



- The ICLTC strives to find and fund appropriate transportation solutions through coordinated efforts of City, County and State level representatives and their technical staff.








Responsibilities of the LTC

- 1. Administration of Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds.
- 2. Inyo County Regional Transportation Plan(RTP).
- 3. Annual Overall Work Program (OWP).
- 4. Review and comment on the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).
- 5. Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP)
- 6. Review and prioritize grant applications for various funding programs.

PPM funds are programmed through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP)

PPM funds regional transportation planning, project planning, program development and monitoring the implementation of STIP projects

FY2024-2025 allocation \$180K with 3 years to spend



The TDA was established in 1971 by the California Legislature to improve public transportation and encourage regional transportation coordination

The TDA established two funding sources

LTF – Local
Transportation Fund –
derived from ¼ cent
sales tax statewide

STA – State Transit
Assistance Fund derived from
statewide sales tax
on diesel fuel

PUC Section 99233, the LTF is allocated in a specific priority order administration, planning and programming, pedestrian and bicycle projects, passenger rail projects, and Consolidated Transportation Service Agency activities are funded in priority order before Article 4 and Article 8 claims. Article 4 claims are funded before Article 8 claims



LTF can be used on local streets & roads if unmet transit needs cannot be reasonably met

Public participation



Must establish Social Service Transportation Advisory Committee (SSTAC) meetings to discuss transportation needs of the region



Fiscal and performance audits must be conducted



Allocate TDA funds according to the Inyo LTC's Organizational and Procedures Manual



Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) Exchange Funds

RSTP funds originate from a federal excise tax on gasoline. California distributes these funds to counties and regional agencies based on population. RSTP funds may be used for projects that are programmed in a region's Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP). Flexible.

Amount distributed to the LTC varies from year to year

FY23-24 \$174K

FY22-23 \$8K

FY21-22 \$123K


RSTP Program requires that funds be allocated to cities and counties on a fair and equitable basis. ICLTC has traditionally allocated these funds to the City and County based on population.






Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant



 In 2023, awarded \$227K to develop the Inyo County Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure and Network Plan

Active Transportation Grant Program



- In 2019, Inyo County successfully won an ATP grant to install over 4,000' of sidewalks and enhanced crosswalks in Lone Pine.
- \$1.589M ATP funds, total cost \$2.315M

Highway Safety Improvement Program



- Nine Mile Canyon Rd Guardrail (2008) \$639K
- Rumble strips and edge lines 77.4 miles 4 rural major collectors in SE County (2018) \$663K
- Onion Valley Guardrail (2020) \$997K
- Emigrant Pass chevron signs and high friction surface treatment (2022) \$210K

Federal Lands Access Grant Program (FLAP)



- Whitney Portal Road Reconstruction (2011) \$15.2M
- South Lake Road Rehabilitation Project (2014) \$12.5M
- State Line Road (2021) \$22.1M
- Next cycle 2027
