Minutes for Wednesday, February 19, 2025

These Minutes are for consideration for approval by Inyo LAFCO at its next meeting.

The Inyo Local Agency Formation Commission met on Wednesday, February 19, 2025, Chair Marcellin opened the meeting at 4:04 p.m.

ITEM 1: Pledge of Allegiance – All recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

ITEM 2: Roll Call – Commissioners Present: Chair Marcellin, Jeff Griffiths, Stephen Muchovej, Karen Kong, Allan Tobey.

Staff present: Cathreen Richards, Executive Officer, John Vallejo, County Counsel and Sally Faircloth, LAFCo Analyst/Clerk.

Public Comment Period – This is the opportunity for anyone in the audience to address the Commission on any relevant subject not scheduled on the agenda.

No one from the Public wished to speak at this time. 4:04 p.m.

ITEM 4: Election of the Chair (Action Item) – the Commission will entertain motions and conduct an election for the Chair.

Motion to nominate Karen Kong as the Chair was made by Commissioner Stephen Muchovej and seconded by Commissioner Allen Tobey. Motion passed 5-0.

ITEM 5: Election of the Vice-Chair (Action Item) – the Commission will entertain motions and conduct an election for the Vice-Chair.

Motion to nominate Stephen Muchovej as the Vice-Chair was made by Commissioner Scott Marcellin and seconded by Commissioner Alan Toby. Motion passed 5-0.

Correction to Previous Meeting Minutes (Action Item) –During the January 15, 2025, meeting, the agenda incorrectly listed the approval of minutes for May 5, 2024. The correct date should have been May 29, 2024. This correction is hereby noted for the record.

Vice-Chair Muchovej made a motion to approve the correction to the previous minutes and Commissioner Marcellin made the second. Motion passed 5-0.

ITEM 7: Approval of Minutes (Action Item) – the Commission will consider the minutes from, January 15, 2025.

Vice-Chair Muchovej made a motion to approve the minutes and Commissioner Griffiths made the second.

Motion passed 5-0.

ITEM 8: Dissolution of Independence Community Service District (CSD) (Public Hearing & Action Item) – The Commission will consider and conduct a Public Hearing regarding the dissolution of the Independence CSD. At the January 15th, 2025, meeting, the Commission agreed with the State Controller's Office that the CSD is inactive as it meets the definition of an inactive district pursuant to Government Code Section 56042 and directed staff to move forward with a dissolution hearing.

Cathreen Richards, Executive Officer, presented the staff report.

MOTION: Chair Kong motioned to open the Public Hearing at 4:08 p.m.

No one from the Public wished to speak on the Dissolution of Independence Community Service District (CSD).

Public Hearing was closed at 4:08 p.m.

MOTION: Moved by Commissioner Griffiths to approve the Dissolution of the Independence Community Service District as recommended by staff. Vice-Chair Muchovej provided the second.

The Motion passed 5-0.

ITEM 9: Approval of the 2025-2026 Preliminary Budget (Public Hearing & Action Item - Requires 3/5 vote) – The Inyo LAFCO Executive Officer's FY 2025-2026 Preliminary Budget will be presented for discussion and Commission approval.

Cathreen Richards, Executive Director, presented the Preliminary Budget.

Additionally, the commission inquired about the possibility of conducting Municipal Service Reviews within the county. Ms. Richards responded by providing an overview of the MSR process and noted that, based on information gathered from other counties, the estimated total cost to complete in depth reviews for all districts in Inyo County, including thirty-five regular districts and one city—would be approximately \$380,000.

Staff recommended allocating approximately \$70,000 from the LAFCO Fund Balance to initiate the MSR process for a select number of priority districts and to explore whether the City and/or County would be willing to contribute additional funding to support comprehensive MSRs across the county.

Ms. Richards asked the commission for directions on how to proceed with the Municipal Service Review (MSR) process request.

Chair Kong opened the Public Hearing at 4:12 p.m.

The commissioners had several questions for Ms. Richards regarding Municipal Service Reviews.

Ms. Richards was able to answer the questions to the commissioner's satisfaction.

Vice-Chair Muchovej proposed that the LAFCO fund balance be used to conduct MSRs for districts located within 5 to 10 miles of the City of Bishop and suggested requesting additional funding from the County to cover the cost of reviewing districts located outside the city's boundaries.

Commissioner Griffiths asked what the primary goal or benefit would be of conducting MSRs for the districts.

Ms. Richards stated that there had been requests to evaluate the districts to assess how effectively they are providing services and to determine whether any should be consolidated. She noted that any potential district consolidations or annexations would require a Municipal Service Review to be conducted beforehand.

Chair Kong inquired about the definition and role of a Regional Conservation District (RCD).

Commissioner Griffiths explained that the Regional Conservation District was originally established during the Depression era with a focus on soil conservation. He noted that while the current RCD still has a governing board, it is not particularly active.

Chair Kong asked what insights or outcomes could be gained from conducting Municipal Service Reviews.

Ms. Richards explained that Municipal Service Reviews include an audit of each district's funding to evaluate their financial health and assess how effectively they are likely to continue providing services in the future, both financially and organizationally.

Ms. Richards suggested that the commission consider beginning the MSR process with the fire protection districts and possibly a few of the water districts.

Vice-Chair Muchovej commented that, in his view, priority for initiating the MSR process should be given to fire protection, hospital, city, and community services districts.

The commissioners all discussed and commented on the MSR process in detail amongst themselves and the importance of having this process done.

Chair Kong asked for a motion to close the public hearing.

MOTION: Commissioner Griffiths made a motion to close the public hearing at 4:22 p.m.

No members of the public were present.

Commissioner Marcellin provided the second to close the public hearing at 4:22 p.m.

Motion passed 5-0.

MOTION:

Commissioner Griffiths made a motion to direct staff to prepare the final budget based on the preliminary budget presented with the use of fund balance to begin Municipal Service Reviews (MSR's).

Commissioner Tobey provided the second at 4:23 p.m.

The Motion passed 5-0.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Inyo LAFCo contracts with the Inyo County Planning Department for the services of LAFCo Executive Officer and support staff. The Commission also contracts with the Inyo County Office of the County Counsel for legal services. A single contract between LAFCo and Inyo County covers both staff and counsel services (draft contract attached).

Recommended Action:

Authorize the Chair to sign the Contract between Inyo LAFCo and

the County of Inyo for Professional Services for FY 2025-2026

Alternatives:

The Commission could decide not to authorize the chair to sign the contract. Other persons and/or entities would need to be identified to contract with for LAFCo services if the Commission choices

this alternative.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Commission authorize the chair to sign the contract between Inyo LAFCo and the County of Inyo for Professional Services, by taking the following action:

"Move to approve the contract between the Local Agency Formation Commission and the County of Inyo and authorize the chairperson to sign the contract and direct the Planning Department to proceed as required by the contract."

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF INYO AND THE INYO LOCAL AGENCY FORMATION COMMISSION FOR THE PROVISION OF SERVICES

INTRODUCTION

WHEREAS, the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 (Government Code § 56000 et seq., hereinafter referred to as "Act") governs Local Agency Formation Commission operations, policies, and procedures; and

WHEREAS, Government Code § 56384 requires Inyo Local Agency Formation Commission (hereinafter referred to as ("Inyo LAFCO") to appoint an Executive Officer and Legal Counsel, and Government Code § 56380 allows Inyo LAFCO to contract with any public agency or private party for personnel and facilities; and

WHEREAS, Inyo LAFCO has the need for the services of the County of Inyo (hereinafter referred to as "County"), and in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, terms, and conditions hereinafter contained, the parties hereby agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

SCOPE OF WORK.

The County shall provide to Inyo LAFCO, those services and work set forth in Attachment **A**, attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein.

Services and work provided by the County under this Agreement will be performed by County employees or other County contractors in a manner consistent with the requirements and standards established by applicable federal, state, and county laws, ordinances, regulations, and resolutions. Such laws, ordinances, regulations, and resolutions include, but are not limited to, those which are referred to in this Agreement.

When County performs work or services under this Agreement, County may have such work or services performed either by its own employees or, upon approval by Inyo LAFCO, by one or more of County's contractors. County will have such work or services performed by employees or contractors who are qualified to, and capable of, doing such work. County has the right in its sole discretion to determine which employee(s) are qualified and capable, and to determine which employee(s) of those which are deemed qualified and capable, are to actually perform the work and services under this Agreement. Inyo LAFCO has no right to designate, or require the work or services to be performed by a particular County Department, class of County employees, or particular employee(s). Further, County need not obtain Inyo LAFCO's approval prior to or after incurring any travel and/or per diem, or overtime expenses in performing work or services under this Agreement.

The term of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2026 unless sooner terminated as provided below.

3. CONSIDERATION.

- A. <u>County Employee(s)</u>. Where work and services are performed by County employee(s) under this Agreement, the consideration to be paid by Inyo LAFCO to County for such services and work is the sum total of the (1) hourly rate costs (including overtime, if any), (2) fringe benefits cost, and (3) overhead and administrative costs (including travel and per diem, if any), for each employee who performed any work or services under this Agreement. Hourly rate costs (non overtime), including fringe benefits are set forth in Attachment **B** to this Agreement.
 - (1) Hourly Rate Costs. The product of the number of hours (rounded up or down to the nearest 1/2 (0.50) of an hour) which a County employee worked under this agreement, multiplied by the employee's hourly rate of pay as set by the most recent County salary ordinance, resolution, or employee contract. Where the circumstances of the services and work requested by Inyo LAFCO under this Agreement require the County employee to work in excess of eight (8) hours per day or forty (40) hours per week (hereinafter referred to as "overtime"), and County is obligated by law or contract to compensate the employee for such overtime at a rate of one and one half (1½) times their hourly rate of pay, the hourly rate of pay for such overtime hours worked under this Agreement will be one and one half (1½) times the employee's hourly rate of pay as set by the most recent County salary ordinance, resolution, or employee contract.
 - (2) <u>Fringe Benefit Costs</u>. The product of the hourly rate costs multiplied by 40% (0.40).
 - (3) Overhead and Administrative Costs. The product of the hourly rate costs multiplied by 20% (0.20), plus special, travel and per diem costs if any. Where a County employee travels and/or incurs per diem expenses in performing work under this Agreement, the travel and per diem costs for such work will be the actual costs to the County for such travel and per diem. Actual costs to the County will be determined by the most recent County ordinance or resolution establishing travel and per diem reimbursement rates for County employees. Special costs are those approved in advance by Inyo LAFCO for particular specialized equipment, supplies, tools and materials to be used by County in performing under this Agreement.
 - (4) <u>Exception For County Counsel.</u> Notwithstanding the foregoing, the consideration to be paid for services of professional employees of the Office of the County Counsel shall be the flat hourly rate (inclusive of benefits and overhead) shown in Attachment **B** to this Agreement, plus any special, travel and per diem costs as provided in Paragraph 3.A.(3) above.
- B. Other County Contractors. Where work and services under this Agreement are performed by another County contractor, the consideration to be paid by Inyo LAFCO to County for such services and work is the sum total of (1) the contract costs and (2) administrative costs for each County contractor who performs any work or services under this Agreement.
 - (1) <u>Contract Costs</u>. The total costs to the County (including all labor, travel and per diem, overhead, administrative costs, and other fees) charged by such other contractor to County for the performance of work or services under this Agreement.
 - (2) <u>Administrative Costs</u>. The product of the contract cost multiplied by 20% (0.20), plus any special costs as defined in Section 3.A.(3) above.

- C. <u>Limit Upon Amount Payable Under Agreement</u>. Except for amounts payable to County under Section 6 for Defense and Indemnification, the total sum of all payments made by Inyo LAFCO to County for services and work performed under this Agreement, shall not exceed Sixteen Thousand Four Hundred Eighty Six <u>Dollars</u> (\$16,486.00 <u>)</u> hereinafter referred to as "contract limit"). County expressly reserves the right to decline to perform any work or services which would be in excess of the contract limit.
- D. <u>Insurance.</u> Inyo LAFCO shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection to Inyo LAFCO operations and thereby Inyo LAFCO's performance under the contract. For any claim related to this contract, Inyo LAFCO's coverage shall be primary as respects Inyo County. Coverage shall be at least as broad as the following:
- 1. (REQUIRED) General liability insurance on an occurrence basis, including products and completed operations, p[property damage, bodily injury, and personal and advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Inyo County, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the general liability policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of Inyo LAFCO, including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection to such work or operations.
- 2. (REQUIRED) Hired and non-owed automobile liability insurance with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. (RECOMMENDED if Inyo LAFCO will be receiving/storing/transmitting personally identifiable information (PII) or personal medical information (PMI)) Cyber liability insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence or claim.
- E. <u>Billing and Payment</u>. County shall submit to Inyo LAFCO, once a month, an itemized statement of all services and work described in Attachment **A**. This statement will be submitted to Inyo LAFCO not later than the fifth (5th) day of the month. The statement to be submitted will cover the period from the first (1st) day of the preceding month through and including the last day of the preceding month. This statement will identify the date on which the services and work were performed and describe the nature of the services and work which were performed on each day. County's statement to the Inyo LAFCO will also include an itemization of any travel or per diem expenses incurred by County during that period. Upon timely receipt of the statement by the fifth (5th) day of the month, Inyo LAFCO shall make payment to County on or before the last day of the month.
- F. <u>Federal and State Taxes</u>. Inyo LAFCO will not withhold any federal or state income taxes or social security from any payments made by Inyo LAFCO to County under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

4. WORK SCHEDULE.

County's obligation is to perform, in a reasonably timely manner, those services and work identified in Attachment **A**. It is understood by Inyo LAFCO that the performance of these services and work will require cooperation and coordination between County, Inyo LAFCO, and other parties. Inyo LAFCO and County will use their best efforts to arrange their own schedules, and coordinate with other interested parties, to ensure that services and work under this Agreement can be performed within the time frames set by mutual agreement.

5. STATUS OF PARTIES.

County is a political subdivision of the State of California. Inyo LAFCO is a special district authorized by the Act. Each party is a public entity independent of the other. Inyo LAFCO by virtue of this Agreement has no authority to bind or incur any obligation on behalf of County. Except as expressly provided in Attachment A, County has no authority or responsibility to exercise any rights or power vested in the Inyo LAFCO. It is understood by both Inyo LAFCO and County that this Agreement shall not under any circumstances be construed or considered to create an employer-employee relationship or a joint venture. As an independent entity:

A. County shall determine the method, details, and means of performing the work and services to be provided by County under this Agreement.

STATUS OF COUNTY OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES.

- A. County officers and employees while providing work and services under this Agreement, remain County officers and employees subject to the exclusive control, direction, and supervision by County.
- B. County officers and employees providing work and services under this Agreement will do so in accordance with all federal and state laws applicable to the County, and in accordance with all County ordinances, resolutions, rules, regulations, policies, and Board of Supervisors directions. Exceptions to this will be made only for those Inyo LAFCO ordinances, resolutions, rules, regulations, policies, and directions which have been formally adopted by Inyo LAFCO and approved in writing by the County for implementation under this Agreement.
- C. County expressly and specifically retains the right to hire, fire, and discipline any County officer or employee who provides work or services under this Agreement. If Inyo LAFCO is unsatisfied with the performance of any County officer or employee who provides work or services under this Agreement, Inyo LAFCO shall promptly notify the County and request that the County consider taking appropriate action.
- D. Except as provided in this Agreement, no County officer or employee shall provide any work or services to Inyo LAFCO. Further, Inyo LAFCO shall not hire, retain, engage, contract or employ any County officer or employee except under the provisions of this Agreement.

6. WARRANTY OF ELIGIBILITY.

Contractor warrants that it is not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in covered transactions by any federal department or agency. Contractor also warrants that it is not suspended or debarred from receiving federal funds as listed in the List of Parties Excluded from Federal Procurement or Non-procurement Programs issued by the General Services Administration available at: http://www.sam.gov.

8. DEFENSE AND INDEMNIFICATION.

To the extent permitted by law, each party hereto shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the other and its officers, employees, and agents from and against all claims, damages, losses, judgments, liabilities, expenses, and other costs, including litigation costs and attorney's fees, arising out of, or resulting from, its acts or omissions, or that of its officers, employees, or agents in the performance of this Agreement.

8. CANCELLATION.

This Agreement may be cancelled by either party without cause, and at will, for any reason by giving to the other party sixty (60) calendar day's written notice of such intent to cancel.

9. DEFAULT.

- A. If Inyo LAFCO fails to pay County for the work and services performed by County in a timely manner, County may declare the Inyo LAFCO in default and terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) calendar day's written notice to Inyo LAFCO. Upon such termination by default, Inyo LAFCO will pay to County all amounts owing to County for services and work performed to the date of termination.
- B. Except as provided in paragraph "A" above, if a party to this Agreement should fail to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement in a timely manner, the other party may declare a default and notify the "defaulting" party in writing of the facts constituting such default. Upon making such written notification, the defaulting party will have thirty (30) calendar days to cure such default. A party shall be

deemed to cure the default if within the time period set forth herein, the defaulting party begins and thereafter diligently continues to completion curing such default. Service of a notice of default on the defaulting party and allowance of said thirty (30) calendar day period for the defaulting party to commence with diligence to cure such default shall be a condition precedent to any termination of this Agreement or to the bringing of any action based upon such default. If any default is not cured or deemed cured hereunder, the non-defaulting party, at its election, may terminate this Agreement by written notice thereof to the defaulting party. Upon such termination by default, Inyo LAFCO will pay to County all amounts owing to County for services or work performed to the date of termination and County will turn over to Inyo LAFCO all information, work papers, reports, analysis of other information in County's possession as may relate to the services and work being performed hereunder.

10. WAIVER OF DEFAULT.

Waiver of any default by either party to this Agreement shall not be deemed to be waiver of any subsequent default. Waiver of any breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach, and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement unless this Agreement is modified as provided in Paragraph 18 below.

11. ASSIGNMENT/SUBCONTRACTING.

This is an agreement for the services of County. Inyo LAFCO has relied upon the skills, knowledge, experience, and training of County as an inducement to enter into this Agreement. County shall not assign this Agreement, or any part of it. However, County may, with the approval of Inyo LAFCO, subcontract work or services it is to perform under this Agreement.

12. PRODUCTS OF COUNTY'S WORK AND SERVICES.

Any and all compositions, publications, plans, designs, specifications, blueprints, maps, formulas, photographs, slides, video tapes, computer programs, computer disks, computer tapes, memory chips, soundtracks, audio recordings, films, audio-visual presentations, exhibits, reports, or studies, which are created, produced, assembled, compiled by, or are the result, product, or manifestation of County's services or work under this Agreement are, and at the termination of this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of the Inyo LAFCO. At the termination of the Agreement, County will convey possession and title to all such properties to Inyo LAFCO. However, any and all works of art, inventions, patents, trademarks, copyrights or intellectual properties of any kind which are created, produced, assembled, compiled by, or are the result, product, or manifestation of County's services or work under this Agreement, are, and at the termination of this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of County.

13. RECORDS AND AUDIT.

- A. Records. County shall prepare and maintain all records required by the various provisions of this Agreement, and federal, state, county, and municipal, ordinances, regulations, and directions. County shall maintain these records for a minimum of four (4) years from the termination or completion of this Agreement. County may fulfill its obligation to maintain records as required by this paragraph by substitute photographs, microphotographs, or other authentic reproduction of such records.
- B. <u>Inspections and Audits.</u> Any authorized representative of Inyo LAFCO shall have access to any books, documents, papers, and records, including, but not limited to, financial records of County, which County determines to be pertinent to this Agreement, for the purposes of making audit evaluation, examination, excerpts, and transcripts during the period such records are to be maintained by County. Further, Inyo LAFCO has the right to audit, inspect, or otherwise evaluate the work performed or being performed under this Agreement.

14. NONDISCRIMINATION.

During the performance of this Agreement, neither party, or their agents, officers and employees, shall unlawfully discriminate in violation of any federal, state, or local law, against any employee, or applicant for employment, or person receiving services under this Agreement, because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status, ages, or sex. Both parties and their agents, officers, and employees shall comply with the provisions, of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code section 12900, et seq.), and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder in the California Code of Regulations. The parties shall also abide by the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) and all amendments thereto, and all administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to said act.

15. CONFIDENTIALITY.

Contractor further agrees to comply with the various provisions of the federal, state, and county laws, regulations, and ordinances providing that information and records kept, maintained, or accessible by Contractor in the course of providing services and work under this Agreement, shall be privileged, restricted, or confidential. Contractor agrees to keep confidential all such information and records. Disclosure of such confidential, privileged, or protected information shall be made by Contractor only with the express written consent of the County. Any disclosure of confidential information by Contractor without the County's written consent is solely and exclusively the legal responsibility of Contractor in all respects.

Notwithstanding anything in the Agreement to the contrary, names of persons receiving public social services are confidential and are to be protected from unauthorized disclosure in accordance with Title 45, Code of Federal Regulations Section 205.50, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, and Sections 10850 and 14100.2 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, and regulations adopted pursuant thereto. For the purpose of this Agreement, all information, records, and data elements pertaining to beneficiaries shall be protected by the provider from unauthorized disclosure.

16. SEVERABILITY.

If any portion of this Agreement or application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, or if it is found in contravention of any federal, state, or county statute, ordinance, or regulation, the remaining provisions of this Agreement, or the application thereof, shall not be invalidated thereby, and shall remain in full force and effect to the extent that the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

17. FUNDING LIMITATION.

The ability of Inyo LAFCO to enter this Agreement is based upon available funding from various sources. In the event that such funding fails, is reduced, or is modified, from one or more sources, Inyo LAFCO has the option to cancel, reduce, or modify this Agreement, or any of its terms within five (5) calendar days of its notifying County of the cancellation, reduction, or modification of available funding. Any reduction or modification of this Agreement made pursuant to this provision must comply with the requirements of Paragraph 18.

18. AMENDMENT.

This Agreement may be modified, amended, changed, added to, or subtracted from, by the mutual consent of the parties hereto, if such amendment or change is in written form and executed with the same formalities as this Agreement, and attached to the original Agreement to maintain continuity.

19. NOTICE.

Any notice, communication, amendments, additions, or deletions to this Agreement, including change of address of either party during the terms of this Agreement, which Inyo LAFCO or County shall be required, or may desire, to make, shall be in writing and may be personally served, or sent by prepaid first class mail to, the respective parties as follows:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This report presents the Executive Officer's budget recommendations for adoption of a budget for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2025-2026. The proposed budgeted expenditures for FY 2025-2026 are \$34,814, an increase of \$1,984 from the FY 2024-2025 budget. This increase is primarily due to increases in audit and insurance costs. The Inyo LAFCO Budget for FY 2025-2026, to maintain the status quo, proposes funding from the County of Inyo and the City of Bishop in the amount of \$15,000 each, the same as 2024-2025, for a total contribution of \$30,000. There has been a request, however, that LAFCo begin to conduct Municipal Service Reviews (MSR) and that has been incorporated into this final budget recommendation by the addition of fund balance causing the total expenditures to be \$91,698.

The total budget recommended by staff reflects revenues of \$38,760 and expenditures of \$34,814. A cash fund balance of \$71,637 is projected to remain from FY 2024-2025 and \$70,000 of this is being made available for the FY 2025-2026 exclusively for MSRs. For the next FY budget (2026-2027) staff will be proposing that the city and county contribute \$20,000 each so that LAFCo can continue preparing MSRs on a revolving schedule and prepare as many MSRs as allowed by the budget, per year.

The Final Budget, as proposed here, is the same as the Preliminary Budget presented on February 19, 2025 with the option of using fund balance to begin MSRs.

Recommended Action:

Conduct a public hearing and adopt the attached budget as recommended by staff for FY 2025-2026 and find that the proposed staffing and program costs will allow the Commission to fulfill the purposes and programs of the Cortese Knox Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 and authorize the Chairperson to sign.

Alternatives:

- 1) Amend the Final budget for FY 2025-2026.
- Continue the public hearing and provide direction to staff regarding 2) changes to the final budget for FY 2025-2026. This is not recommended as the final budget is required to be adopted by June 15th.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Inyo Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) is a state-mandated program. The Commission's five members include one public representative; two Inyo County Board of Supervisors' representatives; and, two Bishop City Council representatives. The objectives of LAFCO include the encouragement of orderly growth and development, the preservation of prime agricultural lands, discouragement of sprawl through coordination of local governmental boundaries, and establishment of spheres of influence and community service priorities that reflect local circumstances, conditions, and financial resources. LAFCO is funded jointly by the City of Bishop and Inyo County pursuant to Government Code 56381(a) and 56381 (b) (2), which state:

- (a) The commission shall adopt annually, following noticed public hearings, a final budget by June 15. At a minimum, the proposed and final budget shall be equal to the budget adopted for the previous fiscal year unless the commission finds that reduced staffing or program costs will nevertheless allow the commission to fulfill the purposes and programs of this chapter. The commission shall transmit its proposed and final budgets to the board of supervisors, to each city, and to each independent special district.
- (b) (2) In counties in which there is no independent special district representation on the commission, the county and its cities shall each provide a one-half share of the commission's operational costs. The cities' share shall be apportioned in the manner described in paragraph (1).

Inyo LAFCO does not include independent special district representation, therefore, the City and County are each responsible for half of the commission's operation costs, unless the County and City agree under the conditions set forth in 56381 (b) (4).

Presently, the Commission contracts with the Inyo County Planning Department for the services of LAFCO Executive Officer and support staff. The Commission also contracts with the Inyo County Office of the County Counsel for legal services. An annual single contract between LAFCO and Inyo County covers both staff and counsel services.

Inyo LAFCO Accomplishments for FY 2024-2025

- Sent Commissioner Tobey to the Executive Officer and Commissioner Conference.
- Entered into a contract with the Inyo County Planning Department/Inyo County Office of the County Counsel that provided staff and legal services to the Commission.
- Maintained the Inyo LAFCO website in compliance with Government Code Section 56661.
- Maintained membership in the California Association of LAFCOs (CALAFCO).
- Completed the dissolution of the Independence Community Service District.

- Worked on the Independent Special District information.
- Provided a high level of customer service.
- Reviewed districts for inactivity.

Inyo LAFCO Goals for FY 2025-2026

- Hire a consultant and begin MSRs.
- Monitor issues with the Keeler Community Service District.
- Send the Clerk/Analyst to the annual LAFCo Workshop.
- Enter into a contract with the Inyo County Planning Department/Office of County Counsel to provide staff and legal services to the Commission.
- Maintain Inyo LAFCo membership and participation in CALAFCo, which provides training to LAFCo Commissioners and staff at annual conferences.
- Replace any vacant seats on LAFCo as necessary to keep LAFCo active.
- Process and consider applications for special district formations, annexations, reorganizations, out-of-area service agreements, and others in compliance with the provisions of the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act.
- Continue to maintain the Inyo LAFCo website in compliance with Government Code Section 56661.
- Continue to update the Independent Special District information.
- Provide a high level of customer service.
- Continue to review non-active districts for possible dissolution.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S BUDGET REQUEST FOR FY 2025-2026

Staff recommends contributions from the County of Inyo and the City of Bishop to \$15,000 each for FY 2025-2026 the same as FY 2024-2025. This level of contribution meets the budgeted expenses for FY 2025-2026; provides a reliable budget and, allows for the Clerk/Analyst to attend the annual training workshop (Attachment – recommended budget supporting table). Since the Commission decided to direct staff to begin conducting MSRs, during the preliminary budget hearing, staff has included the approximate \$70,000 in fund balance to do so. Inyo LAFCo has not prepared MSRs for every district since 2007, and because of this staff is proposing that after the 2025-2026 budget cycle, where fund balance will be used to begin the process, an additional \$5,000 be contributed by the city and county to continue MSR preparations on a revolving cycle.

Staff sent out a request to other LAFCos in the state to see what their costs per district for a MSR have been. There are both in-depth MSRs and a MSR checklist type of review. Since Inyo LAFCo has not prepared MSRs since 2007, staff believe that the in-depth review would be best, although a review of Sphere of Influences may not be necessary for every district. The average cost is about \$10,000 per district and \$30,000 for a city. There is a total of 26 districts and 9 mutual water companies. At an average of \$10,000 each (34 not counting Bishop), it would be \$340,000, plus \$30,000 for Bishop for a total of 370,000. Moving forward will mean selecting about 7-8 of these districts for MSRs for the 2025-2026 budget cycle.

Expenditures

Applications

Staff recommends including funding for possible applications from the public or a district of (\$7,000). If no applications are submitted, these funds will not be utilized – no revenues or expenses will be realized. The MSR funding will come directly from the LAFCo budget and is not reimbursable through application fees.

Annual Audit

Inyo LAFCO's cost for the annual mandated agency audit has gone up by \$406. The amount for FY 2025-2026 for Inyo LAFCO is \$4,462.

LAFCO Meetings

The FY 2025-2026 budget assumes three Inyo LAFCO meetings, which is the same number as 2024-2025. Staff has again estimated based on the three meetings and budgeted approximately \$2,257 for LAFCo meetings (staff and commissioners). This is \$659 more than 2024-2025 due to an increase in staff costs.

CALAFCO Conferences

Participation in the CALAFCO annual workshop by the LAFCo clerk/analyst has been included in the 2025-2026 budget proposal at \$4,283, which is \$2,143 less than the 2024-2025 amount. The decrease is due to the difference in sending the clerk/analyst compared to a commissioner or executive officer to a workshop/conference. In 2022, staff changed the allocation of workshops/conferences to sending one person a year instead of two, to either the conference or the workshop to reduce this cost overall. Since the Clerk/Analyst is attending next year's conference, it has been programed into the budget to reflect it.

Proposed expenditures by Object Code for FY 2025-2026

1. Advertising (Object Code 5263)

The recommended amount in this object code is \$300 which is the same as the FY 2024-2025 Budget and is included to reflect any possible applications. For FY 2025-2026, this cost also includes public notices for the three anticipated LAFCO meetings.

Professional and Special Service (Object Code 5265)

The recommended status quo amount in this object code is \$21,698 which is approximately \$173 more than the FY 2024-2025 Budget. With the addition of MSR preparation, this amount

is \$91,698. The recommended amount without MSRs include: staff time for meetings \$2,166; conferences \$2,342; processing projects and conducting regular LAFCO administrative duties \$11,978; the annual audit \$4,462 and commissioner payments for meetings \$750.

3. General Operating Expense (Object Code 5311)

The recommended amount in this object code is \$1,809, which is \$61 less than in the FY 2024-2025 Budget. This is due to a decrease in the CALAFCO Membership. This category of expenditure also includes purchases of supplies and miscellaneous supplies, which has not changed.

4. County Cost Plan (Object Code 5315)

The estimated amount in this object code is \$1,600, which \$16 more than it was in the 2024-2025 budget amount and is a suggested amount by the County Auditor to cover expenses from that department.

Travel Expenses (Object Code 5331)

This object code includes expenses for CALAFCO annual conference travel, CALAFCO staff workshop travel, and travel mileage for the Inyo LAFCO meetings. The recommended amount in this object code is \$2,466, which is an increase of \$152 from the FY 2024-2025 budget. The increase is due to an estimated increase in registration fees for the staff workshop.

6. Motor Pool (Object Code 5333)

Expenditures in this object code include Motor Pool travel to LAFCO Meetings in Bishop and to conferences. The recommended amount in this object code is \$342 which is \$454 lower than it was in the FY 2024-2025 budget. The decrease is due to money not being put into motor pool for the staff workshop since personal vehicles will be used due to a motor pool vehicle shortage. The cost estimate for staff vehicle travel is included in 5331 instead.

7. Public Liability Insurance (Object Code 5155)

The expenditure in this object code is \$5,840. It covers the cost to provide LAFCO its own insurance policy as now required by the County Risk Manager. This amount increased by \$1,168 compared to the 2024-2025 amount. This is due to an increase in estimate coverage cost by the insurance company and an additional requirement for non-owned auto insurance by the County Risk Manager.

Revenues

All revenues received are the result of LAFCO fees for services and payments from the County of Inyo and the City of Bishop. LAFCO's fee schedule provides for the recovery of actual costs in processing applications for changes in organization under the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act and environmental review and processing under the California Environmental Quality Act. Beyond the recovery of fees for services, Government Code Section 56381(b)(2) provides "in counties where there is no special district representation on the commission, the county and its cities shall each provide a one-half share of the commission's operational costs."

Details for each revenue category are as follows:

LAFCO Fees (Object Code 4817)

The recommended amount in this revenue code is \$7,000 which is the same as the FY 2024-2025 Budget. This is for possible applications in the 2025-2026 FY and is estimated for one large project at \$5,000 and one small project at \$2,000; it includes staff time.

2. Aid from Other Governmental Agencies (Object Code 4562 and 4599)

The recommended amount in these revenue codes is \$30,000, which is the same as the 2024-2025 Budget. The total revenues from both the County of Inyo and the City of Bishop for FY 2025-2026 are \$15,000 each. This level of funding is generally cost neutral based on the programed expenses, but fund balance could be used if necessary.

3. Interest form Treasury (Object Code 4301)

The recommended amount in this revenue code is \$1,760, which is more than the 2024-2025 amount. This is due to staff re-estimating this number based on a six-year average instead of using the previous year's number.

Alternatives

The Commission could decide to not move forward with the MSR preparation. This is not recommended as Inyo LAFCo is behind in this work and there has been an expressed desire to examine the districts.

The FY 2025-2026 budget includes expected revenues and expenses for the anticipated applications. The Commission could choose not to include these funds in its budget. This is not recommended, however, because it may increase costs to process the application if a budget amendment becomes necessary.

As with budgets adopted by a county or city government, adoption of the annual budget for Inyo LAFCO requires adoption at a noticed public hearing by a three-fifths vote. Amendment of the adopted budget requires a four-fifths vote of the Commission.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends, following a public hearing, the Commission approve the final budget for FY 2025-2026 by taking the following action:

"Move to approve the Inyo Local Agency Formation Commission budget for fiscal year 2025-2026 as recommended by the Executive Officer and find that the proposed program costs will allow for the Commission to fulfill the purposes and programs of the Cortese Knox Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000."

Discuss and decide which Districts to prepare MSRs for in

Fiscal Year (FY) 2025-2026.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

LAFCO staff included information regarding funding MSRs in the 2025-2026 Budget staff report. MSRs need to be prepared for all of the County's districts, however, as discussed in the budget staff report, LAFCo does not have the necessary funding to prepare all of the MSRs in FY 2025-2026. A review, discussion and identification of the districts the Commission would like to begin with will be conducted.

Suggestions and requests given to staff regarding which districts to start the MSRs on are:

- Fire Districts. The reasons given for fire district preference include: the increasing pressure on the fire districts to provide services and the fact that fire and emergency services are becoming more complex and expensive due to the needs for these services becoming more imminent, difficulty in finding, training and keeping volunteers, and inflation driving up costs.
- Certain water and sewer districts. There are active talks between some of the districts and between certain districts and the city and county about consolidation, sharing, and/or annexations. These conversations have been driven by the circumstances of the water and sewer districts being similar to those of the fire districts. Several are having serious issues with the provision of the services they are responsible for. Any of these conversations that could impact existing districts should have MSRs prepared before changes are proposed. Sphere of Influence reviews and maps should also be included.

Staff is requesting that the Commission review the districts and prepare a list of seven to ten district preferences for MSRs in the 2025-2026 Fiscal Year. Districts/jurisdictions in Inyo LAFCo include:

- 1 city Bishop
- 5 cemetery Big Pine, Independence, Mount Whitney, Pioneer, Tecopa

- 11 community service Big Pine (water and sewer), Darwin (water), Eastern Sierra (sewer), Indian Creek (water and lighting), Keeler (water), Lone Pine (sewer), Mesa (groundwater monitoring), Sierra Highlands (water), Sierra North (water), Starlite (water)
- 6 fire protection Big Pine, Bishop Rural, Independence, Lone Pine, Southern Inyo, Olancha
- 2 hospital Northern Inyo, Southern Inyo
- 1 regional conservation
- 1 sanitary district East Independence
- 9 mutual water companies Aspendell, Brookside, Cartago, Northern Lone Pine, Parks West, Ranch Road Estates, Rawson, Rocking K, Sierra Grande, Valley vista.

The last time MSRs were prepared by Inyo LAFCo was in 2007. The MSRs included all of the districts, but not the municipal water companies. LAFCo does have the authority to prepare MSRs for the municipal water companies. Unless there are possible consolidations on the horizon related to the municipal water companies, staff suggest they are not a priority.

The majority of the districts had no recommended changes, based on the MSRs. Only one, the East Independence Sanitary District was recommended for dissolution and to subsequently be added to the service provider that covers the rest of Independence (DWP). Four districts: Big Pine Fire, Mesa, Darwin and Tecopa Cemetery did not provide enough information to compete the MSRs and it was recommended that the districts have them completed before any proposed changes to boundaries. There were also three districts dissolved after the 2007 MSRs (Independence, Hidden Springs and Lazy A, all water service providers) and one consolidation (Indian Creek and Westridge).

Staff is requesting that the Commission identify a list of seven to ten districts to begin the MSRs in the 2025-2026 fiscal year.

1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Big Pine Cemetery District was formed in 1930 and operates pursuant to Health & Safety Code Section 9000 et seq.

The District includes the community of Big Pine and extends to the west and south. Its boundary and sphere of influence are coterminous.

The District is governed by a five -member board of directors appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

District Services

The District provides interments and cemetery services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Big Pine Community Services District, Big Pine Fire Protection District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District owns and operates two cemeteries. Big Pine Cemetery is located on Crocker Street in Big Pine and Woodman Cemetery is located on Gregg Street, approximately 3/4 miles south of town. They are reported to have capacity for another 15-20 years of interments.

Growth and Population Projections

District services do not affect the rate or location of development and there is an indirect relationship between population and demands for District services. Significant growth is not anticipated in the Big Pine area.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District operations are financed primarily by property taxes with some revenues from the sale of cemetery plots. These combined revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There do not appear to be obvious cost-avoidance opportunities. There are no full time District employees.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity for rate restructuring during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each service fee schedule.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities due to District operations and the location of the cemetery.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options. There are five Cemetery Districts in Inyo County and each has a close, unique relationship with their respective community.

There may be potential economies of scale by sharing staff or work crews among these Districts.

Management Efficiencies

Given its small service area the District operates efficiently in serving its customers. There may be potential economies of scale by sharing staff or work crews among cemetery districts but such relationships should be voluntary and contractual.

Local Accountability and Governance

The Board of Supervisors appoints the Board of Directors that meets bi-monthly. Meeting dates and times are posted for public review.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere are included.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates its boundaries are correct and there are no plans to annex areas that are not now within the District.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.

4. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS & REFERENCES

The Inyo LAFCO staff prepared this Municipal Service Review. Responsibility for any errors or omissions rests with those who prepared the report.

The Big Pine Cemetery District provided information and documents upon which the evaluation is based. Board Chair Robert Noel was instrumental in providing data.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Big Pine Community Services District was formed December 17, 1968 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Gov't Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District includes the community of Big Pine. Its boundary and sphere of influence are largely similar, with a few areas east and west of the District being in the Sphere.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The Board Secretary is responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District provides retail water delivery and collects, treats and disposes of wastewater.

The District services 312 water connections and 303 sewer connections. It also serves approximately seven customers outside of its boundaries that were being served by the DWP when the District began operating the water distribution system.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Big Pine Cemetery District, Big Pine Fire Protection District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

In 2002 the District executed an agreement with the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (DWP) transferring the title of the Big Pine Water Distribution System to the District. The District has been administering the system since 1982 pursuant to a lease-purchase agreement but did not receive title to the system until 2002.

The District receives 500 acre feet of untreated water annually from the DWP gratis, which appears to be an adequate amount for current and projected needs.

The District is currently in the process of updating its Capital Improvement Plan, which was last updated in 2000.

Growth and Population Projections

Growth within and adjacent to the District is very limited since most of the vacant land is government owned.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed largely by service fees and connections for water and sewer, with some interest revenue from invested funds. Current revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in the Special District Risk Management Authority and in the California Special Districts Association, the first to obtain pooled property, liability and workers compensation insurance savings and the second for legislative advocacy.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity for rate restructuring during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each rate ordinance.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities due to the location of Big Pine in relationship to other communities and local public agencies.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options.

Management Efficiencies

The District exhibits the characteristics of a well-managed agency operating efficiently and serving its residents and customers effectively.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District is a relatively compact government, which enhances the ability of the public to participate in its activities. The Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. The District send notices of interest with statements to its customers and posts meeting agencies in the community.

3 SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are mostly coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere are included.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates its boundaries are correct and there are no plans to annex areas that are not now within the Sphere of Influence.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Big Pine Fire Protection District was formed in 1946 and operates pursuant to the Fire Protection District Law of 1987 (Health and Safety Code, Section 13800 et seq.).

The District includes the community of Big Pine. Its sphere of influence extends beyond its boundaries to the north, south and east.

The District is governed by a five member board of directors, elected at-large. The District is staffed by two part time employees and volunteer fire fighters.

District Services

The District provides fire prevention, suppression and emergency medical and transport responses.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Big Pine Cemetery District, Big Pine Community Services District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District provides fire suppression services from one fire station in Big Pine.

The District does not have a capital improvement plan however it is attempting to obtain additional property next to the fire station (the old library property) since it is in need of another building to house newer fire engines since the ceilings in the present fire station are not high enough cannot be raised to accommodate these taller engines.

It appears the District can accommodate service demands with mutual aid agreements in place with other Fire Protection Districts, California Division of Forestry (CDF), Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service.

Growth and Population Projections

The District provides services as population growth occurs. Its services do not affect the rate or location of development. Significant growth is not expected in Independence.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed largely by a portion of property taxes levied within its borders, with some income from ambulance service calls.

Current revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations, provided the State does not continue to erode local government's property tax receipts.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in mutual aid and response agreements with other emergency response agencies. Being primarily a volunteer fire protection agency minimizes service expenses.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There are no obvious opportunities for rate restructuring in the operations of the District.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities shared facilities due to the location of Big Pine in relationship to other communities and fire protection agencies.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options other than perhaps consolidating the District with the Big Pine Community Services District, though no interest has been expressed in this or other reorganization possibilities.

Another option might be the formation of an Inyo County Joint Powers Fire Authority that would combine and coordinate all of the local fire protection services in the County.

Management Efficiencies

The District, given its limited resources, exhibits the characteristics of a volunteer-based fire protection district efficiently serving its residents and customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. Board agendas and minutes are posted for public review.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous. The sphere is much larger than the District and extends to the north, south and east. A map of the District and its sphere is included.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

There are no proposed changes in the sphere of influence. It is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.

The Inyo LAFCO staff prepared this Municipal Service Review. Responsibility for any errors or omissions rests with those who prepared the report.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Bishop Rural Fire Protection District was formed in 1948 and operates pursuant to the Fire Protection District Law of 1987 (Health and Safety Code, Section 13800 et seq.).

The District includes lands around the City of Bishop including the community of Laws. The District provides fire protection services by contract for the Bishop Paiute Reservation, which the District surrounds. Its sphere of influence extends all directions from the District boundaries.

A five member Board of Fire Commissioners appointed by the Board of Supervisors governs the District. The Fire Chief is responsible for administration, with three part-time employees and a number of volunteer fire fighters.

District Services

The District provides fire prevention and suppression services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Pioneer Cemetery District, Northern Inyo Hospital District, Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District and the Eastern Sierra, Indian Creek, Lazy A, Sierra Highlands and Westridge Community Services Districts.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District provides fire suppression services from two rural fire stations in the District in addition to the main fire station in the City of Bishop.

The District <u>has</u> a capital improvement plan. It appears the District can accommodate service demands with its facilities and equipment, with mutual aid agreements in place with local, State and Federal fire service agencies.

Growth and Population Projections

The District provides services as population growth occurs. The District estimates its population as approximately 10,000. No significant growth is anticipated.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed primarily by property taxes, which represent approximately 88% of total revenues, the remainder being interest income, contracts (Bishop Reservation) and Indian gaming nexus grants.

Current revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations provided the expenses remain comparable to those now experienced as a largely volunteer agency.

Additional sources of revenue, such as special assessment levies, may be considered in the future.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in mutual aid and response agreements with other emergency response agencies. Being a volunteer fire protection agency minimizes service expenses. The District has cooperated with the City of Bishop in the purchase of fire apparatus.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There are no obvious opportunities for rate restructuring in the operations of the District other than the considerations noted above.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

Opportunities for shared facilities, due to the location of the District with respect to the City of Bishop, are in place.

Government Structure Options

There may be additional opportunities for government structure options due to the location of the District with respect to the City of Bishop. Such an analysis is beyond the scope of this report but there may be benefits to the overall organization of local government by a consolidation of local agencies within the Bishop area.

Another option might be the formation of an Inyo County Joint Powers Fire Authority that would combine and coordinate all of the local fire protection services in the County.

Management Efficiencies

The District, given its limited resources, exhibits the characteristics of a volunteer-based fire protection district efficiently serving its residents and customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The Board of Supervisors appoints the Board of Fire Commissioners. Agendas are posted for public review at all fire stations and in the local newspaper and on the radio.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous. The sphere extends north of the District to the Inyo/Mono County boundary and west to Rovana and the surrounding area.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

There are no known sphere change proposals at this time.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve sphere of influence determinations.





1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of City

The City of Bishop, the only city in Inyo County was incorporated on May 6, 1903. It is a general law city and operates pursuant to laws of the State of California (Government Code. Section 34000 et seq.).

It is governed by a five-member city council, all of whom are elected at large. It has a city administrator form of government and is a "full service" city, providing most essential city services. See the organization chart.

The City is located in northern Inyo County, on both sides of State Highway 395 at its intersections with State Highways 6 and 168.

The City's sphere is larger than its boundaries. A map of the City and its sphere is included in this report.

City Services

The City provides a broad variety of municipal services, which include:

- □ Law enforcement including traffic law enforcement
- □ Fire prevention and suppression
- Parks and recreation programs
- □ Open space maintenance
- □ Land use planning and regulation of buildings
- □ Retail and wholesale water supply, including water conservation
- □ Wastewater collection, treatment and disposal
- □ Street maintenance including bridges and culverts
- □ Street lighting
- □ Drainage, flood control and storm water disposal

The City provides water service to local entities outside of the City. It participates in a California Joint Powers Insurance Authority.

The City tracks services provided in various ways, depending on the type of service. There are 1,120 water and wastewater accounts.

The City's permanent population is approximately 3,643 residents while the population of the entire "Greater Bishop" area is approximately 15,000.

Other Governmental Agencies within the City

Local agencies that overlap the City include the Eastern Sierra Community Services District, Northern Inyo Hospital District, Pioneer Cemetery District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

Local agencies in the vicinity of the City but not necessarily overlapping the City include the Bishop Rural Fire Protection District and the Eastern Sierra, Indian Creek, Lazy A, Mesa, Sierra Highlands, Starlite and Westridge Community Services Districts.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The City provides and maintains a variety of facilities to extend public services to its residents, property owners and visitors. The City's Capital Plan identifies projects for construction to improve and maintain the City's public services.

By identifying these current and future needs the City is able to plan for sufficient financing and sequencing of construction to meet its probable needs.

Growth and Population Projections

The City population represents about 23% of the population of the Greater Bishop area. Growth is constrained by the amount of publicly-owned lands surrounding the City.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The City's enterprise funds, including water and wastewater rely primarily on user fees and charges. Rates are established based upon costs of service and are intended to recover all costs, including capital and depreciation.

The City General Fund relies primarily on various taxes such as property, sales and transient occupancy for 84% of General Fund revenues. Receipts from other agencies represent about 6% and fees for service contribute another 5.2 % of revenues.

The City is subject to the funding regulations applicable to municipalities throughout the State and is therefore subject to broad changes in revenue allocation based on the State budget and its relationship to local funding sources.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There are no obvious cost avoidance opportunities that the City has not implemented.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The opportunity for restructuring rates occurs during annual budget processes and the adoption of each rate ordinance. Moreover, the City is implementing a planned series of water and sewer rate increases which are separate from the annual budget review process.

The City is preparing master plans for water and sewers systems which will include a review of rates.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There may be significant opportunities for sharing facilities if the infrastructure serving the developed areas surrounding the City were owned and managed by one agency. The City reports these might including sharing facilities with the Eastern Sierra, Indian Creek and Westridge Community Services Districts.

Government Structure Options

Governmental structure options may become apparent if areas surrounding the City were annexed and the special districts that provide services in those areas were merged with the City government.

Management Efficiencies

The City exhibits the characteristics of a well-managed agency operating efficiently and serving its residents and customers effectively.

Local Accountability and Governance

The City is a relatively compact government, which enhances the ability of the public to participate in its activities. The City Council is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the City.

The City maintains many public outreach programs. City Council meetings are televised. Agendas and minutes are posted, sent to the media and mailed to those who have request this information and available on the City's website (www.ca-bishop.us).

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The City's sphere is larger than its boundaries and includes much of the urbanized area in the vicinity of the City. A map of the City and its sphere is included in this report.

Potential Sphere Changes

In response to the MSR Request for Information, the City responded that it did not feel that its boundaries are correct at this time and that there are areas it possibly desires to serve that are not now within its boundaries.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve sphere of influence determinations.

If, after conducting a public hearing, the Commission determines to expand the City's Sphere, the staff will draft the appropriate determinations required by the sphere of influence statute and in so doing will consider the information in this MSR.

The potential for sphere expansions is evident by the fact that much of the urbanized area within the general "Bishop community" is unincorporated land. Consideration of this option would entail examination of the City's existing general plan and the potential for and possible interest in general plan amendments.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Darwin Community Services District was formed in 1967 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Gov't Code, Section 61000 et seq.)

The District includes the community of Darwin. Its boundary and sphere of influence are coterminous.

The District is governed by a five-member board of directors, elected at-large.

District Services

The District provides retail water supply to 63 connections.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Mt. Whitney Cemetery District, Southern Inyo Health Care District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District does not have a Capital Improvement Plan nor does it plan to expand its service area. Water is obtained from a natural spring eight miles southeast of the town. A moratorium has been in place for approximately 20 years due to limited water supply.

Growth and Population Projections

Population growth is not an issue to the District in providing water services. It has no plans to expand its service area or the number of connections..

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District has not provided a budget, nor did it provide a financial audit. It is assumed charges for service provide sufficient revenue for operations but that information has not been provided.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

District did not indicate any cost avoidance opportunities that are being considered.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There do not appear to be any opportunities to restructure rates with only 63 connections.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There do not appear to be opportunities to share facilities with other water agencies.

Government Structure Options

There do not appear to be any government structure options available to the District.

Management Efficiencies

The District appears to economically serve its customers; it has no employees and an independent contractor who serves as secretary/treasurer.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District all of whom are neighbors in immediate proximity to each other. District reports that it operates by "word of mouth" and yearly meetings.

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere are included.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates its boundaries are correct and there are no plans to annex areas that are not now within the Sphere of Influence.

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The East Independence Sanitary District was formed in 1967 and operates pursuant to the Sanitary District Act of 1923 (Health & Safety Code, Section 6400 et seq.).

The District includes part of the community of Independence east of Highway 395. Its boundary and sphere of influence are not coterminous, with areas beyond the District to the north, south and east being within the sphere.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The Board Secretary is responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District owns and operates a sewage collection system consisting of 4,438 feet of sewer lines that serves 63 homes.

Effluent from the system is treated and disposed of by the County of Inyo (previously by the City of Los Angeles Department of Water and Power) at the Independence sewage treatment plant.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Independence Cemetery District, Independence Fire Protection District, Southern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District collection system is adequate for its current customer base. No expansions are projected.

Growth and Population Projections

No expansion or growth of the District is planned or projected. Surrounding lands are primarily public lands owned by the Department of Water and Power, limiting potential population growth.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed by service fees collected through the County property tax system. This revenue source may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There are no obvious opportunities to avoid costs, other than dissolving the District and having the collection system operated by the agency that provides sewer collection for the remainder of the community.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity to restructure rates during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each rate schedule.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities to share facilities other than what is already being done. The District's collection system is a fixed asset with no plans for expansion. The District utilizes the wastewater treatment plant for the community of Independence.

Government Structure Options

The District could be dissolved and its assets transferred to the agency that collects, treats and disposes of sewage for the remainder of the community of Independence.

This would result in a reduction of the number of local agencies serving the community of Independence with no reduction in the range or level of services provided.

Management Efficiencies

The District is small, with 63 connections, and operates efficiently to serve its customers but its administrative functions could be provided by the agency that provides sewers for the remainder of the community of Independence.

Local Accountability and Governance

The Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters within the District. The District posts notices of its infrequent meetings at the County Courthouse.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

District boundaries and sphere of influence differ, with the sphere extending beyond the District to the north, south and east. A map of the District and its sphere is included.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates its boundaries are correct and there are no plans to annex areas that are not now within the District.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.

4. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS & REFERENCES

The Inyo LAFCO staff prepared this Municipal Service Review. Responsibility for any errors or omissions rests with those who prepared the report.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Eastern Sierra Community Services District was formed November 8, 1977 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Government Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District includes portions of the City of Bishop and adjacent areas immediately to the west. Its boundary and sphere of influence are different, with the sphere including nearby areas to the north and south that are not within the District.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The Office Manager is responsible for administrative functions. An organization chart is attached.

District Services

The District provides for the collection, treatment and disposal of wastewater.

It serves approximately 3,000 residences and businesses including, by means of an out-of-agency agreement, the Bishop Indian Reservation.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Bishop Rural Fire Protection District; City of Bishop; Indian Creek, Lazy A, Sierra Highlands and Westridge Community Services Districts; Pioneer Cemetery District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District does not have a Capital Improvement Plan, although it maintains a Capital Replacement Fund, funded by service fees, to replace capital improvements as needed

The City of Bishop reports the District's wastewater treatment plant is close to reaching its capacity and if the plans of the Bishop Paiute Tribe plans for development are realized the increase in sewage effluent would exceed the capacity of the existing plant.

Growth and Population Projections

Potential population growth within the District's boundaries that may cause demands on District facilities does not appear to be an issue for the District in providing future sanitation services. It has not prepared service demand projections.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District imposed service charges provide sufficient ongoing revenue for operations and a capital replacement reserve, with revenue from interest being the second greatest source.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

Cost savings include competitive bidding and interagency purchasing. The City of Bishop also provides sewage collection, treatment and disposal services and the District and City have a working relationship, for example sharing operational staff during the installation of water lines to their respective treatment plants.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity to restructure service charges during the annual budget review and approval process in compliance with Proposition 218 requirements.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

The District reports there may be opportunities for shared facilities given the close location of the District and the City of Bishop. The District and City periodically review opportunities for sharing facilities.

The City reports that the District wastewater treatment plant is next to the City plant and such proximity has allowed the diversion of effluent flows between the plants in the past.

There may be options to share facilities between these agencies, especially considering the fact the District plant is approaching its capacity and the City's plant is operating at about half its capacity.

Government Structure Options

There may be opportunities for government structure options given the close location of the District and the City of Bishop, another local sanitation agency.

Management Efficiencies

The District exhibits characteristics of a well-managed agency effectively serving its residents and customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. The District posts its Board agendas in a place accessible to the public.

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere are included.





1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Independence Cemetery District was formed in 1954 and operates pursuant to Health & Safety Code Section 9000 et seq..

The District includes the community of Independence and extends east and west to the county boundary. Its boundary and sphere of influence are coterminous.

The District is governed by a three -member board of directors appointed by the Board of Supervisors. A General Manager is responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District provides interments and cemetery services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Independence Community Services District, East Independence Sanitary District, Independence Fire Protection District, Southern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District infrastructure is sufficient to meet current needs. It does not have an adopted Capital Improvement Plan but plans to "plot out" undeveloped section of cemetery when the need exists.

Growth and Population Projections

District services do not affect the rate or location of development and there is an indirect relationship between population and demands for District services. Significant growth is not anticipated in the Independence area.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District operations are financed primarily by property taxes with some revenues from the sale of grave plots and service fees. These combined sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There do not appear to be obvious cost-avoidance opportunities.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Independence Fire Protection District was formed in 1888 and operates pursuant to the Fire Protection District Law on 1987 (Health and Safety Code, Section 13800 et seq.).

The District includes the community of Independence and some surrounding areas. Its sphere of influence extends beyond the District in all directions.

The District is governed by a three member board of directors, elected at-large. The Fire Chief is responsible for administration. There are three part-time employees and a number of volunteer fire fighters.

District Services

The District provides fire prevention, suppression and emergency medical response.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the East Independence Sanitary District, Independence Cemetery District, Independence Community Services District, Southern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District provides fire suppression services from one fire station in Independence. The District does not have a capital improvement plan.

It appears the District can accommodate service demands from this facility, with mutual and automatic aid agreements in place with neighboring fire service agencies including the California Division of Forestry (CDF), Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Forest Service, Fort Independence Indian Reservation and other Fire Protection Districts.

Growth and Population Projections

The District provides services as population growth occurs. Its services do not affect the rate or location of development. Significant growth is not expected in Independence.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed largely by a portion of property taxes levied within its borders, with some income from ambulance service calls.

Current revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations, provided the State does not continue to erode local government's property tax receipts.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in mutual aid and response agreements with other emergency response agencies. Being a volunteer fire protection agency minimizes service expenses.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There are no obvious opportunities for rate restructuring in the operations of the District.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities shared facilities due to the location of Independence in relationship to other communities and fire protection agencies.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options other than perhaps consolidating the District with the Independence Community Services District, though no interest has been expressed in this or other reorganization possibilities.

Another option might be the formation of an Inyo County Joint Powers Fire Authority that would combine and coordinate all of the local fire protection services in the County.

Management Efficiencies

The District, given its limited resources, exhibits the characteristics of a volunteer-based fire protection district efficiently serving its residents and customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. Board agendas are posted for public review.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous. The sphere is larger than the District, extending beyond the District in all directions.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

There are no known sphere change proposals at this time.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve sphere of influence determinations.





1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Indian Creek Community Services District was formed August 24, 1999 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Government Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District is located in the vicinity of the City of Bishop and includes a tract of homes south of and adjacent to Highway 168. The District boundary and sphere of influence are different, with the sphere including land to the east, west and south of the District.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The General Manager is responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District provides retail water delivery. The District services 213 water connections.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Bishop Rural Fire Protection District, Pioneer Cemetery District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District's consulting engineer is currently preparing a formal Capital Improvement Plan for review and approval by the Board of Directors.

Growth and Population Projections

No growth within the District is proposed, nor does the District anticipate changing its boundaries except for possible annexation of or consolidation with the nearby Westridge Community Services District.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed almost entirely by water service fees, with monthly contributions to its capital replacement fund and some interest revenue. Current revenue sources appear adequate to avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District receives monthly contributions from its customers to a capital improvement fund, which may avoid the need for future assessments to replace lines or equipment.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity for rate restructuring during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each rate ordinance.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

Preliminary consideration is being given to a possible annexation of or consolidation with the Westridge CSD, which may result in opportunities for shared facilities and staff.

The City of Bishop reports it has a 12-inch water line in proximity to the District's main production wells and distribution system and there have been preliminary discussions between the City and District regarding possible mutual benefits of a connection between the water systems.

Government Structure Options

An option being considered by the District would be annexation of or consolidation with the Westridge CSD.

Management Efficiencies

The District has two part-time and one contract employee. It exhibits the characteristics of a well-managed agency operating efficiently and serving its customers effectively.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District is a compact government, which enhances the public's ability to participate in its activities. The Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. The District complies with the State's open meeting laws.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere is included.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates its boundaries are correct at this time, but consideration is being given to a possible annexation of or consolidation with the Westridge CSD.

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.







The District provides sewage collection, treatment and disposal for approximately 380 connections with its boundaries. In addition it serves four properties by contract outside of the District, the Frontier motel, Day's Inn, USFS Visitor's Center and Lone Pine Paiute-Shoshone Reservation.

The District is currently negotiating with the County of Inyo to assume responsibility for the community of Lone Pine's water system.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Lone Pine Fire Protection District, Mt. Whitney Cemetery District, Southern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District does not have a Capital Improvement Plan.

Growth and Population Projections

Potential population growth that may cause demands on District facilities does not appear to be an issue for the District in providing future sanitation services. It has not prepared service demand projections.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District imposed service charges collected on the tax roll provide sufficient ongoing revenue for operations, with revenue from a State grant and interest being other sources.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

District did not indicate any cost avoidance opportunities that are being considered.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity to restructure service charges during the annual budget review and approval process.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There do not appear to be opportunities for shared facilities with other sewage agencies.

Government Structure Options

There do not appear to be government structure options available to the District, though consideration is being given to becoming responsible for the Lone Pine water system.

Management Efficiencies

The District exhibits the characteristics of an agency that is economically serving its residents customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. The District posts the agendas 72 hours before Board meetings.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous; the sphere extends south and north of the District. A map of the District and its sphere is included.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Lone Pine Fire Protection District was formed in January 1964 and operates pursuant to the Fire Protection District Law of 1987 (Health & Safety Code, Section 13800 et seq.)

The District includes the community of Lone Pine. Its sphere of influence extends beyond the District in all directions.

The District is governed by a five member board of directors, elected at-large. The Fire Chief is responsible for administration. It is staffed by 35 volunteer fire fighters.

District Services

The District provides fire prevention, suppression and emergency medical response.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Lone Pine Community Services District, Mt. Whitney Cemetery District, Southern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District provides fire suppression services from one fire station in Lone Pine. The District does not have a capital improvement plan.

It appears the District can accommodate service demands from this facility, with mutual and automatic aid agreements in place with neighboring fire service agencies including the California Division of Forestry (CDF), Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Forest Service and Olancha, Independence, Big Pine and Bishop Rural Fire Protection Districts.

Growth and Population Projections

The District provides services as population growth occurs. Its services do not affect the rate or location of development. Significant growth is not anticipated in the Lone Pine, area; the District has indicated an interest in annexing the Whitney Portal Project.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed largely by a portion of property taxes levied within its borders, with some income from ambulance service calls.

Current revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations, provided the State does not continue to erode local government's property tax receipts.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in mutual aid and response agreements with other emergency response agencies. Being a volunteer fire protection agency minimizes service expenses.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There are no obvious opportunities for rate restructuring in the operations of the District.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities shared facilities due to the location of Lone Pine in relationship to other communities and fire protection agencies.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options other than perhaps consolidating the District with the Lone Pine Community Services District, though no interest has been expressed in this or other reorganization possibilities.

Another option might be the formation of an Inyo County Joint Powers Fire Authority that would combine and coordinate all of the local fire protection services in the County.

Management Efficiencies

The District, given its limited resources, exhibits the characteristics of a volunteer-based fire protection district efficiently serving its residents and customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. Board agendas and minutes are posted for public review.

3 SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous. Its sphere of influence extends beyond the District in all directions.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

There are no known sphere change proposals at this time.

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve sphere of influence determinations.





The District includes the community of Lone Pine and extends east, west and south to the county boundary. Its boundary and sphere of influence are contiguous.

The District is governed by a three -member board of directors appointed by the Board of Supervisors. A Cemetery Manager is responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District provides interments and cemetery services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Keeler Community Services District, Lone Pine Community Services District, Olancha Community Services District, Lone Pine Fire Protection District, Olancha Fire Protection District, Southern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2 MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District owns and operates three cemeteries:

- Mt. Whitney Cemetery (four acres, possibly two additional acres.)
- Old Cemetery (3.2 acres)
- Historic 1872 Earthquake Victim Cemetery (less than one acre)

The District experiences approximately 25 burials a year; if it establishes the District has ownership rights to two acres adjacent to the existing four acre cemetery, it anticipates having capacity for 25-30 years of interments.

Growth and Population Projections

District services do not affect the rate or location of development and there is an indirect relationship between population and demands for District services. Significant growth is not anticipated in the Mount Whitney area.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District operations are financed primarily by property taxes with some revenues from the sale of grave plots and service fees. These combined sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There do not appear to be obvious cost-avoidance opportunities.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity for rate restructuring during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each service fee schedule.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities due to District operations.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options. There are five Cemetery Districts in Inyo County and each has a close, unique relationship with their respective community.

There may be potential economies of scale by sharing staff or work crews among these Districts such relationships should be voluntary and contractual.

Management Efficiencies

Given its small service area the District operates efficiently in serving its customers. There may be potential economies of scale by sharing staff or work crews among cemetery districts but such relationships should voluntary and contractual.

Local Accountability and Governance

The Board of Supervisors appoints the Board of Directors. Board agendas are posted for public review at Statham Hall, Lone Pine's community center.



WHEREAS, on March 14, 2019 the Olancha Community Service District submitted an application to the Inyo Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) to annex ten (10) parcels of land with Assessor Tax Numbers: 033-220-33; 033-220-32; 033-220-35; 033-220-34; 033-220-26; 033-220-27; 033-220-23; 033-220-44; 033-220-45; 033-220-10; located in the southwest area of the community of Olancha; and

WHEREAS, on December 6, 2018 the OCSD adopted Resolution No. 1812-01 making certain findings and indicating that the parcels should be annexed into the District upon certain conditions of approval; and

WHEREAS, the OCSD has the ability to provide services, and provision of fire protection, suppression and emergency services by the OCSD is the best alternative for those services to the proposed parcels; and

WHEREAS, the District can provide adequate fire protection, suppression and emergency services to the proposed parcels, and the owners will pay taxes to offset costs, and the annexation is not expected to substantially alter overall costs and revenues; and

WHEREAS, the proposed boundaries are logical, contiguous, not difficult to serve, definite, certain and conform to existing assessment lines; and

WHEREAS, the annexation would have no negative effects on adjacent population areas or other community service providers, and no outside agencies have objected to the proposed annexation; and

WHEREAS, the annexation is consistent with the County General Plan and Zoning Ordinance as they relate to the service to be provided, and the proposed parcels are neither prime agricultural land nor open space; and

WHEREAS, the project is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to a Class 1 Categorical Exemption (CEQA Guidelines Section 15301 – Existing Facilities) and a Class 19 Categorical Exemption (Annexation of Existing Facilities and Lots for Exempt Facilities), and none of the exceptions to the exemptions specified by CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2 apply; and

WHEREAS, on May 16, 2019 the Inyo LAFCO conducted a public hearing regarding the proposal and considered the staff report and all the evidence in the record and public comment.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Inyo LAFCO does hereby approve Annexation No. 2019-01/Olancha Community Service District, subject to the following condition:

• The applicant shall be required to provide all information and fees necessary for the filing of the Certificate of Completion; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Inyo LAFCO hereby waives protest proceedings pursuant to Government Code Section 56663.

1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Olancha Community Services District was formed in 1961 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Gov't Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District includes the community of Olancha. Its sphere of influence extends beyond the District boundaries to the north, south and east.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The District has two part-time employees and utilizes volunteer fire fighters.

District Services

The District provides fire prevention, suppression and emergency medical response.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Mt. Whitney Cemetery District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District provides fire suppression services from one fire station in Olancha. The District does not have a capital improvement plan.

It appears the District can accommodate service demands from this facility, with mutual and automatic aid agreements in place with neighboring fire service agencies.

Growth and Population Projections

The District provides services as population growth occurs. Its services do not affect the rate or location of development. Significant growth is not expected in Olancha.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed largely by a portion of property taxes levied within its borders, with some income from ambulance service calls.

Current revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations, provided the State does not continue to erode local government's property tax receipts.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in mutual aid and response agreements with other emergency response agencies. Being a volunteer fire protection agency minimizes service expenses.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There are no obvious opportunities for rate restructuring in the operations of the District.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities shared facilities due to the location of Olancha in relationship to other communities and fire protection agencies.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options.

Another option might be the formation of an Inyo County Joint Powers Fire Authority that would combine and coordinate all of the local fire protection services in the County.

Management Efficiencies

The District, given its limited resources, exhibits the characteristics of a volunteer-based fire protection district efficiently serving its residents and customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. Meeting dates are publicized. Board agendas are posted for public review.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are not coterminous. The sphere is larger than the District, extending beyond the District to the north, south and east.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

There are no known sphere change proposals at this time.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve sphere of influence determinations.

4. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS & REFERENCES

The Inyo LAFCO staff prepared this Municipal Service Review. Responsibility for any errors or omissions rests with those who prepared the report.

The Olancha Community Services District provided the basic information and documents upon which the evaluation is based. The District staff, notably Board Clerk/Secretary Linda Anderson, was instrumental in providing data.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Northern Inyo Hospital District was formed in 1946 and operates pursuant to the Local Health Care District Act (Health & Safety Code, Section 32000 et seq.).

The District occupies northern Inyo County. Its boundary and sphere of influence are coterminous.

A five-member board of directors, elected from divisions, governs the District. The Chief Executive Officer is responsible for administrative functions. There are 210 full time, 134 part time and seven contract employees.

An organization chart is attached as is the District's Mission Statement.

District Services

The District provides hospital services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the City of Bishop, Pioneer and Big Pine Cemetery Districts, Bishop Rural, Big Pine and Independence Fire Protection Districts, Eastern Sierra, Indian Creek, Lazy A, Mesa, Sierra Highlands, Starlite and Westridge Community Services Districts and the Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

This District is giving attention to its capital improvement needs. An extensive study was undertaken in 2004 in which the Hospital District goals, needs and evaluation of planned hospital replacement were studied. The potential improvements are not driven so much by growth of the community as it is by the age of current facilities, need to increase efficiency to lower operating costs and attract and retain professional staff.

These issues do not affect the District's Sphere of Influence or boundaries.

Growth and Population Projections

Growth within the District will be limited due to general factors affecting development in Inyo County. The hospital is expected to be able to provide services as needed to the current and future population, especially if planned capital improvements are built.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

Nearly all funding comes from revenues produced from the services rendered. Only 1% of its expenses is funded by District tax receipts. Like many public hospital and health care agencies the District faces challenges related to securing sufficient revenues to fund the services provided, including chronic underpayments from Medicare and MediCal.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in a joint purchasing agreement with the Western Alliance of Healthcare.

It feels that in rebuilding facilities it can incorporate more energy efficient design and employ labor saving designs and technologies.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has an extensive list of rates and charges, reflective of the array of services that are provided. Within statutory and funding agency regulations it has the opportunity to restructure rates with the adoption of rate ordinances .

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities due to the location of the hospital in relationship to other health care facilities.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options, other than the possible consolidation of the two health care districts in Inyo County. The District has not expressed interest in a consolidation with the Southern Inyo Health Care District.

Management Efficiencies

The District exhibits the characteristics of a well-managed agency operating efficiently within complex regulations and serving its residents and customers effectively.

Local Accountability and Governance

The Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to voters who reside in the District. District agendas are distributed to local media and agendas and minutes are posted in the hospital cafeteria accessible to the public.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere are included.

Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates that its boundaries are not correct and it plans to serve the Chalfant Valley and communities of Paradise and Swall Meadows in Mono County. Such an annexation will require an amendment to the District's Sphere of Influence.

Sphere of Influence Determinations

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.

4. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS & REFERENCES

The Inyo LAFCO staff prepared this Municipal Service Review. Responsibility for any errors or omissions rests with those who prepared the report.

The Northern Inyo Hospital District provided the information and documents upon which the evaluation is based. District staff, notably Chief Executive Officer John Halfen was instrumental in providing data. The District did an excellent job in providing information requested for this analysis and is commended for its effort.

1 MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Pioneer Cemetery District was formed in 1926 and operates pursuant to Health & Safety Code Section 9000 et seq..

The District includes the community of City of Bishop and surrounding areas. Its boundary and sphere of influence are coterminous.

The District is governed by a three -member board of directors appointed by the Board of Supervisors. An Administrator is responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District provides interments and cemetery services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the City of Bishop, Bishop Rural Fire Protection District, Northern Inyo Hospital District, Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District and the Eastern Sierra, Indian Creek, Lazy A, Mesa, Sierra Highlands, Starlite and Westridge Community Services Districts.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District owns and operates two cemeteries. East Line is located at 2000 Poleta Road and West Line is at 160 Pioneer Lane, both in Bishop. More than 75 years of capacity are remaining in these facilities.

Growth and Population Projections

District services do not affect the rate or location of development and there is an indirect relationship between population and demands for District services. Significant growth is not anticipated in the Bishop area.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District operations are financed primarily by property taxes with some revenues from the sale of grave plots and service fees. These combined sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There do not appear to be obvious cost-avoidance opportunities.

The District has the opportunity for rate restructuring during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each service fee schedule.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities due to District operations though having two cemeteries allows for sharing of staff and support activities.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options. There are five Cemetery Districts in Inyo County and each has a close, unique relationship with their respective community.

Management Efficiencies

The District appears to operate efficiently. There may be potential economies of scale by sharing staff or work crews among cemetery districts but such relationships should be voluntary and contractual.

Local Accountability and Governance

The Board of Supervisors appoints the Board of Directors. Notices of board meetings are placed in the local newspaper.

3. SPHERE OF INFLUENCE REVIEW AND UPDATE

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere are included.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates its boundaries are correct and there are no plans to annex areas that are not now within the District.

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.





1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Sierra Highlands Community Services District was formed December 17, 1974 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Government Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District is located in the vicinity of the City of Bishop. It has an irregular shape and boundary and sphere of influence differ. The Sphere includes nearby streets that are not presently within the District.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The General Manager is responsible for operational and administrative functions.

The District's Mission Statement provides that:

The District has a responsibility to all customers receiving service to provide reliable, safe water that is free of any contamination.

The System was established for a community of individual residences. System facilities, equipment, operations and employees have been set up and are guided by the a Board of Directors to provide potable water for private use at an affordable costs in order to accommodate individual owners

District Services

The District provides retail water delivery to 212 water connections. There are meters at each well source but not on individual services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Bishop Rural Fire Protection District, Eastern Sierra Community Services District, Pioneer Cemetery District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District's water supply is groundwater. It maintains three wells, a primary source well, stand-by well for summer months and secondary summer stand-by well.

This District maintains a Capital Replacement Fund supported by annual contributions.

The areas adjacent to the District are receiving water private wells or other sources so the anticipated expansion of the District is limited. The District anticipates annexing Tentative Tract #243 in order to provide water for these proposed 17 single-family dwelling units.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Sierra North Community Services District was formed in 1985 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Gov't Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District is located in the vicinity of the City of Bishop. Its boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District.

District Services

The District provides water service for 16 homes, and appears to operate similarly to a mutual water company.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Bishop Rural Fire Protection District, Pioneer Cemetery District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2.MSR DETERMINATIONS

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District does not have a Capital Improvement Plan nor does it plan to expand its service area.

Growth and Population Projections

Population growth is not an issue to the District in providing water services. It has no plans to expand its service area, which is currently fully built out.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District has not provided a budget, and in fact states it does not have one, nor did it provide a financial audit. It is assumed charges for service provide sufficient revenue for operations but that information has not been provided.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

District did not indicate any cost avoidance opportunities that are being considered.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There do not appear to be any opportunities to restructure rates with only 16 connections consisting of comparable residential uses.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There do not appear to be opportunities to share facilities with other water agencies.

Government Structure Options

A government structure option available to the District might be to consolidate with other nearby water purveyors or dissolve and have the service area assumed by another agency.

Management Efficiencies

The District appears to economically serve its customers; it reports no employees and an annual meeting of the board of directors.

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District all of whom are neighbors in immediate proximity to each other. District reports that it operates by "word of mouth" and yearly meetings.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Southern Inyo Fire Protection District was formed in 1993 and operates pursuant to the Fire Protection District Law of 1987 (Health & Safety Code, Section 13800 et seq.).

The District is located in southeast Inyo County, including seven small communities including Tecopa and surrounding areas. The District boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous

The District is governed by a five member board of directors, elected at-large. The Fire Chief is responsible for administration. It is staffed by 12 volunteer fire fighters.

District Services

The District provides fire suppression, hazardous materials and emergency medical and basic life support services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Southern Inyo Hospital District, Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District and the Tecopa Cemetery District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District provides fire suppression services from one fire station in Tecopa. The District does not have an adopted capital improvement plan.

It appears the District can accommodate service demands from its facilities, with mutual and automatic aid agreements in place with neighboring fire service agencies covering Amargosa valley and Pahrump, Nevada, and the Bureau of Land Management.

Growth and Population Projections

The District provides services as population growth occurs. The District is planning for possible major growth in Charleston View; a development project in that location may increase the District population by more than 600% within ten years.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

The District is financed largely by Federal and State grants, assessments and income from ambulance service calls.

Current revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations, though the anticipated population growth in Charleston View will increase tax revenues and may allow the District to increase its services to that community.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

The District participates in mutual aid and response agreements with other emergency response agencies. Being a volunteer fire protection agency minimizes service expenses.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

There are no obvious opportunities for rate restructuring in the operations of the District.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities shared facilities due to the location of Tecopa in relationship to other communities and fire protection agencies.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options.

Another option might be the formation of an Inyo County Joint Powers Fire Authority that would combine and coordinate all of the local fire protection services in the County, though Tecopa is distant from the other fire service agencies.

Management Efficiencies

The District, given its limited resources, exhibits the characteristics of a volunteer-based fire protection district efficiently serving its residents and customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. Board agendas are posted for public review in Tecopa, Tecopa Hot Springs and Shoshone.

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous.

There are no known sphere change proposals at this time.





1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Southern Inyo Health Care District was formed in 1949 and operates pursuant to the Local Health Care District Act (Health & Safety Code, Section 32000 et seq.).

The District occupies most of Southern Inyo County. Its boundary and sphere of influence are coterminous.

A five-member board of directors, elected from divisions, governs the District. The Chief Executive Officer is responsible for administrative functions. An organization chart is enclosed. The District has 90 employees - 53 full time, 19 part time, 17 seasonal and one contract.

District Services

The District provides hospital services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Darwin, Keeler, Lone Pine, Independence and Olancha Community Services Districts; East Independence Sanitary District; Independence and Mt. Whitney Cemetery Districts; Independence, Lone Pine and Southern Inyo Fire Protection Districts; and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District <u>has</u> a Capital Improvement Plan. District infrastructure does not affect the District's Sphere of Influence or boundaries.

Growth and Population Projections

Growth within the District will be limited due to general factors affecting development in Inyo County. The hospital is expected to be able to provide needed services to the current and future population.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

Nearly all funding comes from revenues produced from the services rendered. Less than eight percent of expenses are funded by District tax revenues. The District has service contracts with local public and private agencies to provide various clinic services.

The District has been extremely frugal since 200 when it filed for Chapter 9 bankruptcy which will be repaid completely this year.

Like many public hospital and health care agencies the District faces challenges related to securing sufficient revenues to fund services provided, including chronic underpayments from Medicare and MediCal.

The District notes that due to its small population and limited reimbursements by State and Federal government, the hospital deals with financial shortfalls, but with the passage of parcel tax measure A in November of 2005, the district will be able to stabilize their financial situation through the yearly infusion of tax revenue that will allow the district to make strategic changes and improvements in operations and services to increase the number of patients it serves.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There are no obvious cost avoidance opportunities at this time.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has an extensive list of rates and charges, reflective of the array of services that are provided. Within statutory and funding agency regulations it has the opportunity to restructure rates with the adoption of rate ordinances.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities due to the location of the hospital in relationship to other health care facilities, though it does have working relationships with the hospitals in both Bishop to the north and Ridgecrest to the south.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options, other than the possibly consolidating the two health care districts in Inyo County. The District has not expressed interest in a consolidation with the Northern Inyo Health Care District.

Management Efficiencies

The District appears to operate efficiently within complex regulations while serving its residents and customers effectively.

Local Accountability and Governance

The Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to voters who reside in the District. District agendas are distributed to local media and are posted in the community.



1. MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW

Description of District

The Starlite Community Services District was formed in 1986 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Gov't Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District is located in the vicinity of the City of Bishop and encompasses Starlite Estates. The District boundary and sphere of influence are identical.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The members of the Board are responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District provides retail water service to 68 connections.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Pioneer Cemetery District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2 MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District infrastructure is sufficient to meet current needs. It does not have an adopted Capital Improvement Plan.

Growth and Population Projections

The area is largely built out, though the District has indicated a challenge with developers within its boundaries not wishing to respect District development ordinances.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District operations are financed largely by water service fees. These revenue sources may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

Members of the District Board volunteer much of the labor for the District. There do not appear to be other obvious cost-avoidance opportunities.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity for rate restructuring during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each rate schedule.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities due to District operations.

Government Structure Options

There are no obvious government structure options.

Management Efficiencies

Given its small service area and reliance on volunteers, the District operates efficiently in serving its customers.

Local Accountability and Governance

The District is compact. The Board of Directors is elected by and accountable to the voters who reside in the District. The District posts agendas and notices of interest on the community bulletin board.

Description of Current Sphere of Influence

The District's boundaries and sphere of influence are coterminous. A map of the District and its sphere are included.

No Proposed Sphere Changes

The District indicates its boundaries are correct and there are no plans to annex areas that are not now within the District.

Inasmuch as no changes in the sphere of influence are proposed at this time it is not necessary for the Commission to adopt or approve any determinations.





The Westridge Community Services District was formed in 1962 and operates pursuant to the Community Services District Act (Gov't Code, Section 61000 et seq.).

The District is located in the vicinity of the City of Bishop south of and adjacent to West Line Road. The District boundary and sphere of influence are identical.

A five-member board of directors, elected at-large, governs the District. The District Secretary-Manager is responsible for administrative functions.

District Services

The District provides retail water delivery to 79 single-family dwelling units and one commercial use. The District also funds street lighting services.

Other Governmental Agencies within the District

The District overlaps the Bishop Rural Fire Protection District, Eastern Sierra Community Services District, Pioneer Cemetery District, Northern Inyo Hospital District and Inyo-Mono Resource Conservation District.

2. MSR DETERMINATIONS

This report addresses the MSR factors specified in LAFCO's governing statute.

Infrastructure Needs and Deficiencies

The District infrastructure is sufficient to meet current needs. It does not have an adopted Capital Improvement Plan. There are no plans to expand the infrastructure.

Growth and Population Projections

The area contains 79 homes and is largely built out.

Financing Constraints and Opportunities

District operations are financed by user fees and property taxes, revenue sources that may avoid long-term, unfunded District obligations. Each parcel within the District pays a uniform annual fee which is collected by the County along with property taxes.

Cost-Avoidance Opportunities

There do not appear to be obvious cost-avoidance opportunities, other than the possibility of joining with the adjacent Indian Creek Community Services District. These Districts currently have an emergency inter-tie connection.

Opportunities for Rate Restructuring

The District has the opportunity for restructure user fees during the annual budget process and with the adoption of each fee schedule.

Opportunities for Shared Facilities

There are no obvious opportunities for shared facilities, though operational consolidation is being considered with an adjacent CSD that also provides water service.


