### **ITEM NO. 8 TRIBAL REPORT**

Peter Bernasconi reported that the Bishop Paiute Tribe was awarded FDA grant for Tribal Transportation. This provides vouchers for all tribe members. \$10,000 dollars in vouchers were purchased from the Eastern Sierra Transit Authority

Mr. Bernasconi also stated that they will be putting in a bus shelter at Toiyabe Indian Health Clinic

The Tribe also received the notice of award for a grant which is partially funding the Coso Path. The Coso Path will tie into the City of Bishop Seibu to School path project. Construction will start in the spring.

Mr. Bernasconi also spoke about a Planning Grant. The final document name will most likely be "The Sustainable Active Transportation plan," Looking at community Transportation and encouraging the residents to use other ways of getting around other than a car.

The gas station project construction should begin in 6 months. This will be an incubator business model with 5 shops available for small businesses.

The casino hotel project should begin construction in the next 6 months.

<u>ITEM NO. 9</u> CALTRANS REPORT: Ryan Dermody started with the SR168 safety project on West Line Street. There are increased accidents in that area. On Nov 14<sup>th</sup> from 630-830pm there will be a public information meeting on that project at Northern Inyo Hospital.

Ryan Dermody congratulates Courtney Smith on his retirement and expresses his appreciation for his outstanding work and support of MOU Partnerships.

<u>ITEM NO. 10</u> CITY OF BISHOP REPORT: David Grah spoke regarding projects for the City of Bishop. Seibu to school path project, E line sidewalk project, Spruce/ Yaney/ Hanby sidewalk project are all progressing.

The Spruce fiber seal project was complete and successful. It will dramatically extend the life of the pavement. This project is being funded with SB1 revenues.

<u>ITEM NO. 11</u> **EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT:** Public Works Director, Michael Errante talked about the attached project list and asked if there were any questions. Mr. Errante also discussed improvement projects at Bishop and Lone pine Airports.

Courtney Smith added that the County is also flying the Transportation Planner position. The first review will be on Oct 31<sup>st</sup>. The position is open until filled. Assistant Civil Engineer, John Pinckney, of the Public Works Department will serve as interim Transportation Planner.

### Tea Exchange update:

Courtney Smith stated that in 2004 the LTC received \$759,000 in Tea Exchange Funds. The table, included in the packet, shows allocations and interest to date, all current allocations made by the commission, and all projects complete. There is still \$13,266 available in funds to be allocated by resolutions for bicycle and pedestrian projects.

Doug Thompson thanked Courtney for his work and suggested that a letter or certificate of merit be put in his personnel file.

Submittal of INFRA Grant Application to fund construction for the Olancha-

Cartago Four Lane Project on US 395

### **Recommended Action**

Approve by Minute Order 1) the submittal of a INFRA Grant application to fund the construction component of the Olancha-Cartago Four Lane project on US 395 and 2) authorize the Executive Director to sign documents related to the grant submittal.

### Overview - from Federal Register

A total of \$950 million Federal INFRA grant funding is available. Funds for the FY 2019 INFRA program are to be awarded on a competitive basis. The INFRA program provides Federal financial assistance to highway and freight projects of national or regional significance. To maximize the value of FY 2019 INFRA funds for all Americans, the Department of Transportation is focusing the competition on transportation infrastructure projects that support four key objectives;

- (1) Supporting economic vitality at the national and regional level;
- (2) Leveraging Federal funding to attract non-Federal sources of infrastructure investment;
- (3) Deploying innovative technology, encouraging innovative approaches to project delivery, and incentivizing the use of innovative financing; and
- (4) Holding grant recipients accountable for their performance.

### Eligible applicants for INFRA grants are:

- (1) A State or group of States;
- (2) a metropolitan planning organization that serves an Urbanized Area (as defined by the Bureau of the Census) with a population of more than 200,000 individuals;
- (3) a unit of local government or group of local governments;
- (4) a political subdivision of a State or local government;
- (5) a special purpose district or public authority with a transportation function, including a port authority;
- (6) a Federal land management agency that applies jointly with a State or group of States;
- (7) a tribal government or a consortium of tribal governments; or
- (8) a multi-State or multijurisdictional group of public entities.

INFRA grants may be used for up to 60 percent of future eligible project costs. Other Federal assistance may satisfy the non-Federal share requirement for an INFRA grant, but total Federal assistance for a project receiving an INFRA grant may not exceed 80 percent of future eligible project costs. Non-Federal sources include State funds originating from programs funded by State revenue, local funds originating from State or local revenue-funded programs, private funds or other funding sources of non-Federal origins.

Caltrans District 9 is requesting that the Inyo County LTC apply for the grant application. The reason for this is that statewide Caltrans is only allowed to apply for three projects and it is unlikely that Caltrans would select the project given all the needs statewide. The County in the past applied for these funds for a couple of different projects but was unsuccessful. If there is one project in Inyo County that qualifies for INFRA funds, it is the Olancha-Cartago project. If the application is successful, then Caltrans will be the implementing agency. A strength of this application will be the MOU partnership that your Commission has entered into with the Mono County LTC and Kern Council of Governments.

The funding of the construction component of Olancha-Cartago has hamstrung the LTC for several STIP cycles. Caltrans District 9 should be encouraged to apply for any potential source of funding for this important gap closure project.

### **Timeline**

Applications must be submitted by 8:00 p.m. EDT on March 4, 2019.

### **Project Suitability**

Caltrans District 9 staff indicates that the project can meet the timeline requirements set forth in the grant.

### Regional Transportation Plan Consistency

The Olancha-Cartago project is described as the top priority project in Inyo County in the Regional Transportation Plan. Objective 3.1 of the Regional Transportation Plan reads "Widen U.S. 395 to 4-lanes. Provide a 4-lane facility for U.S. 395 in Inyo County by the year 2020." Additionally, Policy 3.1.1 reads "Improve U.S. 395 in Sections. Widen U.S. 395 as funding allows." The Olancha-Cartago project is a gap closure project and the currently contains the last stretch of two-lane roadway on US 395 in Inyo County.

### **Alternatives**

1) The Commission could choose to not submit an application for this round of grant funding.

### FY 2019 Infrastructure for Rebuilding America (INFRA)

Fact Sheet Updated as of December 26, 2018

The FY 2019 INFRA competition focuses on the same four themes advanced in the first INFRA cycle:

- Support for National or Regional Economic Vitality
- Leveraging of Federal Funding
- Potential for Innovation
- Performance and Accountability
- Large Project Minimum Project Size: \$100,000,000 (\$100 million)
- Large Project Minimum Award: \$25,000,000 (\$25 million)
- Small Project Minimum Award: \$5,000,000 (\$5 million), including both construction awards and project development awards
- At least 25% of funds must be used for projects in rural areas
- INFRA grants may be used for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, acquisition of
  property (including land related to the project and improvements to the land), environmental
  mitigation, construction contingencies, equipment acquisition, and operational improvements
  directly related to system performance.
  - Note: The Department [USDOT] is seeking to use INFRA funding on projects that result in construction

USDOT is in the process of scheduling webinars during the months of January and February, and the Department anticipates that dates will be announced by January 5. We will update as dates are announced; below is a listing of webinar topics:

Applications must be submitted by 8:00 p.m. EST March 4, 2019. Please be aware that other USDOT sources indicate March 6, 2019. Where Caltrans is the Lead Agency, the Headquarters INFRA team will submit all applications using the Grants.gov starting February 18, 2019.

Due to the relatively short time frame for applications, the INFRA team also recommends revisiting past INFRA, Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD), Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP), and Solutions for Congested Corridors Program (SCCP) nominations. Districts may submit no more than three (3) nominations.

- The Four (4) part Nomination Form, one per project nomination, due: January 10, 2019
- Draft applications will be due to HQ INFRA team on January 30, 2019

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends your Commission to receive this staff report for informational purposes. No action is required.

### **OVERVIEW:**

The Inyo County Local Transportation Commission staff has invoiced the State for reimbursement of Rural Planning Assistance (RPA) funds in the amount of \$59,384 for the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter of FY 2018-2019 (July 1, 2018 through September 30, 2018). This reimbursement request is for work completed in accordance with the FY 2018-2019 Overall Work Program.

### **BACKGROUND:**

There are three main types of funds included to cover County and City expenses in implementing the OWP. These are 1) RPA funds; 2) Planning, Programming, and Monitoring funds (PPM) funds; and Local Transportation Funds (LTF) that are primarily related to transit.

RPA are state transportation planning funding included in a State Budget line item, allocated by Caltrans per population formula to rural RTPAs. It is provided on a reimbursement basis, after costs are incurred and paid for using local funds. This is the primary source of funding for the Inyo County LTC. The Caltrans Office of Regional and Interagency Planning (ORIP) administers RPA funds. The LTC receives an annual Financial Audit and a performance audit every three years as a condition for receiving these funds.

PPM funds are part of the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) and are not to exceed 5% of the total funds programmed in the STIP by the Inyo County LTC.

LTF funds are derived from a 1/4% of the sales tax received countywide. These funds are a primary source of funding for the Eastern Sierra Transit Authority and the Eastern Sierra Area Agency for

Aging. A portion of these funds are also used to administer the Transportation Development Act and also are set aside for bicycle and pedestrian projects.

Each fund type has specific guidelines as to the type of work that can be performed. The Overall Work Program sets forth which tasks are eligible for which type of funding. Many tasks can be completed with either RPA or PPM funds. In general, the first priority is to expend RPA funds because only 25% of the funds can carry over into the next year. PPM funds can be carried over for three years and thus give the LTC more flexibility in expending these funds.

### **SUMMARY DISCUSSION:**

### **RPA**

For the first quarter in FY 2018-2019, \$59,384 or 25.8% of the FY 2018-2019 RPA funds were expended. The anticipated carryover of \$57,500 from FY17-18 will be reflected in future invoices (increasing the '18-'19 RPA Funds from \$230,000 to \$287,500) after the adjustment is made by Caltrans to reflect the carryover as authorized in the ICLTC Resolution #2018-10.

### **PPM**

In addition, the LTC expended \$58,974 or 29.49% of PPM funds in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter.

### **Local Transportation Funds (LTF)**

These funds are allocated to the LTC based on ¼% of the Countywide sales tax. The first quarter invoice is \$4,337 or 6.88% of the FY 2018-2019 LTF Funds.

### **Moving Forward**

It is anticipated that the LTC is on pace to expend 100% of its RPA funds for this fiscal year. Given the current project load staff believes that the LTC is within its current budget and expending funds at an appropriate rate. No amendments to the FY 2017-2018 OWP are required at this time.

### **Work Element**

### 100.1 Compliance and Oversight:

The principal activity conducted in this work element is the documentation of planning-related activities, and the support and maintenance of services required to implement the transportation planning programs and processes. Complete minutes and prepare agendas for monthly meetings.

### 110.1 Overall Work Program (OWP):

Complete and submit the Fourth Quarter Report and year end invoice for FY 2017/2018 OWP to Caltrans. Monitor various planning-related tasks described in the OWP.

### 200.1 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP):

Work focused on continuing activities involving the planning, programming and monitoring of STIP projects and the implementation of the 2018 State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Begin preliminary development of the 2020 RTIP.

### 300.1 Administer Transit:

This work element only involves the expenditure of Local Transportation Funds.
