwise socially or geographically isolated
- Experiencing chronic health problems
- Abused
- Homeless or at risk of homelessness
- Deaf/Hearing Impaired
- Immigrants
- LGBT
- Limited English Proficiency
- People with physical disabilities
- People with dementia or other mental capacity issues
- Grandparents caring for grandchildren
- Formerly incarcerated

VI. PRIORITY LEGAL ISSUES

AAAs and LSPs shall consider the issue areas listed below in preparing their Area Plans and Requests for Proposals (RFP). However, AAAs and LSPs should work collaboratively to establish specific local priorities. In setting local priorities for legal services, LSPs should work together with AAAs as well as other local stakeholders to identify issues of greatest concern to the service area's identified target population(s). Consumer input, formal or informal needs assessments, review of program data and consideration of other available resources to meet the need are just a few of the methods that can be used to identify local priorities.

Below is a list of substantive legal issues that affect target populations in California and that conform to the requirements of the OAA. Each larger issue is an established priority under the OAA and each sub-issue has been identified as commonly arising in California in the given category. These are not listed in order of priority and the list is not exhaustive.

- Income/Nutrition
 - o SSI
 - o Social Security
 - o Pensions/Retirement
 - o CalFresh/Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
 - o Unemployment
- Housing/Utilities
 - o Tenant Rights
 - o Real Property
 - o Utilities
- Long-term Care
 - o SNF
 - o Facility issues
 - o Community-based, long-term care services
- Healthcare
 - o MediCal
 - o Medicare
 - o Managed care
 - o Provider/services access
 - o Private/Insurance
- Protective Services/Elder Abuse/Defense against Conservatorship
 - o Conservatorship issues (focus on defending older persons against guardianship as called for in the OAA § 321 (a)(6))
 - o Restraining Orders
 - o Abuse/neglect
 - o Exploitation
 - o Advanced Planning/Autonomy/advance directives

Beyond the OAA priority issues listed above, consideration should be given to these issues identified as priorities in California:

- Consumer
 - o Bankruptcy/debt
 - o Contracts/warranties
 - o Scams/identity theft
- Civil Rights
 - o LEP Rights
 - o Discrimination
 - o Immigration

While all of the issues identified above have been identified as common issues throughout California, each service area's priority legal issues will be unique and need not include all of the issues listed. AAAs and LSPs will jointly establish priorities issues for their service area. Nothing in these Guidelines shall be construed to require that the LSP provide services in all of these issue areas. LSPs have the discretion to accept special compelling cases in other substantive issue areas not identified above. Also, regardless of the priority issues established by the AAA and LSPs for their area, LSPs can and should consider other factors when deciding whether or not each individual case is appropriate for acceptance. These factors include a client's individual circumstances, the merits of each case, the expertise of the LSP's staff in the type of case, the availability of assistance from complementary service providers and the impact the case might have on the community.

VII. MECHANISMS FOR REACHING TARGETED GROUPS AND ADDRESSING PRIORITY ISSUES

After having jointly identified target populations and priority legal issues, AAAs and LSPs should consider what mechanisms they will use to reach those populations and provide services on those issues. Outreach may involve efforts aimed at targeted seniors or efforts aimed indirectly at seniors via other organizations that se,:ve them. Outreach may also involve education or training. Collaboration between AAAs and LSPs is strongly encouraged in identifying targeting mechanisms and developing strategies. Consultation with other local stakeholders and service providers is also encouraged.

Strategic outreach is the key to implementing the targeting and priority setting goals. Outreach in its broadest sense involves a variety of strategies. A "first-come-first-served" program is the result of unfocused outreach and does not effectively reach targeted client populations. Almost by definition, the most at-risk vulnerable older adults are the most difficult to reach and serve. Only focused outreach will achieve the goal of reaching and serving those groups.

Successful outreach efforts may include: distribution of information about services to community members, community legal education, developing referral sources among providers and community based organizations who work directly with target groups; including representatives of target groups on advisory boards; participating in groups or organizations for vulnerable adults; using culturally appropriate outreach materials; expanding intake hours and sites; developing additional ways to access services; utilizing media directed to target populations; utilizing bilingual staff; and other strategies to promote access. While outreach efforts, such as community legal education, are aimed at potential legal services clients, outreach may also occur to other organizations and providers. AAAs and LSPs should consider many factors in developing an outreach strategy including time and resources required for different types of outreach, availability of other community resources, both in terms of quantity of resources available and types of services, willingness of other organizations to collaborate, and importance of the target issue or population addressed. For example, some outreach efforts require establishment of relationships and partnerships with other organizations and communities that may be heavily time and resource consuming but will ultimately lead to more appropriately targeted services. Other outreach efforts, while more easily accomplished or perhaps resulting in more clients served, may not succeed in targeting the identified populations or issues. These factors should be considered by AAAs and LSPs in development of outreach strategies.

State and Area Plans are required to include plans for outreach to special target populations. A RFP for Legal Assistance must include a requirement for an outreach plan to such groups. This plan is an important factor to be considered by the AAA in contracting decisions and the contract negotiation process. Outreach plans addressed during the contract negotiation process should not be purely quantitative but rather should consider broader, qualitative impact and effective use of resources based on the specific target populations and issues.

No matter how well suited to a community, for a program to be successful, people must know of its existence, it must be easily accessible, and older people in the community must become aware of the value of legal assistance in protecting their interests and improving their lives.

VIII. PROVIDER ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

A. General Expectations

Legal services providers (LSPs) are expected to deliver high quality, high-impact, costeffective services designed to address the unmet legal needs of vulnerable older people throughout the relevant PSA. The primary focus of the LSP is to deliver direct legal assistance services.

B. Staff Expectations

- 1. Each program is expected to provide access, at no cost, to legal assistance by attorneys licensed and in good standing to practice law in the State of California. Law students, paralegals, paralegal interns, attorneys not licensed in California, and lay advocates may provide legal assistance under the direct supervision of a licensed attorney or as otherwise permitted by California law. Each program is required to carry adequate malpractice insurance in accordance with CDA requirements.
- 2. Program staff are expected to have experience and training or propose a plan for obtaining the necessary training in the priority subject areas of law in which they are providing services.
- 3. Program advocates are encouraged each year to attend training being provided or sponsored by the State relevant to the subject areas of legal assistance.

C. Other Provider Expectations

The LSPs are expected to:

- 1. Operate according to the Guidelines as set forth in this document and any amendments thereto.
- 2. Work collaboratively to reach concurrence with the AAA, on an annual basis (or alternatively just in the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th years of the LSP's contract, i.e., not during the competitive RFP process), on the local legal services needs, issue area priorities and identification of target populations.
- 3. Assist the State and the AAA in developing and amending a model monitoring tool to ensure consistency in the delivery of legal services and that LSPs are providing priority legal services to meet the local needs of the targeted population groups.
- 4. Refer clients, as necessary, to other appropriate agencies or organizations for services.

- 5. Comply with specific requirements of the OAA by doing the following:
 - a. Utilize funds received from the AAA to maintain existing levels of legal services to eligible individuals and, to the extent practicable, assure that legal services furnished will be in addition to any legal services being furnished with funds from other sources. See 42 U.S.C. § 3027(a)(11)(D). Additionally, any voluntary contributions shall be used to expand services and to supplement (not supplant) OAA funds. See 42 U.S.C. § 3030c-2(b)(4)(D).
 - b. Not condition access to the provision of Title 1118 funded legal assistance to any person 60 years of age or older solely on his/her level of income. See 42 U.S.C. § 3030c-2(b)(3). However, a LSP may question the client about financial circumstances as part of the process of providing legal advice, counsel and representation, and also for the purpose of identifying additional financial resources to which the client may be entitled, and to assist in targeting its resources to provide services to clients with greatest social or economic needs. See 45 C.F.R. § 1321.71(e).
 - c. Not deny services to any individual who does not contribute to the cost of the service. See 42 U.S.C. § 3030c-2(b)(3). Clients shall be given an opportunity to voluntarily contribute to the cost of the services they receive. Such opportunity shall be provided in a manner that ensures privacy with respect to contributions. LSPs shall clearly inform each recipient that there is no obligation to contribute and that the contribution is purely voluntary. The method of announcing the opportunity to contribute must not discourage the utilization of the service by the contributor or other potentially eligible individuals.
 - d. Demonstrate the ability to provide legal assistance in the primary language(s) spoken by clients. See 45 C.F.R. § 1321.71 (c)(5).
 - e. Coordinate with the local Legal Services Corporation (LSC) program, if the provider is not an LSC-funded program. See 42 U.S.C. § 3027(a)(11)(B).
 - f. Coordinate legal assistance activities with the private Bar including groups within the private Bar furnishing services to older individuals on a pro bona or reduced fee basis. See 42 U.S.C. § 3027(a)(11)(A)(iii).

- 6. Establish a written grievance process for disposition of complaints made by or on behalf of older individuals. See 22 C.C.R. § 7400(a)(2).
- 7. Have ready access to relevant legal authorities for all appropriate staff, including relevant federal, state, and local laws, manuals for relevant government programs, and relevant support center manuals.
- 8. Have in place written procedures for case intake, acceptance and rejection.
- 9. Develop and follow a protocol and a program policy for referral of fee generating cases consistent with the OAA Regulations. *See* 45 C.F.R. § 1321.71 (g).

D. Coordination with the Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program

The ombudsman program is responsible for advocating and investigating complaints on behalf of the residents of long-term care facilities (LTCFs). In addition, the ombudsman program maintains an ongoing presence at LTCFs, monitors care conditions, and serves as a voice for LTCF residents unable to speak for themselves. Other ombudsman responsibilities include representing the interest of the residents wherever possible, witnessing advanced directives, and educating consumers about residents' rights and good care practices. The ombudsman should maintain strict confidentiality unless resident consent is granted.

The LSP and ombudsman operating within the PSA are expected to develop a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) which will outline their respective roles and responsibilities, mechanisms for appropriate referral to the LSP and other coordination issues. Sample MOUs can be provided by the State upon request.

- 1. LSPs will coordinate with state-designated providers of Long-Term Care Ombudsman services by developing and executing a memorandum of understanding which will address conflict of interest, provision of legal advice, procedures for referral and other technical assistance.
- 2. LSPs may provide direct legal assistance to residents of the long-term care facilities where the clients are otherwise eligible and services are appropriate.
- 3. Where both legal and ombudsman services are provided by the same agency, LSPs must develop and follow policies and procedures to protect the integrity, resources, and confidentiality of both programs.
- 4. LSPs may provide legal consultation to the ombudsman program only in instances where there is a civil suit or other legal action involving a LTCF resident and an ombudsman or the program is called as a witness or has been subpoenaed. LSPs shall not provide legal representation to the

ombudsman program. Representation of the ombudsman program is the responsibility of the State as described below in Section . X.B.4.

E. Other Coordination Expectations

- LSPs are to coordinate with the network of other service providers, including but not limited to other LSPs, HICAP, senior information and assistance, APS, law enforcement, and case management services, within the limits of confidentiality.
- 2. LSPs and the State are to emphasize improved communication and sharing of knowledge and resources as part of the statewide LSP community for the benefit of all California seniors. This may include regular communication among LSPs via listsery, on phone calls, and at periodic in-person meetings.
- 5. LSPs and a statewide or regional senior legal hotline, if available, will coordinate services with each other to maximize benefits to clients in keeping with local needs and conditions.

F. Ethical Guidelines for Providers

- 1. LSPs must maintain confidentiality in accordance with relevant law and professional codes.
- 2. LSPs must abide by the California Rules of Professional Conduct, the State Bar Act (Cal. Bus. & Prof. Code § 6000, *et seq.*) and any other statutes or canons governing the practice of law or the treatment of confidential information in California.
- 3. LSPs shall develop and make available to the AAAs and the State Legal Services Developer a program policy on conflicts of interest related to outside employment and client representation.
- 4. The LSPs that are agencies of a county government are required to provide or refer to an alternate resource for legal assistance where conflict exists between the client and any agency of the county government.
- 5. LSPs are to exercise all reasonable efforts to avoid conflicts of interest among clients in accordance with the California Rules of Professional Responsibility, and identify alternate sources of legal assistance for clients who cannot be assisted by the provider.
- 6. LSPs are to make the best effort to clearly identify who is the prospective client and to educate the client or prospective client and other interested parties presenting the client's concerns and aging services communities about the potential conflict.

IX. AREA AGENCY ON AGLNG ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

A. General Area Agency on Aging Expectations

AAAs are expected to work with the LSPs to provide leadership on all aging issues in their respective planning and service areas. This leadership will extend to overall planning, advocacy, coordination of services, interagency linkages, information sharing, monitoring, evaluation and support. The AAA will ensure that legal assistance services are incorporated into the area's aging network and ensure that the focus of legal assistance services is consistent with agency identified local goals under the approved area plan.

B. Specific Area Agency on Aging Expectations

With respect to legal assistance, the AAAs are expected to:

- 1. Work collaboratively, on an annual basis (or alternatively just in the 2^{nd} , 3^{rd} , and 4^{th} years of the LSP's contract), to reach concurrence with the LSP on the local legal services needs, issue area priorities and identification of target populations.
- 2. Assure that LSPs are funded as a priority service and that legal assistance services are available throughout the planning and service area, as resources allow, in accordance with the OAA.
- 3. Select through a competitive process the LSP(s) best able to demonstrate the experience and capacity to meet the requirements of federal and state laws and regulations, address local concerns, and fulfill these Guidelines.
- 4. Assure that the primary focus of the LSP is to deliver high quality, high-impact, cost-effective services designed to address the unmet legal needs of vulnerable older people throughout the relevant planning and service area.
- 5. Develop and maintain, in partnership with the State and LSPs, a model monitoring tool for legal assistance services.
- 6. Monitor the program annually to assess compliance with Federal and State laws and regulations and contractual requirements, and to ensure consistency with the Guidelines.
- 7. Ensure that LSPs have a system in place to allow clients to file complaints or grievances about the operation of the legal assistance program, consistent with Section VIII(C)(6) of these Guidelines.

- Develop a model Request for Proposals, in partnership with the State Legal Services Developer, consistent with these Guidelines and adapted to each PSA.
- Consider the quality and not just the quantity of legal services when monitoring and evaluating LSPs and, understand that in certain instances, greater impact can be achieved by serving fewer clients or in fewer hours.

C. Coordination, Training and Support Responsibilities

AAAs will, through the procurement and monitoring processes, ensure that LSPs demonstrate:

- 1. That staff have sufficient professional skills and receive training each year relevant to the subject areas of legal assistance being provided.
- 2. That a method exists to ensure coordination with other legal and non-legal service providers, including but not limited to Ombudsman, HICAP, senior information and assistance, APS, law enforcement, and case management services, within the limits of confidentiality.
- 3. That an outreach plan is developed and implemented.
- 4. That all relevant staff have reviewed and are apprised of agreed upon priority issue areas, target populations, and targeting mechanisms.

D. Ethics and Confidentiality

AAAs are to recognize and respect that LSPs must abide by the California Rules of Professional Conduct, the State Bar Act (Cal. Bus. & Prof. Code, § 6000, et seq.) and any other statutes or canons governing the practice of law or the treatment of confidential information in California. AAAs are to observe and respect attorney-client privilege held by LSPs and their clients. The OAA mandates observation of attorney-client privilege, but it also includes provisions concerning a lawyer's ethical obligations to protect client confidentiality. The legislative history of the act makes clear that this includes any client identifying information. Therefore, AAAs are to respect not just attorney-client privilege but that LSPs have a general ethical duty of confidentiality and may be legally justified in protecting client information.

X. STATE UNIT ON AGING ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

A. General State Expectations

With respect to legal assistance, the State is expected to:

- 1. Develop an Elder Rights Plan, as a part of the State Plan, which will include and delineate a program to provide leadership for expanding the quality and quantity of legal and advocacy assistance in accordance with the program purposes outlined in Section IV. This function should be done in partnership with the AAAs, LSPs, consumers and other elder rights advocates. The State is to provide for a periodic assessment of the legal and advocacy needs of older individuals with respect to elder rights and unmet needs.
- 2. Provide a full-time Legal Services Developer and other personnel sufficient to ensure:
 - a. State leadership in securing and maintaining legal rights of older individuals.
 - b. Capacity for coordin_ation of the provision of legal assistance funded under Title 1118 and other funding sources.
 - c. Technical assistance, training, and supportive functions to AAAs, LSPs, ombudsman, and other appropriate individuals or organizations.
 - d. Regularly convene meetings with AAAs and LSPs.
- 3. Develop a system for monitoring the quality of legal assistance services, in partnership with the AAAs and LSPs. The monitoring system shall be designed in such a way as to protect the confidentiality of clients. Any monitoring shall take both quantity and quality of service into consideration with an understanding that in certain instances, greater impact can be achieved by serving fewer clients.

8. Other Expectations

- 1. The State will work with AAAs to develop a model Request for Proposals for adaptation to each area.
- 2. The State, in conjunction with AAAs and LSPs, will review and update these Guidelines for Legal Services as appropriate and will provide training as needed on the application and implementation of the Guidelines to the AAAs and LSPs.
- 3. The State will sponsor or provide training annually for LSPs.
- 4. The State will ensure that legal representation is provided to any representative of the ombudsman program against whom suit or other legal action is brought or threatened to be brought in connection with the performance of the official duties of the ombudsman. See 42 U.S.C. 30589(9).

Specifications 2 Insurance Requirements for Professional Services

Consultant shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Consultant, its agents, representatives, or employees.

MINIMUM SCOPE AND LIMIT OF INSURANCE

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis for bodily injury and property damage, including products-completed operations, personal injury and advertising injury, with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. **Automobile Liability:** Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Consultant has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limit no less than **\$500,000** per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. **Workers' Compensation** insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than **\$1,000,000** per accident for bodily injury or disease.

(Not required if consultant provides written verification it has no employees)

1. **Professional Liability** (Errors and Omissions) Insurance appropriates to the Consultant's profession, with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence.

If the Consultant maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, the Entity requires and shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by the Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the Entity.

Other Insurance Provisions

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

Additional Insured Status

1. The Entity, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the consultant including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Consultant's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used).

Other Insurance Provisions

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

Primary Coverage

For any claims related to this contract, the **Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary** insurance as respects the Entity, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Entity, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

Notice of Cancellation

Each insurance policy required above shall state that **coverage shall not be** canceled, except with notice to the Entity.

Waiver of Subrogation

Consultant hereby grants to Entity a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Consultant may acquire against the Entity by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Consultant agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Entity has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the Entity. The Entity may require the Consultant to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the Entity.

Claims Made Policies

If any of the required policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis:

- 1. The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- 2. Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
- 3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not *replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Dat*e prior to the contract effective date, the Consultant must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of *five (5)* years after completion of contract work.

Verification of Coverage

Consultant shall furnish the Entity with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Entity before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Consultant's obligation to provide them. The Entity reserves the right to require complete,

certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time.

Subcontractors

Consultant shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein.

Special Risks or Circumstances

Entity reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF BISHOP AND INYO COUNTY HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES FOR PROVISION OF GRANTIN-SUPPORT PROGRAM SERVICES

INTRODUCTION

This Agreement is entered into this <u>1st</u> day of <u>December</u>, by and between the City of Bishop, hereinafter referred to as "City", and Inyo County Health & Human Services Society hereinafter referred to as "Applicant".

WHEREAS, City desires to sponsor and support activities of a cultural, artistic, economic enhancement and educational nature for the benefit of the City's residents and:

WHEREAS, Applicant has requested City funding to conduct a program, service or event to provide the activity described in Attachment A, attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein;

WHEREAS, said program, service or event will be available to City residents as is described in Attachment A, thereby serving a public purpose;

NOW, THEREFORE, City and Applicant, in consideration of the mutual benefits, promises, covenants, terms, and conditions hereinafter contained, do agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. SCOPE OF SERVICES/SUPPORT.

The Applicant will furnish, provide, and conduct the program, service, event, or activity (herein after referred to as "Project") which is described in Attachment A, attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein.

The Applicant will furnish, provide, and conduct such program, service, event, or activity in the manner and by the means set forth in Attachment A, and in a manner consistent with the requirements and standards established by applicable federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, regulations, and resolutions Such laws, ordinances, regulations, and resolutions include, but are not limited to, those which are referred to in this Agreement, including any Attachments thereto.

Applicant agrees to diligently and promptly pursue the completion of the Project, and to complete the Project within seven months from the date of this Agreement.

2. LIMITATIONS ON USE OF FUNDS.

<u>Prohibition against Lobbying and Campaigning</u>. None of the funds provided by the City to Applicant under this Agreement may be used, directly or indirectly, by Applicant, any

of its agents, officers, or employees to lobby any Federal officer or employee, member of Congress, State officer or employee, member of the State Legislature, any officer, employee or member of any governing or advisory body of any local government agency, or special district within the State of California or any other state on any issue whatsoever. Further, none of the funds provided by the City to Applicant under this Agreement may be used, directly or indirectly, by Applicant, any of its agents, officers or employees to campaign for or against any candidate for any federal, state, or local office, or to campaign for or against any measure appearing on any state or local ballot.

3. TERM.

The term of this Agreement shall be from <u>December 1, 2020</u> to <u>June 30, 2021</u> unless sooner terminated as provided below.

4. CONSIDERATION.

- A <u>Compensation</u>. City agrees to pay, as set forth below, a sum not to exceed \$5,000 Dollars, to Applicant for the purpose of funding the aforesaid Project as a community program, service, event, or activity available to the public or which will be a public benefit.
- B. <u>No Additional Consideration</u>. Except as expressly provided in this Agreement, Applicant shall not be entitled to, nor receive, from City, any additional consideration, compensation, salary, wages, or other type of remuneration for services rendered under this Agreement. Specifically, Applicant shall not be entitled, by virtue of this Agreement, to consideration in the form of overtime, health insurance benefits, retirement benefits, disability retirement benefits, sick leave, vacation time, paid holidays, or other paid leaves of absence of any type or kind whatsoever.
- C. <u>Limit Upon Amount Payable Under Agreement</u>. The total sum of all payments made by the City to Applicant under this Agreement shall not exceed \$ 5,000. (hereinafter referred to as "contract limit"). City expressly reserves the right to deny any payment or reimbursement requested by Applicant which is in excess of the contract limit.
- D. <u>Billing and Payment</u>. Payments to Applicant of the sum provided for in this Agreement shall be made in accordance with the following procedure and subject to the following conditions:
- (1) After the City Council has formally adopted the City's final budget for the fiscal year in which funding for this Agreement has been appropriated, the Applicant shall submit to the City an itemized claim for the obligations and expenditures incurred by Applicant which were authorized by the Scope of Work and Budget set forth in Attachment A. No claim shall be submitted or paid under this Agreement until after the City Council adopts the City's final budget. No claim shall be submitted or paid under

this Agreement until after the Applicant actually incurs the obligations or expenditures claimed.

- (2) As allowed in subparagraph (1) above, claims may be submitted anytime after an obligation has been incurred or encumbered; however, the final claim for expense reimbursement must be made no later than three months after the end of the Agreement term. Claims will identify the date on which the obligation, encumbrance, or expenditure was incurred and describe the nature of each encumbrance, obligation or expenditure in sufficient detail so as to establish such encumbrance, obligation, or expenditure was authorized in the Scope of Work and Budget set forth as Attachment A. Applicant must submit evidence (proof) of an expenditure, encumbrance, or obligation when the claim for reimbursement is made. Additionally, it may become necessary for the City Administrator to review the original vouchers or invoices for which the claims are made. The Applicant will submit original invoices upon request by the City Administrator. Upon request by the City Administrator, the original invoices must substantiate each item for which claim is made and shall show the budget category to which each expenditure, encumbrance, or obligation is chargeable.
- (3) Upon receipt of a claim prepared and filed as provided above, the City Administrator shall review said claim. If the claim is properly prepared and substantiated, is for authorized obligations and expenditures incurred by Applicant under the terms of this Agreement, and is otherwise proper and in order for payment, the City Administrator shall, subject to the requirement of subsection 4 below, approve said claim. Upon approval of a claim by the City Administrator, the City shall issue a check made payable to Applicant. Checks will be mailed to the address of the Applicant set forth in paragraph 24.
- (4) Approval of claims by the City Administrator will be contingent upon certification that the Applicant is in full compliance with all the provisions of this Agreement, and all previous Agreements between the City and Applicant under the Grant-In-Support Program, with regard to the requirements for the Applicant to provide the City with reports and other documentation.
- (5) No claim shall be filed or approved which is not prepared and substantiated as provided in this Agreement. Applicant agrees that no obligation shall be incurred by Applicant and no claim shall be prepared or approved which is for obligations and expenditures not actually incurred by the Applicant or which are not authorized under the terms of this Agreement, including but not limited to, the purchase of fixed assets.
- (6) The City Administrator shall make reasonable efforts to pay such claims as are approved as certified provided above, within thirty (30) days after receipt of said claims.
- (7) Applicant shall indemnify and hold City harmless from any liability or damage resulting from any failure to make, withholding, or delay in making payments.

(8) Applicant agrees to abide by all laws, regulations and requirements applicable to the expenditure of City Grant Funds, including, but not limited to, the audit of the expenditure of these funds for compliance with such laws, regulations, and requirements, with all labor laws and regulations pertinent to public funds, and further, to assure compliance with the anti-discrimination provisions of the law, including City Ordinances.

E. <u>Federal and State Taxes.</u>

- (1) Except as provided in subparagraph (2) below, City will not withhold any federal or state income taxes or social security from any payments made by City to Applicant under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- (2) City will withhold California State income taxes from payments made under this Agreement to a non-California resident Applicant when it is anticipated that total annual payments to Applicant under this Agreement will exceed one thousand four hundred ninety-nine dollars (\$1,499.00).
- (3) Except as set forth above, City has no obligation to withhold any taxes or payments from sums paid by City to Applicant under this Agreement. Payment of all taxes and other assessments on such sums is the sole responsibility of Applicant. City has no responsibility or liability for payment of Applicant's taxes or assessments.
- (4) The total amounts paid by City to Applicant, and taxes withheld from payments to a non- California resident if any, will be reported annually to the Internal Revenue Service and the California State Franchise Tax Board. To facilitate this reporting, Applicant shall complete and submit to the City an Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Form W-9 upon executing this Agreement.

5. REQUIRED LICENSES, CERTIFICATES, AND PERMITS.

A. Any licenses, certificates, or permits required by the federal, state, County, or municipal governments for Applicant to conduct the Project described in this Agreement must be procured by Applicant and be valid at the time Applicant enters into this Agreement or as otherwise may be required. Further, during the term of this Agreement, Applicant must maintain such licenses, certificates, and permits in full force and effect. Licenses, certificates, and permits may include, but are not limited to, driver's license, professional licenses or certificates, and business licenses. Such licenses, certificates, and permits will be procured and maintained in force by Applicant at no expense to the City. Applicant will provide City, upon execution of this Agreement, with evidence of current and valid licenses, certificates and permits which are required to conduct the Project identified in Attachment A. Where there is a dispute between Applicant and City as to what licenses, certificates, and permits are required to conduct the Project identified in Attachment A, City reserves the right to make such determinations for purposes of this Agreement.

B. Applicant warrants that it is not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in covered transactions by any federal department or agency. Applicant also warrants that it is not suspended or debarred from receiving federal funds as listed in the List of Parties Excluded from Federal Procurement or Non-procurement Programs issued by the General Services Administration available at: http://www.sam.gov.

6. OFFICE SPACE, SUPPLIES, EQUIPMENT, ETC.

Applicant shall provide such office space, supplies, equipment, vehicles, reference materials, and telephone service as is necessary for Applicant to conduct the Project identified in Attachment A to this Agreement. Unless expressly provided for the Scope of Work and Budget (Attachment A), City is not obligated to reimburse or pay Applicant for any expense or cost incurred by Applicant in procuring or maintaining such items. Unless expressly provided in the Scope of Work and Budget (Attachment A), responsibility for the costs and expenses incurred by Applicant in providing and maintaining such items is the sole responsibility and obligation of Applicant. Any supplies, equipment, vehicles, materials, etc., paid for by City under this Agreement are the personal property of City.

7. CITY PROPERTY.

- A. <u>Personal Property of City</u>. Any personal property such as, but not limited to, protective or safety devices, badges, identification cards, keys, etc. provided to Applicant by City pursuant to this Agreement are, and at the termination of this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of City. Applicant will use reasonable care to protect, safeguard and maintain such items while they are in Applicant's possession. Applicant will be financially responsible for any loss or damage to such items, partial or total, which is the result of Applicant's negligence.
- B. Products of Applicant's Work and Services. Any and all compositions, publications, plans, designs, specifications, blueprints, maps, formulas, processes, photographs, slides, video tapes, computer programs, computer disks, computer tapes, memory chips, soundtracks, audio recordings, films, audio-visual presentations, exhibits, reports, studies, works of art, inventions, patents, trademarks, copyrights, or intellectual properties of any kind which are created, produced, assembled, compiled by, or are the result, product, or manifestation of, Applicant's services or work under this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of the City. At the termination of the Agreement, Applicant will convey possession and title to all such properties to City.

8. STATUS OF APPLICANT.

All acts of Applicant, its agents, officers, employees, and volunteers, relating to the performance of this Agreement, shall be performed as independent Applicants, and not as agents, officers, or employees of City.

Applicant, by virtue of this Agreement, has no authority to bind or incur any obligation on behalf of City. Except as expressly provided in Attachment A, Applicant has no authority or responsibility to exercise any rights or power vested in the City. No agent, officer, or employee of the Applicant is to be considered an employee of City. It is understood by both Applicant and City that this Agreement shall not under any circumstances be construed or considered to create an employer-employee relationship or a joint venture. As an independent Applicant:

- A. Applicant shall determine the method, details, and means of conducting the Project described in Attachment A.
- B. Applicant shall be responsible to City only for the requirements and results specified in this Agreement, and except as expressly provided in this Agreement, shall not be subjected to City's control with respect to the physical action or activities of Applicant in fulfillment of this Agreement.
- C. Applicant, its agents, officers, employees, and volunteers are, and at all times during the term of this Agreement shall, represent and conduct themselves as independent Applicant, and not as employees of City.

10. INDEMNIFICATION.

Applicant shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the CITY, and its officers, employees and agents, from and against any and all causes of action, claims, liabilities, obligations, judgments, or damages, including reasonable legal counsels' fees and costs of litigation ("claims"), arising out of the APPLICANT's performance of its obligations under this AGREEMENT or out of the operations conducted by APPLICANT, including the CITY's active or passive negligence, except for such loss or damage arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the CITY. In the event the CITY indemnitees are made a party to any action, lawsuit, or other adversarial proceeding arising from APPLICANT's performance of this AGREEMENT, the APPLICANT shall provide a defense to the CITY indemnitees or at the CITY's option, reimburse the CITY indemnities their costs of defense, including reasonable legal fees, incurred in defense of such claims.

Payment by CITY is not a condition precedent to enforcement of this indemnity. In the event of any dispute between APPLICANT and CITY, as to whether liability arises from the sole negligence of the CITY or its officers, employees, or agents, APPLICANT will be obligated to pay for CITY's defense until such time as a final judgment has been entered adjudicating the CITY as solely negligent. APPLICANT will not be entitled in the absence of such a determination to any reimbursement of defense costs including but not limited to attorney's fees, expert fees and costs of litigation.

11. NON-LIABILITY OF CITY OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

No officer or employee of CITY will be personally liable to APPLICANT, in the event of any default or breach by the CITY or for any amount that may become due to APPLICANT.

12. INSURANCE

Without limiting APPLICANT's indemnification of CITY, and prior to commencement of Work, APPLICANT shall obtain, provide and maintain at its own expense during the term of this AGREEMENT, policies of insurance of the type and amounts described below and in a form that is satisfactory to CITY.

General liability insurance. APPLICANT shall maintain commercial general liability insurance with coverage at least as broad as Insurance Services Office form CG 00 01, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 general aggregate, for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage. The policy must include contractual liability that has not been amended. Any endorsement restricting standard ISO "insured contract" language will not be accepted.

Automobile liability insurance. APPLICANT shall maintain automobile insurance at least as broad as Insurance Services Office form CA 00 01 covering bodily injury and property damage for all activities of the APPLICANT arising out of or in connection with Work to be performed under this AGREEMENT, including coverage for any owned, hired, non-owned or rented vehicles, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each accident.

Umbrella or excess liability insurance. APPLICANT shall obtain and maintain an umbrella or excess liability insurance policy with limits that will provide bodily injury, personal injury and property damage liability coverage at least as broad as the primary coverages set forth above, including commercial general liability, automobile liability, and employer's liability. Such policy or policies shall include the following terms and conditions:

- A drop down feature requiring the policy to respond if any primary insurance that would otherwise have applied proves to be uncollectible in whole or in part for any reason;
- Pay on behalf of wording as opposed to reimbursement;
- Concurrency of effective dates with primary policies;
- Policies shall "follow form" to the underlying primary policies; and
- Insureds under primary policies shall also be insureds under the umbrella or excess policies.

Workers' compensation insurance. APPLICANT shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance (Statutory Limits) and Employer's Liability Insurance (with limits of at least \$1,000,000).

APPLICANT shall submit to CITY, along with the certificate of insurance, a Waiver of Subrogation endorsement in favor of CITY, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers.

Other provisions or requirements

Proof of insurance. APPLICANT shall provide certificates of insurance to CITY as evidence of the insurance coverage required herein, along with a waiver of subrogation endorsement for workers' compensation. Insurance certificates and endorsements must be approved by CITY's Risk Manager prior to commencement of performance. Current certification of insurance shall be kept on file with CITY at all times during the term of this contract. CITY reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, at any time.

Duration of coverage. APPLICANT shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property, which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the Work hereunder by APPLICANT, his agents, representatives, employees or subconsultants.

Primary/noncontributing. Coverage provided by APPLICANT shall be primary and any insurance or self-insurance procured or maintained by CITY shall not be required to contribute with it. The limits of insurance required herein may be satisfied by a combination of primary and umbrella or excess insurance. Any umbrella or excess insurance shall contain or be endorsed to contain a provision that such coverage shall also apply on a primary and non-contributory basis for the benefit of CITY before the CITY's own insurance or self-insurance shall be called upon to protect it as a named insured.

City's rights of enforcement. In the event any policy of insurance required under this AGREEMENT does not comply with these specifications or is canceled and not replaced, CITY has the right but not the duty to obtain the insurance it deems necessary and any premium paid by CITY will be promptly reimbursed by APPLICANT or CITY will withhold amounts sufficient to pay premium from APPLICANT payments. In the alternative, CITY may cancel this AGREEMENT.

Acceptable insurers. All insurance policies shall be issued by an insurance company currently authorized by the Insurance Commissioner to transact business of insurance or is on the List of Approved Surplus Line Insurers in the State of California, with an assigned policyholders' Rating of A- (or higher) and Financial Size Category Class VII (or larger) in accordance with the latest edition of Best's Key Rating Guide, unless otherwise approved by the CITY's Risk Manager.

Waiver of subrogation. All insurance coverage maintained or procured pursuant to this AGREEMENT shall be endorsed to waive subrogation against CITY, its elected or appointed officers, agents, officials, employees and volunteers or shall specifically allow APPLICANT or others providing insurance evidence in compliance with these

specifications to waive their right of recovery prior to a loss. APPLICANT hereby waives its own right of recovery against CITY, and shall require similar written express waivers and insurance clauses from each of its subconsultants.

Enforcement of contract provisions (non estoppel). APPLICANT acknowledges and agrees that any actual or alleged failure on the part of the CITY to inform APPLICANT of non-compliance with any requirement imposes no additional obligations on the CITY nor does it waive any rights hereunder.

Requirements not limiting. Requirements of specific coverage features or limits contained in this Section are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits or other requirements, or a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. Specific reference to a given coverage feature is for purposes of clarification only as it pertains to a given issue and is not intended by any party or insured to be all inclusive, or to the exclusion of other coverage, or a waiver of any type. If the APPLICANT maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, the CITY requires and shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by the APPLICANT. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the CITY.

Notice of cancellation. APPLICANT agrees to oblige its insurance agent or broker and insurers to provide to CITY with a thirty (30) day notice of cancellation (except for nonpayment for which a ten (10) day notice is required) or nonrenewal of coverage for each required coverage.

Additional insured status. General liability policies shall provide or be endorsed to provide that CITY and its officers, officials, employees, and agents shall be additional insureds under such policies. This provision shall also apply to any excess/umbrella liability policies.

Prohibition of undisclosed coverage limitations. None of the coverages required herein will be in compliance with these requirements if they include any limiting endorsement of any kind that has not been first submitted to CITY and approved of in writing.

Separation of insureds. A severability of interests provision must apply for all additional insureds ensuring that APPLICANT's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the insurer's limits of liability. The policy(ies) shall not contain any cross-liability exclusions.

Pass through clause. APPLICANT agrees to ensure that its sub-consultants, sub-contractors, and any other party involved with the project who is brought onto or involved in the project by APPLICANT, provide the same minimum insurance coverage and endorsements required of APPLICANT. APPLICANT agrees to monitor and review all such coverage and assumes all responsibility for ensuring that such coverage is provided in conformity with the requirements of this section. APPLICANT agrees that

upon request, all AGREEMENTS with consultants, subcontractors, and others engaged in the project will be submitted to CITY for review.

City's right to revise specifications. The CITY reserves the right at any time during the term of the contract to change the amounts and types of insurance required by giving the APPLICANT ninety (90) days advance written notice of such change. If such change results in substantial additional cost to the APPLICANT, the CITY and APPLICANT may renegotiate APPLICANT's compensation.

Self-insured retentions. Any self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by CITY. CITY reserves the right to require that self-insured retentions be eliminated, lowered, or replaced by a deductible. Self-insurance will not be considered to comply with these specifications unless approved by CITY.

Timely notice of claims. APPLICANT shall give CITY prompt and timely notice of claims made or suits instituted that arise out of or result from APPLICANT's performance under this AGREEMENT, and that involve or may involve coverage under any of the required liability policies.

Additional insurance. APPLICANT shall also procure and maintain, at its own cost and expense, any additional kinds of insurance, which in its own judgment may be necessary for its proper protection and prosecution of the Work.

13. SUBCONTRACTORS

Before APPLICANT retains or hires a subcontractor to provide any work, labor, or services relative to this AGREEMENT, APPLICANT must:

- A. Present the name and identifying information of the subcontractor that will provide any work, labor, or services to CITY;
- B. Present to the CITY the form of subcontract that will be used with the subcontractor for CITY's approval, which approval will not be unreasonably withheld. Such subcontract AGREEMENT must include an indemnity agreement that is generally in accord with the indemnity obligations contained in Paragraph 13 of this AGREEMENT and must specifically name the CITY as an indemnified party; and
- C. Secure from the subcontractor evidence of insurance coverage that meets with this AGREEMENT including naming the CITY as an additional insured as required by this AGREEMENT, unless such requirement is waived in writing by the CITY Risk Manager as provided in Paragraph 17 below.

14. RECORDS AND AUDIT.

A. <u>Records</u>. Applicant shall prepare and maintain all records required by the various provisions of this Agreement, federal, state, and municipal law, ordinances,

regulations, and directions. Applicant shall maintain these records for a minimum of four (4) years from the termination or completion of this Agreement. Applicant may fulfill its obligation to maintain records as required by this paragraph by substitute photographs, microphotographs, or other authentic reproduction of such records.

- B. <u>Inspections and Audits</u>. Any authorized representative of City shall have access to any books, documents, papers, records, including, but not limited to, financial records of Applicant, which City determines to be pertinent to this Agreement, for the purposes of making audit, evaluation, examination, excerpts, and transcripts during the period such records are to be maintained by Applicant. Further, City has the right, at all reasonable times, to audit, inspect, or otherwise evaluate the work performed or being performed under this Agreement and further, to submit to the City Administrative Officer a written report upon completion of the Project detailing the record of expenditures under this Agreement.
- C. <u>Records</u>. Applicant agrees to provide to the Bishop City Council a mid-year progress report as well as a final year-end report. Both the mid-year and final reports will provide the information set forth in the GIS Program Report Format Guidelines.

15. SUBMISSION OF BUDGET - BUDGET ACCOUNTABILITY.

Prior to the execution of this Agreement by City, Applicant shall submit to the City's GIS Program and to City's Auditor/Controller, for their review and approval, a Scope of Work and Budget showing Applicant's proposed expenditures in conducting the Project and containing a breakdown of said expenditures by major categories and sub-categories. Said budget shall be a part of Attachment A. Applicant shall not obligate or expend funds for purposes other than those shown in the approved Scope of Work and Budget which is attached to this Agreement as Attachment A.

16. NONDISCRIMINATION.

During the performance of this Agreement, Applicant, its agents, officers, employees, and volunteers shall not unlawfully discriminate in violation of any federal, state, or local law, against any employee, or applicant for employment, or person receiving services under this Agreement, because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, age, or sex. Applicant and its agents, officers, employees, and volunteers shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code section 12900, et seq.), and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder in the California Code of Regulations. Applicant shall also abide by the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) and all amendments thereto, and all administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to said act.

17. ASSIGNMENT.

This is an agreement for the services of Applicant. City has relied upon the skills, knowledge, experience, and training of Applicant as an inducement to enter into this Agreement. Applicant shall not assign or subcontract this Agreement, or any part of it, without the express written consent of City. Further, Applicant shall not assign any monies due or to become due under this Agreement without the prior written consent of City.

18. DEFAULT.

If the Applicant abandons the Project, or fails to proceed with the Project in a timely manner, or fails in any way as required to conduct the Project as required, City may declare the Applicant in default and terminate this Agreement upon five (5) days written notice to Applicant. Upon such termination City will pay to Applicant all sums owed it for services and work authorized in the Scope of Work and Budget (Attachment A) which were satisfactorily performed before the date of termination.

19. WAIVER OF DEFAULT.

Waiver of any default by either party to this Agreement shall not be deemed to be waiver of any subsequent default. Waiver or breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach, and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement unless this Agreement is modified as provided in paragraph twenty-three (23) below.

20. CONFIDENTIALITY.

Applicant further agrees to comply with the various provisions of the federal, state, and City laws, regulations, and ordinances providing that information and records kept, maintained, or accessible by Applicant in the course of providing services and work under this Agreement, shall be privileged, restricted, or confidential. Applicant agrees to keep confidential all such information and records. Disclosure of such confidential, privileged, or protected information shall be made by Applicant only with the express written consent of the City. Any disclosure of confidential information by Applicant without the City's written consent is solely and exclusively the legal responsibility of Applicant in all respects.

21. CONFLICTS.

Applicant agrees that it has no interest, and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with its performance of the Project as described in this Agreement. Additionally, the Applicant, during the term of this Agreement, agrees not to advise or represent any person, corporation, or entity with a claim or cause of action against the City of Bishop, its officers, agents or employees, and Applicant agrees not to file, maintain, or assist in any way with new or existing litigation against the City, its officers, agents, or employees.

22. POST AGREEMENT COVENANT.

Applicant agrees not to use any confidential, protected, or privileged information which is gained from the City under this Agreement, for any personal benefit, gain, or enhancement. Further, Applicant agrees for a period of two years after the termination of this Agreement, not to seek or accept any employment with any entity, association, corporation, or person who, during the term of this Agreement, has had an adverse or conflicting interest with the City, and concerning such, Applicant by virtue of this Agreement has gained access to the City's confidential, privileged, protected, or proprietary information.

23. SEVERABILITY.

If any portion of this Agreement or application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, or if it is found in contravention of any federal, state, or City statute, ordinance, or regulation, the remaining provisions of this Agreement, or the application thereof, shall not be invalidated thereby, and shall remain in full force and effect to the extent that the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

24. FUNDING LIMITATION.

The ability of City to enter this Agreement is based upon available funding from various sources. In the event that such funding fails, is reduced, or is modified, from one or more sources, City has the option to cancel, reduce, or modify this Agreement, or any of its terms within ten (10) days of its notifying Applicant of the cancellation, reduction, or modification of available funding. Any reduction or modification of this Agreement made pursuant to this provision must comply with the requirements of paragraph twenty¬ three (23 Amendment).

25. AMENDMENT.

This Agreement may be modified, amended, changed, added to, or subtracted from, by the mutual consent of the parties hereto, if such amendment or change is in written form and executed with the same formalities as this Agreement, and attached to the original Agreement to maintain continuity.

26. NOTICE.

Any notice, communication, amendments, additions, or deletions to this Agreement, including change of address of either party during the terms of this Agreement, which Applicant or City shall be required, or may desire, to make, shall be in writing and may be personally served, or sent by prepaid first class mail to, the respective parties as follows:

27. ENTIRE AGREEMENT.

Further, no term or provision hereof may be changed, waived, discharged, or terminated, unless the same be in writing executed by the parties hereto.

Dear Council Members:

For almost three decades, the Inyo County Board of Supervisors has been ensuring the provision of comprehensive services for our local senior citizens through the Eastern Sierra Area Agency on Aging (ESAAA) programs. Again, in Fiscal Year 2020-2021, the Inyo Board has committed close to \$500,000 from local county discretionary funds to keep those services maintained.

Federal and State allocations for ESAAA programs have not significantly increased in several years. Costs continue to increase. Our local population, like that of the nation as a whole, is aging, so our need for services to our older adult population likely will increase. A critical priority for aging adults is the assurance of basic food and nutrition. This most basic need often exists in a context of other insecurities for our elders:

- "Will the small, fixed retirement income continue to be sufficient to meet my needs?"
- "My needs for companionship often are met with my one small pet, although that companionship is accompanied with related costs; will I have to choose between my own basic needs and those of my one steady companion?"

ESAAA's nutrition programs were intended to meet basic food needs, and -- through congregate meal sites such as the Bishop Senior Center -- were also intended to provide companionship and socialization. Home-delivered meals were designed for those who have moved down the aging continuum and are no longer able to participate in meals at a congregate site, but continue to have basic nutrition needs.

Here are some facts to help you see what has been happening with the nutrition programs for our Bishop area senior citizens, aged 60 and above.

FACTS

- In the fiscal year (19/20), two hundred and twelve (212) unduplicated adults, aged 60 and over, were provided with 10,004 meals in a congregate setting at the Bishop Senior Center. The Bishop Senior Center served approximately 59% of all Inyo County seniors who participated in congregate meals.
- Another one hundred thirty-nine (139) older adults in the greater Bishop area were provided with 19,643 home-delivered meals during the same twelve months. This is a substantial increase from the previous year due to COVID-19.
- We saw a large increase in meal requests due to COVID-19.

For your budget year 2020/2021, please consider partnering with the Inyo County Board of Supervisors in the provision of home-delivered and/or congregate meals out of the Bishop Senior Center with a donation to the program.

SUBJECT: Proposed operational changes to the Independence and Lone Pine landfills.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Request Board approve operational changes at the Independence and Lone Pine landfills, including:

- A) Adding two, forty-yard bins at the Independence landfill for household trash, and maintain the current operating hours and days;
- B) Changing Lone Pine Landfill hours to be open Thursday through Monday from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm, adding Thursday and Sunday to the current operating schedule; and
- C) Finding no subsequent or supplemental environmental review or further documentation is required pursuant to PRC 21166 and 14 CCR 15162 since the proposed operational adjustments are within the parameters of the applicable solid waste facility permits that were subject to prior CEQA review (separate negative declarations addressing each landfill and a CEQA addendum which addressed both landfills) and do not involve new significant environmental effects or a substantial increase in the severity of any previously identified significant effects because:
- 1. no substantial changes are proposed to the project; the proposed changes in daily operations are permitted in the existing SWFPs for the two landfills;
 - 2. no substantial changes in circumstances under which the project is being undertaken have occurred; and
- 3. no new information that was not known at the time of the preparation of the previous CEQA documentation has become available.

SUMMARY/JUSTIFICATION:

Inyo County Recycling and Solid Waste staff is recommending operational changes at the two South-County landfills to mitigate recurring problems including exceeding daily tonnage limits, illegal dumping, and blowing trash. These changes are within the parameters of the County's existing landfill permits.

Background Information:

Currently, Independence Landfill is open 2 days a week on Thursday and Sunday and the Lone Pine Landfill is open 3 days a week on Friday, Saturday and Monday. These landfills accept household trash; construction and demolition debris; chipable wood; dead animals; and various recyclable materials. The Recycling and Waste Management Department is currently required to maintain daily tonnage limits not to exceed 10 tons per day at the Independence landfill and 22 tons per day at the Lone Pine landfill. Permit revisions were submitted in 2014

to increase the Daily limits at both the Independence and Lone Pine Landfills but the permit was never fully executed. Since then, LADWP has declined to approve any revisions as the land owner. Consequently, the solid waste program is regularly forced to choose between going over tonnage limits and turning customers away. Although exceeding limits yields citations, turning people away increases illegal dumping on our beautiful landscape, including on LADWP owned lands. So while our previously requested permit revisions to increase daily tonnage limits remain pending, these interim operational changes will improve service, reduce blown trash and reduce occurrences of exceeding the daily tonnage.

Independence Landfill:

Staff recommends placing two, forty-yard, roll off containers with lids at the Independence landfill for household trash and green waste. Currently, all the waste that Independence Landfill receives is compacted and covered on site. The self-haul Household Trash and Green Waste average 4 tons per day, representing 40% of our daily allowed tonnage. The contents of the containers will be dumped on site on days when there is tonnage capacity. Historically, tonnage limits are exceeded on Thursdays when the Lone Pine Landfill is closed and the commercial waste haulers are forced to dump in Independence. If these expanded hours are approved, Lone Pine will be open on Thursdays giving the commercial haulers the option of dumping in Lone Pine thereby reducing the risk of going over limits on any given day. These changes will allow the County to maintain the same service level for our customers while helping the landfill to stay within its permitted daily tonnage limits. The bins will be covered as necessary to prevent trash from blowing out, and to stop birds and other animals from digging in the trash.

Additionally, removing the daily disposal of household trash and green waste at the landfill will reduce the need for a full time equipment operator at that location because household trash and green waste must be compacted and covered daily, while construction and demolition debris does not. The landfill operator will maintain the Construction and Demolition Debris pile and perform other operator duties only on the days he/she empties bins. Also, not having to compact and cover household trash and green waste on a daily basis will take away the need to push up and haul dirt from the pit to the active face will save on fuel, maintenance and labor.

Independence Landfill will remain open on Thursday and Sunday every week with the same operating hours, thus having no impact to the public.

Lone Pine Landfill:

Staff recommends changing the operating schedule at the Lone Pine landfill by opening two additional days per week. If approved, the landfill will be open Thursday through Monday each week from 7:00 am to 3:00 pm. In addition to better serving the community, adding days of operation is expected to reduce daily tonnage. Another benefit is that people will be less tempted to unlawfully dump trash if the landfill is open on these additional days.

The additional days will also allow us to work with contracted waste haulers on schedules that will reduce the likelihood of going over the allowed daily tonnage. Another benefit is that the expanded hours will give us the opportunity to more efficiently utilize staff and resources. For example, while current regulations require the covering of household trash at the end of every shift, alternative daily cover or a tarp may be used as long as the active face is utilized within 24hrs. With the new schedule, tarps can be utilized, cutting the daily cover usage by 50% by eliminating six inches of cover between daily layers. Consequently, it is anticipated that no additional staff will be required to execute these changes.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY OF BOARD ACTIONS:

In 2014, landfill hours were reduced in an effort to obtain necessary budget savings at that time. The program has sufficiently recovered and the proposed operational efficiencies make this plan executable and affordable.

ALTERNATIVES AND CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Status quo could be maintained.

SUBJECT: Ordinance Amending Inyo County Code Section 2.30.050, Which Defines the Veterans Service

Function

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Request Board: A) read title and waive further reading of a proposed ordinance titled, "An Ordinance of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Inyo, State of California, Amending Section 2.30.050 of the Inyo County Code, Pertaining to the Qualifications, Appointment, and Compensation of the Veterans Service Officer;" and B) set enactment for 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, December 15, 2020 in the Board of Supervisors Chambers, County Administrative Center, Independence.

SUMMARY/JUSTIFICATION:

After consultation between the Sheriff and County Administrator, it has been determined that a Veterans Service Representative is not currently adequate to meet the needs of our veteran community. The matter was discussed with the Board of Supervisors at its December 1 meeting and your Board concurred with the Sheriff and County Administrator that a full-time Veterans Service Officer position would better meet the needs of Inyo and Mono County Veterans. As discussed at the meeting, the position will allow for a higher level of responsibility and ability to act more independently which allows for a higher level of service.

In support of the full-time Veterans Service Officer proposal, the Board on December 1 approved the job description for the position and a change in the authorized strength of the Sheriff's Department, and authorized the open recruitment and hiring of a full-time Veterans Service Officer at Range 78.

The Board also directed staff to bring forward for approval an ordinance to amend Inyo County Code Section 2.30.050, pertaining to the qualifications, appointment, and compensation of the Veterans Service Officer. That ordinance (attached) will be presented at today's meeting for your Board's consideration. The Board is asked to waive the first reading of the ordinance and set enactment for its December 15 meeting.

Among other things, the ordinance provides for a full time Veterans Service Officer as opposed to providing a Veterans Service Officer stipend, for the Board to appoint the Veterans Service Officer, as is currently the case, and while leaving the position in the Sheriff's Department, providing for the Board or its designee to provide administrative support and direction. The ordinance also maintains the requirement (consistent with state law) that the Veterans Service Officer be a "veteran" as defined by Section 980 of the Military and Veterans Code.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF INYO, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 2.30.050 OF THE INYO COUNTY CODE, PERTAINING TO THE QUALIFICATIONS, APPOINTMENT, AND COMPENSATION OF THE VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER

WHEREAS, Section 970(a) of the California Military and Veterans Code provides that the "board of supervisors of each county may, but is not required to, appoint, prescribe the qualifications of, and fix the compensation of an officer to be titled 'county veterans service officer;" and

WHEREAS, Inyo County has a veterans service officer, as described more fully in Chapter 2.30 of the Inyo County Code; and

WHEREAS, the Board wishes to modify certain details of the position's appointment, qualifications, and compensation (set forth in Section 2.30.050 of the Inyo County Code);

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Inyo ordains as follows:

SECTION I: Section 2.30.050 of the Inyo County Code is amended in its entirety to read as follows:

- "A. Any person appointed as the veterans service officer shall have the following qualifications:
 - 1. Shall be a veteran as defined by Section 980 of the Military and Veterans Code;
- 2. Be or become a full-time permanent employee of the Inyo County sheriff's department.
- B. The veterans service officer shall be appointed by (and report to) the board of supervisors or its designee.
- C. The veterans service officer's duties shall be those set forth in Military and Veterans Code Section 970 et seq., and the ordinance codified in this section."

SECTION II: EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after its adoption. Before the expiration of fifteen (15) days from the adoption hereof, this Ordinance shall be published as required by Government Code Section 25124. The Clerk of the Board is hereby instructed and ordered to so publish this Ordinance together with the names of the Board members voting for and against same.

SUBJECT: Ordinance Amending Sections 5.40.090, 5.40.100 and 5.40.150 of the Inyo County Code.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Request Board: A) read title and waive further reading of a proposed ordinance titled, "An Ordinance of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Inyo, State of California, Amending Sections 5.40.090, 5.40.100, and 5.40.150 of the Inyo County Code, Pertaining to Commercial Cannabis Business Licenses;" B) schedule enactment for 10:30 a.m. on January 5, 2020, in the Board of Supervisors Chambers, County Administrative Center, Independence; and C) discuss modification of fees and provide direction to staff regarding same.

SUMMARY/JUSTIFICATION:

Staff is recommending changes to the Inyo County Code associated with commercial cannabis licensing. The three specific code subsections include 5.40.090(J), 5.40.100(B) and 5.40.150(B). The suggested edit to 5.40.090(J) is to increase the allotted amount of time to meet license conditions to twelve months from the existing six months. Subsection 5.40.100(B) has suggested language added that would allow for a 60 day grace period for late license renewal payments with an associated late fee. Subsection 5.40.150(B) changes include the correction of a minor typo and added language that removes the ability to appeal a revocation for the reason of nonpayment of fees.

The current requirement to meet conditions within six months has not been tenable for most licensees. Extending this requirement to twelve months, with the existing option of another six month extension granted by the commercial cannabis permitting office will allow licensees a more practicable timeline for meeting conditions.

The current incarnation of the code requires commercial cannabis business licenses to be revoked if payment is not made on or before June 30 of each year. Staff spends weeks of time tracking down licensees each year who have not responded to first and second invoices for payment. Typically, licensees in this category ask for an extension for payment. The current code does not allow for such an extension, which immediately triggers a revocation letter.

In addition to this issue, current code allows for an appeal of the revocation due to nonpayment of fees. This requires staff to then proceed through the appeal process where the only manner by which the revocation would be overturned is if the licensee can prove they did pay the fees. This process has resulted in licensees using the appeal process to effectively delay their renewal payments, which also results in significant staff time being spent on an appeal.

Staff would also like to discuss possible adjustments to the existing fee structure and obtain direction from the Board regarding same.

BACKGROUND/HISTORY OF BOARD ACTIONS:

Inyo County implemented a commercial cannabis business licensing program by ordinance in January of 2018 following statewide and county referendums allowing commercial cannabis activity. Inyo County Code was altered to add Chapter 5.40 which included the process by which a commercial cannabis business license is acquired and maintained.

Since this time, several changes have been made to Chapter 5.40 with the goal of improving this chapter. The changes requested in the ordinance before your board today are intended to add additional time to meet the conditions of the license as well as allow for late renewal payments with a penalty and remove nonpayment of fees as a valid reason to request an appeal associated with the revocation of a commercial cannabis business license. Currently, if renewal fees are not paid by June 30 of each year licenses are revoked immediately.

ALTERNATIVES AND CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

Your board could decide to not alter the current code associated with commercial cannabis licensing. Staff believes that these changes would streamline the current process and remove certain ongoing issues. If the code remains as it is staff expects these issues to continue.

OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT:

FINANCING:

If passed, this ordinance would have no significant negative impacts on the cannabis budget. It is expected that the passing of this ordinance would reduce staff time and resources expended over time.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF INYO, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTIONS 5.40.090, 5.40.100, AND 5.40.150 OF THE INYO COUNTY CODE, PERTAINING TO COMMERCIAL CANNABIS BUSINESS LICENSES

WHEREAS, Inyo County previously established commercial cannabis business license regulations via adoption of Inyo County Code Chapter 5.40; and

WHEREAS, now that the regulations have been in place for some time, staff recommends making minor adjustments to certain existing appeal and fee provisions; and

WHEREAS, the Board wishes to implement those recommended adjustments.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Inyo ordains as follows:

SECTION I: Subsection 5.40.090. J is replaced in its entirety as follows:

"J. Commercial cannabis business licenses shall be conditionally issued contingent on applicant obtaining all applicable permits and licenses required by the county and/or state of California, and presenting same to the C3PO, within twelve months of issuance of a commercial cannabis business licenses. Commercial cannabis business licenses shall be void if the applicable state license(s) or permit(s), or local land use approvals, are not presented to the C3PO within twelve months unless the C3PO agrees, in writing, to extend to deadline for obtaining and submitting the state permit(s) or license(s) for a period not to exceed an additional six months. Any additional extension shall require the approval of the board of supervisors."

SECTION II: Subsection 5.40.100.B is replaced in its entirety as follows:

"B. The Board of Supervisors may enact fees as may be necessary to recover the county's costs of inspection, enforcement, and corrective actions in relation to the commercial cannabis business license. The Board of Supervisors may enact a penalty for a late payment of any required fees, but in no event shall a license holder be granted more than 60 calendar days beyond the originally set deadline to pay the required fee, and late payments, in full. For purposes of this section, a payment is made when it is physically tendered to the County or if it is mailed to the County with a postmark dated on or before the deadline."

SECTION III: Subsection 5.40.150.B is replaced in its entirety as follows:

"B. Any commercial cannabis business license holder aggrieved by any decision of the C3PO with respect to the revocation of a commercial cannabis business license shall, within ten business days, make application in writing to the county

administrative officer, or designee, for a hearing on the decision before the board of supervisors. A license revocation for failing to pay a fee shall not be appealable unless the Applicant alleges the fee was actually paid in a timely manner."

SECTION IV: Subsection 5.40.150.E is replaced in its entirety as follows:

"E. At the hearing, the applicant may appear and offer evidence why such decision should be vacated. Within sixty calendar days after the hearing, the county administrative officer, or designee, or the Board of Supervisors in the instance of an appeal revoking a license, shall determine if the decision shall be upheld and shall thereafter give written notice to the applicant. The decision of the county administrative officer, or designee, or Board of Supervisors, shall be final and not subject to further administrative appeal."

SECTION V: EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect thirty (30) days after its adoption. Before the expiration of fifteen (15) days from the adoption hereof, this Ordinance shall be published as required by Government Code Section 25124. The Clerk of the Board is hereby instructed and ordered to so publish this Ordinance together with the names of the Board members voting for and against same.

15-DAY NOTICE TO ALL INTERESTED AND AFFECTED PARTIES:

This is to provide notice that the regulatory action relative to amending sections 3.00, 4.00, 5.00, 5.41, 5.85, 7.00, 7.50, 8.10, and adding sections 5.84, 5.89, 7.40, identified in Title 14, California Code of Regulations, which first appeared in the California Regulatory Notice Register on July 7, 2020; relating to Simplification of Statewide Inland Sport Fishing Regulations was adopted on October 14, 2020.

Additional Option for the Truckee River

The original rulemaking proposal included two options for the Truckee River: one proposed by California Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) and one proposed by a member of the public. At the August 19-20, 2020 discussion hearing, Commission staff announced to the Commission that representatives of the Department of Fish and Wildlife, Commission staff, and Montna Farms had reached a compromise using the two options, and "no change" language. This new alternative was described in detail to the Commission at its August 20, 2020 meeting. Further, in written staff summary materials for the October 14, 2020 adoption hearing and provided 15 days before the meeting, Commission staff indicated that it supported incorporation of the compromise into the final regulation.

When the compromise was introduced to the Commission, it was embodied in a written staff summary as: "Since the notice hearing, DFW staff, FGC staff, and representatives of Montna Farms have met in an effort to identify a compromise between the two options that protects trout while also retaining opportunity; all support a zero bag limit from the confluence of Trout Creek downstream to the mouth of Prosser Creek and a two fish bag limit from the mouth of Prosser Creek downstream to the Nevada state line for part of the year, using particular artificial gear."

Likewise, the compromise was verbally summarized to the Commission as: "...a zero-bag limit from the confluence of trout Creek downstream to the mouth of Prosser Creek, and a two fish bag limit for at least part of the year from the mouth of Prosser Creek to the Nevada State line. And there are certain gear restrictions that are associated with each of those waters."

During public comment George Osborn, a party to the compromise negotiations speaking on

behalf of Montna Farms, expanded on the compromise thusly: "Under the compromise there is no take all year, [and] barbless flies were required for the entire stretch. Under the existing regulations there is a two fish daily bag limit in the summer and barbless flies are required for only a portion of this stretch. For the stretch of river between Prosser Creek and [the Nevada] state line. The compromise retains the existing requirement for barbless lures in the winter and no take in the winter...but accepts the Department's proposed change that would allow barbed hooks in the summer, along with the existing two fish daily bag summer limit."

Adoption

At the adoption hearing, the Preadoption Statement of Reasons (PSOR) and regulatory text were presented as exhibits for approval by the Commission. At the adoption hearing the Commission and public received a verbal reminder of the Truckee compromise alternative by Commission staff and the public. The Commission adopted the proposed regulation, with the understanding that the included exhibits encapsulated the compromise option, which was explained by Commission staff during the meeting and in the written materials.

The compromise was clearly indicated in the PSOR, but the regulatory text retained both options 1 and 2, as well as existing language, all open to full consideration by the Commission at the adoption hearing. The Commission understood the compromise from all materials and discussions, but the actual intended regulatory language-under consideration by, and ultimately adopted by the Commission may have been unclear to the public. The Commission is issuing this notice to clarify the actual regulatory language that was adopted on October 14, 2020.

- (D) Valley District, north of Interstate 80, all waters except no fishing hour restrictions at Camp Far West Lake (Nevada, Placer, and Yuba cos.), Collins Lake (Yuba Co.), Oroville Lake (Butte Co.) and Wildwood Lake (Nevada Co.)
- (E) Shasta, Siskiyou, Lassen, and Tehama Cos.counties.

Anadromous Waters of the Klamath River Basin Downstream of Iron Gate and Lewiston dams. This subsection applies only to waters of the Klamath River Basin that are accessible to anadromous salmonids. This section does not apply to waters of the Klamath River Basin that are inaccessible to anadromous salmon and trout, portions of the Klamath River system upstream of Iron Gate Dam, portions of the Trinity River system upstream of Lewiston Dam, and the Shasta River and tributaries upstream of Dwinnel Dam. Fishing in these waters is governed by the non-anadromous waters of the

District General Regulations (see Section 7.00, subsection (a).

(A) Restrictions and Requirements.

- Only barbless hooks may be used. (For definitions regarding legal hook types, hook gaps and rigging see Chapter 2, Article 1, Section 2.10.)
- 2. During closures to the take of adult salmon, it shall be unlawful to remove any adult Chinook Salmon from the water by any means.
- 3. See Section 1.74 for sport fish report card requirements.

(B) General Area Closures.

- 1. No fishing is allowed within 750 feet of any department fish-counting weir.
- 2. No fishing is allowed from the Ishi Pishi Road bridge upstream to and including Ishi Pishi Falls from Aug. 15 through Dec. 31. Exception: members of the Karuk Tribe listed on the current Karuk Tribal Roll may fish at Ishi Pishi Falls using hand-held dip nets.
- 3. No fishing is allowed from Sep. 15 through Dec. 31 in the Klamath River within 500 feet of the mouths of the Salmon, the Shasta and the Scott rivers and Blue Creek.
- 4. No fishing is allowed from Jun. 15 through Sep. 14 in the Klamath River from 500 feet above the mouth of Blue Creek to 500 feet downstream of the mouth of Blue Creek.
- (C) Klamath River Basin Possession Limits.
 - 1. Trout Possession Limits.
 - a. The Brown Trout possession limit is 20.
 - b. The hatchery trout or hatchery steelhead possession limits are as follows:
 - (i) Klamath River 4 hatchery trout or hatchery steelhead.
 - (ii) Trinity River 4 hatchery trout or hatchery steelhead.
 - 2. Chinook Salmon Possession Limits.
 - a. Klamath River downstream of the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec from Jan. 1 to Aug. 14 and the Trinity River downstream of the Old Lewiston Bridge to the confluence of the South Fork Trinity River from Jan 1 to Aug. 31: 2 Chinook Salmon.
 - b. Klamath River from Aug. 15 to Dec. 31 and Trinity River from Sep 1 to Dec 31: 6
 Chinook Salmon. No more than 3 Chinook Salmon over 23 inches total length may be retained when the take of salmon over 23 inches total length is allowed.
- (D) Klamath River Basin Chinook Salmon Quotas.

Klamath River fall-run Chinook Salmon take is regulated using quotas. Accounting of the tribal and non-tribal harvest is closely monitored from Aug. 15 through Dec. 31 each year. Quota areas are noted in subsection (b)(50)(E) with "Fall Run Quota" in the Open Season and Special Regulations column.

1. Quota for Entire Basin.

The 2020 Klamath River Basin quota is 1,296 Klamath River fall-run Chinook Salmon over 23 inches total length. The department shall inform the commission, and the public via the news media, prior to any implementation of restrictions triggered by the quotas. (Note: A department status report on progress toward the quotas for the various river sections is updated weekly, and available by calling 1-800-564-6479.)

- 2. Subquota Percentages.
 - a. The subquota for the Klamath River upstream of the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec and the Trinity River is 50% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.
 - (i) The subquota for the Klamath River from 3,500 feet downstream of the Iron Gate
 Dam to the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec is 17% of the total Klamath River
 Basin quota.
 - (ii) The subquota for the Trinity River main stem downstream of the Old Lewiston

 Bridge to the Highway 299 West bridge at Cedar Flat is 16.5% of the total Klamath
 River Basin quota.

- (iii) The subquota for the Trinity River main stem downstream of the Denny Road bridge at Hawkins Bar to the confluence with the Klamath River is 16.5% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.
- b. The subquota for the lower Klamath River downstream of the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec is 50% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.
 - (i) The Spit Area (within 100 yards of the channel through the sand spit formed at the Klamath River mouth) will close when 15% of the total Klamath River Basin quota is taken downstream of the Highway 101 bridge.
- (E) Klamath River Basin Open Seasons and Bag Limits.

All anadromous waters of the Klamath River Basin are closed to all fishing for all year except those areas listed in the following table. Bag limits are for trout and Chinook Salmon in combination unless otherwise specified.

Proposed Regulatory Language

Section 7.50, Title 14, CCR, is amended to read:

§ 7.50. Alphabetical List of <u>Trout</u> Waters with Special Fishing Regulations.

(a) General Provisions:

- (1) Every body of water listed below is closed to the take of trout and trout fishing, unless otherwise noted.
- (21) Every body of water listed in subsection (b) below is closed to all fishing except during the open season as shown. Unless otherwise provided, waters shown as open to trout fishing in subsection (b) below, are open to fishing for other species. Every body of water listed below is closed to all fishing except during the open season as shown. Gear restrictions listed in this section apply to the take of all species of fish unless otherwise noted.

(91.1) Anadromous Waters of the Klamath River Basin Downstream of Iron Gate and Lewiston dams. The regulations in this subsection apply only to waters of the Klamath River Basin which are accessible to anadromous salmonids. They do not apply to waters of the Klamath River Basin which are inaccessible to anadromous salmon and trout, portions of the Klamath River system upstream of Iron Gate Dam, portions of the Trinity River system upstream of Lewiston Dam, and the Shasta River and tributaries upstream of Dwinnel Dam. Fishing in these waters is governed by the General Regulations for non-anadromous waters of the North Coast District (see Section 7.00, subsection (a)(4)).

- (A) Restrictions and Requirements.
 - Only barbless hooks may be used. (For definitions regarding legal hook types, hook gaps and rigging see Chapter 2, Article 1, Section 2.10.)
 - 2. During closures to the take of adult salmon, it shall be unlawful to remove any adult Chinook Salmon from the water by any means.
 - 3. See Section 1.74 for sport fish report card requirements.
- (B) General Area Closures.

- 1. No fishing is allowed within 750 feet of any Department of Fish and Wildlife fish-counting weir
- No fishing is allowed from the Ishi Pishi Road bridge upstream to and including Ishi Pishi
 Falls from August 15 through December 31. EXCEPTION: members of the Karuk Indian
 Tribe listed on the current Karuk Tribal Roll may fish at Ishi Pishi Falls using hand-held dip
 nets.

- (C) Klamath River Basin Possession Limits.

 - (i) Klamath River 4 hatchery trout or hatchery steelhead.
 - (ii) Trinity River 4 hatchery trout or hatchery steelhead.
 - 2. Chinook Salmon Possession Limits.
 - a. Klamath River downstream of the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec from January 1 to August 14 and the Trinity River downstream of the Old Lewiston Bridge to the confluence of the South Fork Trinity River from January 1 to August 31: 2 Chinook Salmon.
 - b. Klamath River from August 15 to December 31 and Trinity River from September 1 to December 31: 6 Chinook Salmon. No more than 3 Chinook Salmon over 23 inches total length may be retained when the take of salmon over 23 inches total length is allowed.
- (D) Klamath River Basin Chinook Salmon Quotas.

The Klamath River fall-run Chinook Salmon take is regulated using quotas. Accounting of the tribal and non-tribal harvest is closely monitored from August 15 through December 31 each year. These quota areas are noted in subsection (b)(91.1)(E) with "Fall Run Quota" in the Open Season and Special Regulations column.

- 1. Quota for Entire Basin.
 - The 2020 Klamath River Basin quota is 7,6371,296 Klamath River fall-run Chinook Salmon over 23 inches total length. The department shall inform the Commission, and the public via the news media, prior to any implementation of restrictions triggered by the quotas. (NOTE: A department status report on progress toward the quotas for the various river sections is updated weekly, and available at 1-800-564-6479.)
- Subquota Percentages.
 - a. The subquota for the Klamath River upstream of the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec and the Trinity River is 50% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.
 - (i) The subquota for the Klamath River from 3,500 feet downstream of the Iron Gate Dam to the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec is 17% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.
 - (ii) The subquota for the Trinity River main stem downstream of the Old Lewiston Bridge to the Highway 299 West bridge at Cedar Flat is 16.5% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.

- (iii) The subquota for the Trinity River main stem downstream of the Denny Road bridge at Hawkins Bar to the confluence with the Klamath River is 16.5% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.
- b. The subquota for the lower Klamath River downstream of the Highway 96 bridge at Weitchpec is 50% of the total Klamath River Basin quota.
 - (i) The Spit Area (within 100 yards of the channel through the sand spit formed at the Klamath River mouth) will close when 15% of the total Klamath River Basin quota is taken downstream of the Highway 101 bridge.
- (E) Klamath River Basin Open Seasons and Bag Limits.

 All anadromous waters of the Klamath River Basin are closed to all fishing for all year except those areas listed in the following table. Bag limits are for trout and Chinook Salmon in combination unless otherwise specified.

Proposed Regulatory Language

Section 8.10, Title 14, CCR, is amended to read:

§ 8.10. Youth Fishing Derby, Susan River (Lassen Co.).

The Susan River, from the second railroad tunnel (the westernmost) on the Biz Johnson Trail downstream to the Riverside Bridge in the City of Susanville, is open to fishing on the <u>Sat.</u> preceding the <u>last Saturday in April trout season opener on the Sat. preceding Memorial Day</u>, only to persons under 16 years of age who are registered for the fishing derby sponsored by the Lassen County Sportsmen's Club. <u>See subsection 7.50(b)(149)</u>, for fishing regulations for the <u>Susan River</u>.
