November 4, 2025

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Inyo, State of California, met in regular session at the hour of 2:33 p.m., on November 4, 2025, in the Tecopa Community Center, Tecopa, CA, with the following Supervisors present: Chairperson Scott Marcellin, presiding, Will Wadelton, Jeff Griffiths, Jennifer Roeser and Trina Orrill. Also present: Interim County Administrative Officer Denelle Carrington, County Counsel John-Carl Vallejo, and Assistant Clerk of the Board Darcy Israel.

Pledge of Allegiance Supervisor Wadelton led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Employee Service Milestones

The Board of Supervisors recognized Rose Colon, Tecopa Operations Manager for Health and Human Services, for reaching 10 years of service to the County during the third quarter of 2025.

Public Comment I

The Chairperson asked for public comment related to items not calendared on the agenda and public comment was received from Patrick Donnelly.

County Department Reports

Public Works Transportation Planner Justine Kokx shared updates on the Connecting Tecopa Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Corridor Project and upcoming work planned for Old Spanish Trail and Stateline Road.

Public Works Director Mike Errante reported on projects in the southeast county including Tecopa Library/Community Center improvements, sewage pond repairs, and upcoming cooling center generator upgrades.

Health & Human Services Director Anna Scott said that CalFresh recipients whose benefits were delayed should expect a partial payment for the month of November with full delivery expected in December, assuming the federal shutdown ends.

Clerk of the Board – Approval of Minutes Moved by Supervisor Griffiths and seconded by Supervisor Wadelton to approve the regular Board of Supervisors meeting of October 21, 2025. Motion carried unanimously.

Board of Supervisors – Inyo Council for the Arts Designation/ Reso. # 2025-43 Moved by Supervisor Griffiths and seconded by Supervisor Wadelton to approve Resolution No. 2025-43, titled, "A Resolution of the Board of Supervisors, County of Inyo, State of California Designating Inyo Council for the Arts as a California State Arts Council Partner to Inyo County," and authorize the Chairperson to sign. Motion carried unanimously.

Public Works – Water Meter Purchase Moved by Supervisor Griffiths and seconded by Supervisor Wadelton to authorize a purchase order in an amount not to exceed \$543,933.61 payable to Core & Main LP of Lancaster, CA for the purchase of Kamstrup Water Meters, subject to County Counsel and Auditor review and approval as to form. Motion carried unanimously.

Update – Amargosa Conservancy To accommodate a scheduling conflict, Chairperson Marcellin took the Amargosa Conservancy's workshop report early, allowing Executive Director Mason Voehl to speak on current issues and projects.

Planning Department – Bonanza Peak Solar Project Planning Department Associate Planner Cynthia Draper introduced members of the Bonzana Peak Solar Project: Lead Developer Larry Greene, Engineer Steve Pochmara, Senior Director of Permitting Stephanie Lauer and Helix Environmental Planning Consultant Robert Edgerton. Lauer and Greene provided information and updates on the project and answered questions.

Board of Supervisors MINUTES 1 November 4, 2025

CAO – Tecopa Hot Springs Concessionaire Introduction Deputy CAO Meaghan McCamman provided a summary of the search and selection process for a new concessionaire and formally introduced the Board to Lance and Vanessa Hamrick of Flippin-Hamrick, LLC, the newly appointed concessionaire for Tecopa Campground and Hot Springs.

CAO – Tecopa Hot Springs Updated Fee Schedule

Lance Hamrick outlined some of the challenges his team has run into, provided contact information, thanked community members for their support, and responded to several questions from the public, who had concerns about the increase in rates and the impact on low-income residents. Members of the audience also wanted to know about the projected opening date, hours, and planned repairs. The Board expressed appreciation to Mr. Hamrick for assuming the responsibility and extended best wishes for success in the role.

Moved by Supervisor Roeser and seconded by Supervisor Wadelton to approve new rates as requested by and to be charged by Flippin-Hamrick, LLC for use of the Tecopa Hot Springs Campground & Pools. Motion carried unanimously.

Workshop

Chairperson Marcellin continued the Southeast Inyo Workshop and received updates from the following individuals and organizations:

- Death Valley National Park a written report was presented by Supervisor Wadelton on behalf of Acting Deputy Superintendent Abby Wines, who was unable to attend due to the current federal government shutdown,
- Southern Inyo Fire Protection District Chief Bill Lutz and District Board Member Robin Flinchum, and
- Center for Biological Diversity Great Basin Director Patrick Donnelly.

Chairperson Marcellin asked if there were any other interested parties who would like to provide updates, and Death Valley School District Superintendent Jim Copeland also gave a report.

Board of Supervisors – Friends of the Amargosa Basin National Monument/ Reso. #2025-44 Executive Director of Friends of the Amargosa Basin Cameron Mayer shared updates on efforts made to secure federal recognition of the Amargosa Basin as a designated National Monument.

Public comment was received from several members of the community including Robin Flinchum, Timbisha Shoshone Tribal Council member George Gholson, Billy Eichenbaum, and Friends Board member Toni Kizzia, all of whom spoke in favor of the monument designation – as did Friends Board member Matt Kingsley. Additionally, Assistant Clerk of the Board Israel read a comment into record from Cynthia Kienitz, who expressed concerns about impacts on her business.

Moved by Supervisor Roeser and seconded by Supervisor Wadelton to approve Resolution No. 2025-44, titled, "A Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Inyo, State of California, in Support of the Establishment of the Proposed Amargosa Basin National Monument," and authorize the Chairperson to sign. Motion carried unanimously.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

This is the thirty-third (33rd) consecutive year that the department has applied for this grant. The anticipated grant for the 2025–2026 Federal Fiscal Year is \$276,712 for the period of October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026.

Victim/Witness Assistance Program augments the services provided by the Office of the District Attorney, including crisis intervention, emergency assistance, resource assistance, follow-up counseling, victim compensation, property return, orientation to the criminal justice system, court escort and support, presentation to criminal justice, victim service providers and the media, case status reports, notification of family and friends, employer notification, restitution assistance, creditor intervention, child care assistance, witness notification, funeral arrangement assistance, crime prevention information, temporary restraining order assistance, transportation, and court waiting area. This grant funding covers 35% of the salary and benefits costs for three Legal Advocacy Specialists as well as 40% of the salary and benefits costs for the Administrative Operations Coordinator for the District Attorney's Office.

As a new requirement this year from Cal OES, we are now obligated to submit a Proof of Authority to accept and utilize the funds on behalf of the County of Inyo in order to complete the grant application process. In previous years, this step was taken after the application had already been submitted and the subaward had been granted. We are asking that this Board authorize the District Attorney, or her designee, to sign any documentation to accept and utilize the grant on behalf of the County.

Inyo County Victim/Witness provides comprehensive services to victims of all crime types, while concentrating services on victims of the most serious cases likely to result in trauma to

the victim or the victim's family. A staff dedicated to the necessity of compassionate and comprehensive services achieves this goal by closely following grant guidelines and project

policy. The Victim/Witness mission is to encourage and support victims and witnesses of crime to help overcome the effects of crime, self-empowerment as they move through the

process and ultimately be able to return to their lives and families. The California Penal Code mandates services provided to victims of crimes and this program tailors those services

to meet the needs specific to Inyo County clients.

Operational Agreements are in place with Inyo County Sheriff, Bishop Police Department, California Highway Patrol, Inyo County Probation Department and Wild Iris Family

Counseling and Crisis Center. Training and presentations are offered to the local schools, law enforcement, Wild Iris Crisis Family Counseling and Crisis Center, and other

Community Groups. Participation on the Domestic Violence Council, Domestic Violence and Child Death Review Team, Addiction Task Force Committee and Sexual Assault

Response Team (SART) help to nurture close working networks between service providers and victim advocates.

Services are provided to special need clients through referrals to local resources available in the community. Field visits are provided to clients when appropriate and safe.

Accommodations are made to facilitate access to the office and the courts for disabled clients, including coordination of the use of the handicapped accessible courtroom on the

ground level of the historic courthouse. Elderly clients may be visited at home for interviews. Transportation assistance is also provided when needed. Project works closely with Adult

Protective Services when a client is referred for services or project staff obtains an Elder Abuse Restraining Order. Contact information is available in the office for a certified interpreter

for hearing impaired clients. Advocacy problem solve to meet the special needs of clients to the best of their ability or to the limit available in the community. The program utilizes language line services to for Spanish speaking victims and can arrange for in-person translation services, if necessary.

Despite our small size, we provide many optional services including, without limitation, employer intervention, childcare assistance during court appearances, witness notification, funeral

arrangements, crime prevention information, temporary restraining order assistance, transportation, and we maintain a court waiting area in our Independence, CA office. While we have not

been called upon to provide witness protection assistance, we stand ready to do so. While not technically "witness protection", we regularly provide security cameras and systems to victims

needing them. We also assist victims and witnesses by providing court-appropriate clothing, when required. We attempt to tailor services to victims and witnesses so as to minimize

inconvenience and to maximize their safety and security.

Approve the appointment of Anna Scott, Health and Human Services Director, as the Local Mental Health Director and authorize the County Administrator to sign the appointment letter.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

Your Board previously appointed Anna Scott, Health and Human Services (HHS) Director, as the Interim Local Mental Health Director for the County's Mental Health Plan effective January 11, 2024. Since then, HHS has been unsuccessful in permanently filling the HHS Deputy Director of Behavioral Health, and Ms. Scott has continued to act in an interim capacity.

The requirements for appointment as the Local Mental Health Director are outlined in the California Code of Regulations, Title 9, Section 620, which lists a number of professionals who can fill the role when it is not the role of the local health officer or medical administrator of the county hospital. Subsection (f) specifically reads, "an administrator who shall have a master's degree in hospital administration, public health administration, or public administration from an accredited college or university, and who shall have at least three years of experience in hospital or health care administration, two of which shall have been in the mental health field. Additional qualifying experience may be substituted for the required education on a year-for-year basis with the approval of the Department."

Ms. Scott's Master's Degree in Public Administration and administrative experience within the Health and Human Services Department, including administrative oversight of the Public Health and Prevention division and experience as the HHS Assistant Director and Director, including oversight of the Behavioral Health Division, qualify her for the appointment on a permanent basis.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact associated with this item.

ALTERNATIVES AND/OR CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

A Local Mental Health Director is required in order to act in the capacity of County Mental Health Plan administrator. Not approving this item would result in the County being out of compliance with Medi-Cal regulations, which is not recommended as it puts the County at risk in a number of areas.

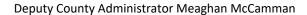

On February 6, 2024, the Inyo County Board of Supervisors recommended the appointment of Anna Scott, Health and Human Services (HHS) Director, as the Interim Local Mental Health Director for Inyo County. Prior to that interim appointment, Dr. Kimball Pier, HHS Deputy Director of Behavioral Health, was appointed as the Local Mental Health Director. Dr. Pier resigned from her position on January 10, 2024, and the Department has not permanently filled the Deputy Director position since that time. A recruitment remains open until filled and the County will notify your office once a qualified candidate is selected.

The Inyo County Board of Supervisors is recommending that Anna Scott be appointed as the Local Mental Health Director. Ms. Scott holds a Master of Public Administration with an Emphasis in Health Care Management and has provided administrative oversight to all HHS divisions, including Behavioral Health, since January, 2022 when she was first appointed as the Assistant Director for the Department. Prior to that, Ms. Scott served as the Deputy Director of Public Health and Prevention for the County of Inyo for seven years, where she provided administrative oversight of medical and non-medical programs and staff. Ms. Scott will continue in her current role and will work with her administrative leadership and Behavioral Health clinical team to ensure continuity of services while recruiting to fill the HHS Behavioral Health Deputy Director vacancy.

We are recommending that Ms. Scott's appointment be effective November 18, 2025. Revised: July 1, 2021

A. Program Authority

- 1. Penal Code Section 1203.016 authorizes the Board of Supervisors to authorize the county Correctional Administrator to establish alternative sentencing programs in which inmates committed to a county jail or correctional facility or granted probation, or inmates participating in a work furlough program, may voluntarily or involuntarily be placed in a home detention program during their sentence in lieu of confinement in a county jail or other county correctional facility or program under the auspices of the Probation Officer.
- 2. The County Correctional Administrator is appointed by the Board of Supervisors on an annual basis. In Inyo County, the Chief Probation Officer and Sheriff are Co-County Correctional Administrators.
- 3. Pursuant to Penal Code Section 1203.016(b), the Board of Supervisors, in consultation with the Correctional Administrator, may prescribe reasonable Rules and Regulations under which a home detention program may operate. The Rules and Regulations of the home detention program shall be written and reviewed on an annual basis by the Board of Supervisors and shall be given to or made available to any participant upon request.
- 4. Pursuant to Penal Code Section 1203.016(d), the Correctional Administrator has specific authority to allow a person to participate in the program or to determine if a person is eligible and amenable to participation in the program.

B. Program Amenability

- 1. Defendant amenability for Electronic Monitoring shall be determined by a combination of factors, including:
 - a. The Defendant's risk to reoffend, as indicated by a validated risk assessment.
 - b. The Defendant's criminal record, including any history of serious or violent felonies.
 - c. Any rules violations the Defendant committed while in custody.
 - d. The Defendant's history of failure to appear at court.
 - e. The Defendant's history of compliance with any supervision conditions.
 - f. Any prior history of non-compliance with Electronic Monitoring.
 - g. The Defendant's current willingness to comply with the rules and regulations of Electronic Monitoring.
 - h. The Defendant's current living arrangements, including whether or not Electronic Monitoring equipment will function at his or her home; presence of family members

or others living with the Defendant who are unwilling to cooperate with EMP or otherwise present as an officer safety risk.

i. Any other factor that would, in the supervising officer's opinion, objectively disqualify the Defendant from program participation.

C. Program Exclusion

- 1. The following defendants shall be excluded from Electronic Monitoring, unless otherwise approved by Probation Department Administration.
 - a. Any person convicted of an offense listed in Appendix A to this policy, "Excluded List of Crimes."
 - b. Any person with an active arrest warrant.
 - c. Any person who does not have a verifiable, legal address within Inyo County.
 - d. Any person who fails to appear for their scheduled EMP interview without good cause.
- 2. Defendants who live outside the county and are found unsuitable for EMP due to residency restrictions may request a transfer to an EMP program in their home county. Those defendants will be responsible for the cost of any out-of-county program.
- 3. In the event the supervising officer determines a defendant is excluded from participation in EMP but is otherwise amenable, or the safety of the public and victim would otherwise be enhanced by the use of EMP, the supervising officer may obtain an Administrative Override from Department Administration and admit the defendant to EMP.

CI. Minimum/Maximum Sentence

1. A minimum sentence of 30 days (15 actual days) in jail is required for admittance into the Electronic Monitoring Program. The maximum sentence for admittance into the program is 365 days (180 days actual).

CII. Credit for Time Served

1. Where EMP is being utilized as an alternative sentence, for every four (4) days on EM, two (2) days will be deducted from his/her sentence, pursuant to PC 4019(a)(7).

CIII. Court Referrals

1. Pursuant to Penal Code Section 1203.016(e), the Court may recommend or refer a Defendant to the Correctional Administrator or his or her designee for admission into the program. The recommendation or referral shall be given **great weight** in the determination for acceptance or denial into the program.

G. Processing Time

1. Courts generally grant non-custodial applicants two (2) to three (3) weeks to apply for an alternative sentencing program. Lacking good cause, applicants who fail to apply for EMP within fifteen (15) days of their custodial date, forfeit their eligibility for EMP and must report to jail to serve their sentence.

2. Defendants who are released on their own recognizance or released on bail with EMP must generally apply for and either be admitted to or denied EMP by no later than their next court date. Such defendants are solely responsible for completing the EMP application packet at the jail, in a timely manner. Upon receipt of the application packet from Pre-Trial defendants, every effort should be made to conduct the interview process, accept or deny the defendant, and to release the defendant on EMP. Upon acceptance or denial of a Pre-Trial defendant, the Court, District Attorney, and attorney for the defendant should be notified as soon as is reasonably possible.

H. Program Rules

- 1. Defendants must agree to, and abide by, the following program rules and regulations while participating in the program.
 - a. Not violate any laws. If they receive a traffic citation or have any contact with any police agency, they will report such contact as soon as possible to the Probation Officer.
 - b. Comply with any and all terms and conditions of their supervision, and any reasonable directives issued by the Probation Officer. Failure to abide by any of these orders may result in the immediate removal from the program and will result in a return to custody. It may also jeopardize further eligibility for other alternative programs.
 - c. Not possess, or have in their residence/vehicle, any gun, explosive, or other deadly weapon.
 - d. Not possess or use any narcotic or controlled substance without a valid medical prescription.
 - e. Submit to chemical, blood, breath, saliva, or urine testing deemed necessary by the Probation Officer.
 - f. Not have any form of contact or communication with any other inmates, either in this program, or in any jail, correctional facility, or state prison. (Exceptions to be approved by the Probation Officer.)
 - g. Submit their person, property, residence, or vehicle to search and seizure warrant or probable cause, at any hour of the day or night, by any Probation Officer or Peace Officer.

- h. Inform any co-residents of the program rules and regulations.
- i. Not operate a motor vehicle unless properly licensed and insured.
- j. Enroll and participate in treatment programs or counseling as directed by the Probation Officer.
- k. Report to the Probation Officer at such times and places as directed.
- I. Notify the Probation Officer in advance of any change of address and or phone number.

I. Program Removal

- 1. A participant can be removed from the program for any violation of the program rules.
- 2. A participant who is removed from the program for a violation of the program rules that does not involve incarceration has the right to an administrative appeal of the removal decision.
- 3. Incarceration will result in the removal from the EM program. If removed due to incarceration, reapplication to the program is allowable upon the conclusion of any and all criminal matters before court.

II. Appeals Rights and Process

- 1. Pursuant to Penal Code Section 1203.016(d)(2), any person who is denied entry into Electronic Monitoring shall be so advised in writing, including their right to an administrative appeal of the denial, and the process for filing an appeal with the Department.
- 2. Any participant who is removed from the EM program and is not incarcerated has the right to an administrative appeal of his/her removal from the program.
- 3. The Deputy Chief Probation Officer is responsible for hearing any appeals and has sole authority to override any denial of entry into the program or termination from the program.
- 4. Upon receipt of an appeal, the supervising officer shall immediately forward it to the Deputy Chief Probation Officer, who shall issue a decision on the appeal within three (3) business days. The Deputy Chief Probation Officer shall notify the Defendant in writing as to the final decision to either deny or admit the Defendant into the program.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

The Inyo County Animal Shelter is applying for a \$95,000 grant from the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA), to expand spay and neuter services for both shelter animals and those in the community.

This funding would allow us to spay or neuter additional animals beyond our current capacity. The grant would cover procedures for shelter animals and community animals, including those assisted through our Community Cat Program (CCP) and local pet owners unable to access support.

By expanding these services, we can reduce unwanted litters, lower shelter intake, and support responsible pet ownership throughout Inyo County. This funding would have a lasting impact on both shelter operations and the overall health of our community's animal population.

Individual grants will range from \$10,000 to \$95,000. The total funding available for this grant opportunity is up to \$2.5 million.

Applicants are reminded that this is a one-time, non-renewable, one-year grant.

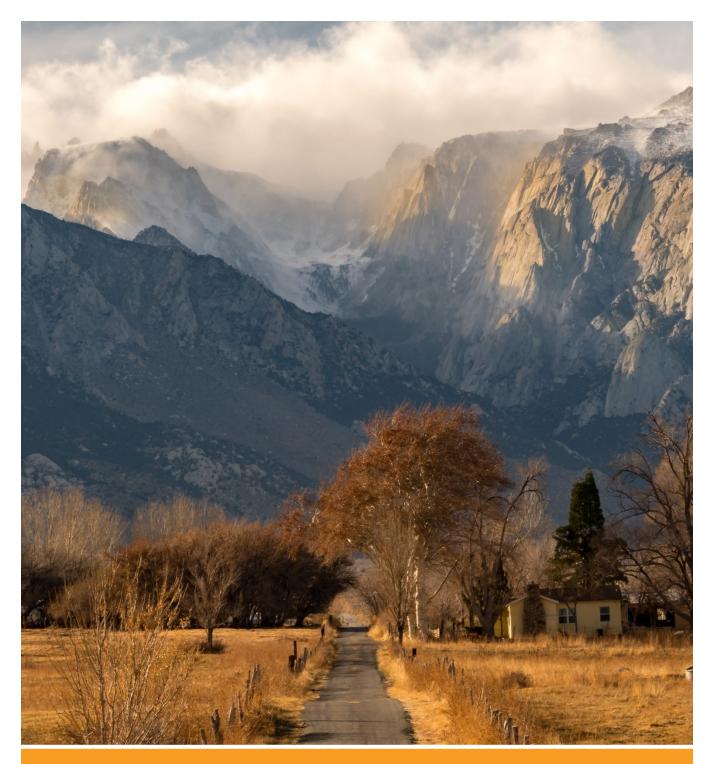

A **Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)** is a collaborative, multi-year framework to address community health issues with evidence-based strategies. In partnership with community members, local health, government, education, and human service agencies will use the CHIP to set priorities and coordinate resources. The Inyo County CHIP outlines a collective, community-driven effort to improve health and well-being for all residents of Inyo County.

Based on the finding of the 2023 Inyo County Community Health Survey and the 2024 Community Health Assessment (CHA) - which combined local health data, community feedback, and partner input - the Inyo County CHIP identified three health priority areas and developed measurable objectives to be achieved between October 15, 2025 and June 30, 2028.

This is the first CHIP developed by Inyo County. The primary goal is to engage key partners and the community in a comprehensive planning process to help realize its vision of:

A vibrant Inyo County where the strength of our communities, rural culture, and environment creates the foundation for health and well-being for all.

The table on the next page summarizes the health priority areas, goals, and objectives developed by the Inyo County CHIP Steering Committee and informed by community feedback

Goal: Empower our community by maximizing awareness and access to resources.

Objective 1: By June 2028, enhance the current 211 platform by increasing the amount of validated local resources by 50% from baseline.

Objective 2: By June 2028, train at least one resource navigator partner on utilization of the 211 platform in each of the five key sectors — Public/Government, Private/Business, Non-Profit/Charity, Education, and Healthcare.

Objective 2: By June 2028, increase Northern Inyo Healthcare District childbirth class participation by 10% from baseline.

Objective 3: By June 2028, at least one Health and Human Services staff member will be trained on maternal mental health and conduct one countywide training for healthcare providers and family support professionals.

Objective 2: By June 2028, establish a resource-sharing agreement with a minimum of three local partners to lay the groundwork for coordinated and comprehensive measurement of substance use trends in Inyo County.

Objective 3: By June 2028, ensure that at least one-third of young adults experiencing substance use issues referred to Inyo County Behavioral Health complete an intake assessment and are connected to appropriate treatment services.

Background



Using data from the 2023 Community Health Survey and 2024 Community Health Assessment (CHA) combined with professional and lived experience, the Inyo County CHIP Steering Committee considered the county's strengths and challenges to determine three focused health priority areas. These strengths are opportunities to be leveraged, while the challenges are barriers that must be addressed to successfully achieve each CHIP objective.

The Background section provides:

- A summary of the Inyo County 2025 2028 CHIP process
- Notable data gathered on Inyo County's unique strengths and challenges:
 - o The Community Context page provides an overview of population data.
 - The Understanding Health in Inyo County pages highlight data from the CHA relevant to each health priority area.



The Inyo County CHIP is a roadmap for collective action to improve health and well-being across the county. The CHIP is the first developed by the county, following the county's first Community Health Assessment (CHA) in 2024.

The CHA engaged community members, healthcare providers, public health professionals, and local partners to identify key health needs. For thoroughness, the CHA relied on both primary and secondary data:

Primary Data: A Community Health Survey (CHS) conducted by Inyo Health and Human Services (HHS) between August 18 and October 31, 2023, collected responses from 281 residents.

Secondary Data: Drawn from trusted sources such as the U.S. Census Bureau, CDC, EPA, FBI, Feeding America, National Cancer Institute, KidsData, County Health Rankings, and the State of California.

Building on the findings from the CHA, the CHIP was developed by the Inyo County CHIP Steering Committee, a series of facilitated work groups where attendees collaboratively defined health priorities, goals, measurable objectives. Using relevant aspects of the National Association of County & City Health Officials (NACCHO) Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) framework, the process emphasized community voices, data-driven decision-making, and alignment with state and national goals.

This process, illustrated in Figure 1, included:

Community Engagement: Residents participated in surveys, focus groups, and community meetings to identify key concerns.

Partner Collaboration: Local healthcare providers, schools, tribal representatives, behavioral health organizations, and community-based partners helped define feasible, evidence-based strategies.

Data & Experience: State and local health data were combined with community input to ensure priorities reflect both real needs and measurable health outcomes.

Figure 1: CHIP Process Timeline



During the CHA process, several concerning **red flags** emerged, including higher-than- average rates of:

Drug-induced mortality	Youth nicotine use
Excessive drinking	Chronic absenteeism
Uninsured residents	Limited grocery access
Adolescent pregnancy	Missed medical screenings

Additional indicators underscore the significant health challenges Inyo County faces:

- Difficulty accessing care and health-promoting resources, exacerbated by geographic isolation, awareness of services, and financial or transportation barriers.
- Limited mental health and support services for perinatal and postpartum women.
- Need for substance misuse prevention and support programs.

While all red-flag indicators informed the CHIP development process, not all were directly addressed in the health priority areas. Some indicators, such as limited grocery access, reflect broader *structural determinants* that require long-term, multi-sector policy solutions. While these issues cannot be fully resolved within this CHIP's three-year cycle, the strategies and partnerships established through this CHIP—and future CHA and CHIP cycles—will lay the foundation for addressing them over time. Similarly, indicators like drug-induced mortality and suicide rates are influenced by multiple *upstream factors*, making direct, measurable intervention more complex. The CHIP's initiatives provide a starting point for coordinated, long-term efforts to address these negative health impacts.

Several factors influenced health priority area election, including:

- Feasibility and impact of local intervention.
- Alignment with data and community and partner input.
- Measurability of outcomes within the 2025–2028 timeframe.

CHIP development focused on three interrelated health priority areas — Access to Care & Resources, Maternal Mental Health, and Substance Use Disorder.

The majority of red-flag indicators are addressed indirectly within these priorities:



Access to Care & Resources: Addresses limited access to providers and geographic barriers through two focused objectives: strengthening a centralized online resource platform and training community partners to connect residents with services. The number of objectives reflects both the complexity of each objective and local resource constraints.



Maternal Mental Health: Targets gaps in behavioral health services for perinatal and postpartum women by expanding local childbirth education, increasing participation in classes, and beginning the process of developing perinatal provider mental health training to improve early identification and connection to resources.

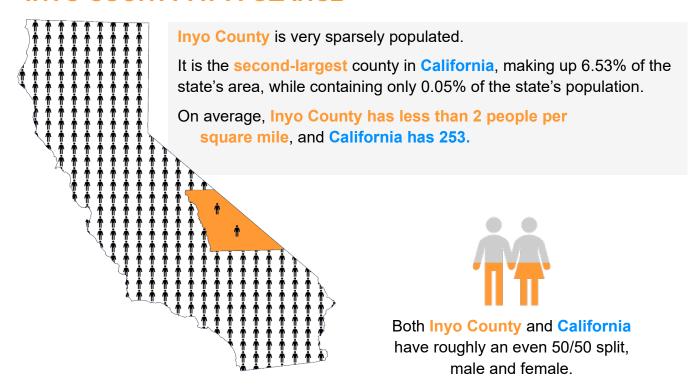


Substance Use Disorder: Focuses on substance misuse intervention utilizing evidence-based prevention and assessment strategies in response to community concerns and data on druginduced and suicide mortality, excessive drinking, and tobacco use.

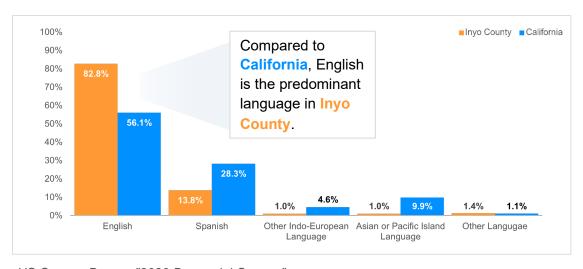

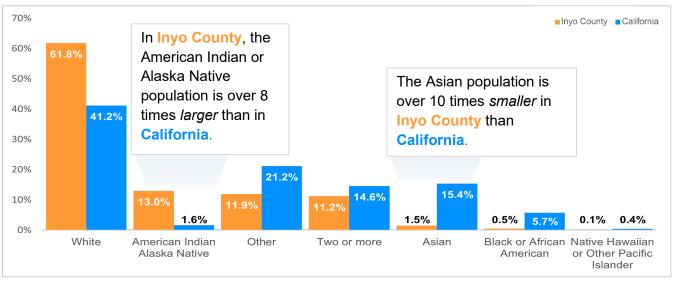


PRIMARY LANGUAGES SPOKEN IN INYO COUNTY



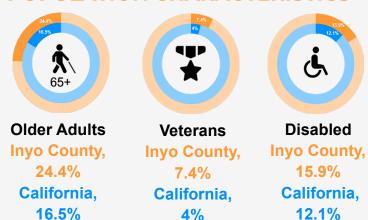

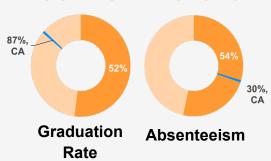
POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

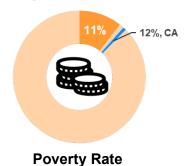
EDUCATION FACTORS



Compared to California, Inyo County has lower high school graduation rates (52% vs. 87%) and higher levels of absenteeism (54% vs. 30%).

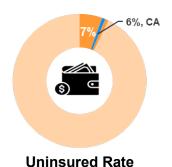

POVERTY AND HEALTH INSURANCE



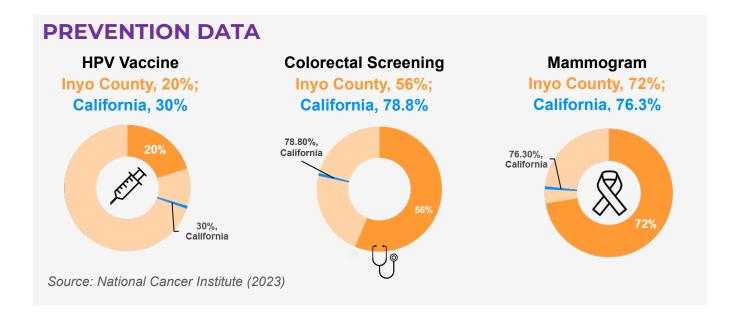

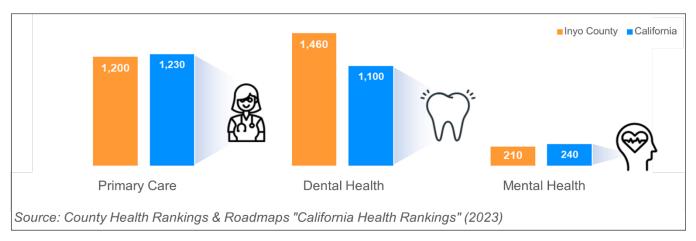

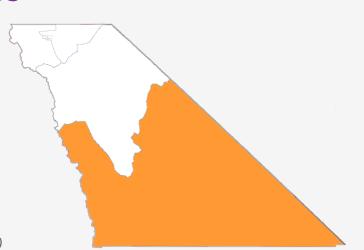

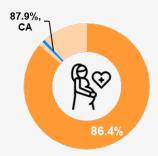

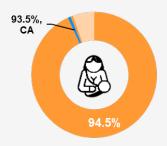

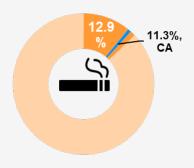

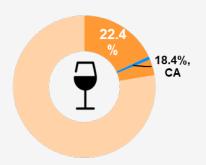

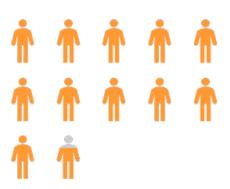

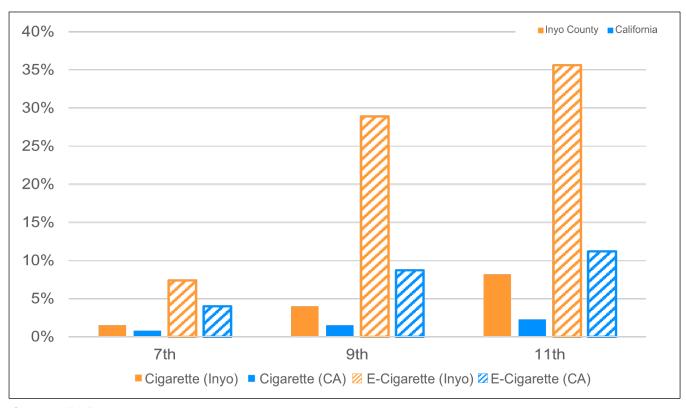

With the goals and SMART objectives established, each health priority work group will be responsible for developing implementation strategies and step-by-step action plans to achieve each objective within the CHIP timeframe.

CHIP Implementation Period: October 15, 2025 to June 30, 2028

Identify evidence-based and locally feasible strategies that build on existing programs and partnerships.

Ensure strategies are aligned with community input, produce measurable outcomes, and address cultural, linguistic and geographic needs.

- C) Formally accept the FY 25/26 Off-Road Vehicle Grant in the amount of \$42,333 from the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Division (Application #G25-03-30-L01) to support OHV safety enforcement, trail maintenance, and rider education and authorize the Sheriff as the designated agent to negotiate and execute all necessary documents for the project.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

In California, off-highway vehicle (OHV) recreation is primarily managed as a state program, working in collaboration with federal agencies that oversee public lands. The grant supporting this program, formally known as the Grants and Cooperative Agreements Program, is a reimbursement-based grant. Eligible project expenses—including equipment and salaries—are first incurred by the recipient and then submitted for reimbursement, with a 25% cost match required for salaries. These funds will be used to enforce OHV safety regulations, maintain and protect trails, and educate riders on responsible off-highway vehicle use. By combining enforcement with education, the program helps ensure safe and sustainable OHV recreation for all users.

The Inyo County Sheriff's Office has been notified of an award in the amount of \$42,333.00 for the Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) Grant. The OHV Division is in the process of finalizing the grant agreement. The awarded amount has been posted on the OHV website, establishing the official allocation to Inyo County. At this time, no equipment has been purchased, and the project remains pending. Once finalized, the awarded funds will support off-road motor vehicle enforcement and safety efforts. This is a reimbursement-based grant.

ALTERNATIVES AND/OR CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION:

The Board may choose not to accept the grant funds awarded from the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Division. This alternative is not recommended, as the awarded funds will support efforts in off-highway vehicle safety and enforcement and reduce the expense to general funds for providing OHV safety, enforcement, and equipment maintenance.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

The Department of Parks and Recreation is offering the Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) grant program to provide for well-managed OHV recreation by providing financial assistance to eligible agencies that develop, maintain, operate, expand, support, or contribute to well-managed, high-quality OHV recreation areas, roads, and trails; and to responsibly preserve the wildlife, soils, and habitat of Project Areas in a manner that will sustain long-term OHV recreation per the legislative provisions and intent of the Act commencing at PRC section 5090.01.

If awarded, these monies will assist with costs associated with overtime for OHV Patrols, purchase any project-approved motorized equipment, supplement and provide training to strengthen the Sheriff's Office Enforcement Detail for private and government-owned property that is already in use and enforced where it is not zoned and planned for.

The Inyo County Sheriff's Department has participated in the OHV competitive grant since 2009. Necessary OHV Enforcement equipment and training are provided yearly by Patrol Deputies. The Off-Highway Grant is competitive. Therefore, we will not know what we are awarded until the Intent to Award is posted on the State Parks OHV Division website in August 2025; the preliminary application is due to the State by March 03, 2025. The OHV grant requires a twenty-five percent (25%) in-kind match. Any item eligible as a Project Cost is also eligible as a match.

The Sheriff's Office anticipates applying for \$150,000. However, historically, state-wide law enforcement applications are rarely awarded more than 50% of the total requested and are often reduced significantly to more than 50%.

Project Agreement General Provisions (Nonfederal Applicants Only)

A. Definitions

- The term "State" as used herein means the State of California, Department of Parks and Recreation.
- The term "Act" as used herein means the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Act of 2003 as amended.
- 3. The term "Project" as used herein means the Project described in Attachment 1 of this Agreement and in the Application.
- 4. The term "Application" as used herein means the individual Project Application and attachments required pursuant to the enabling legislation, regulations, and/or Grant program, which is incorporated into this Agreement by reference.
- 5. The term "Project Agreement" as used herein means the Application and the Project Agreement and its General Provisions.
- 6. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page 1 of the Project Agreement.

B. Project Execution

 Subject to the appropriation and availability of Grant funds in the state budget, the State hereby awards to the Grantee the sum of money (Grant money) stated on page 1 of the Project Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purposes as set forth in the Project Description on Attachment 1 of the Project Agreement and the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

The Grantee assumes the obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete or carry out the Project as described. Any modification or alteration in the Project as set forth in the Application on file with the State must be submitted to the State for approval. The State's obligation to make Grant payments is limited to the Project as provided for herein, or as modified with the approval of the State.

- The Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the Project performance period set forth on page 1 of the Project Agreement, and under the terms and conditions of this agreement.
- 3. If the Project includes development, the development plans, specifications and estimates or Force Account Schedule shall be reviewed and approved by the State prior to the Grantee proceeding with the Project. Unless the development plans, specifications and estimates are approved by the State, the State shall have no obligation to make Grant payments for the work.

The Grantee shall comply with all applicable current laws and regulations affecting Development Projects, including, but not limited to, legal requirements for construction contracts, building codes, health and safety codes, and laws and codes pertaining to individuals with disabilities. In addition, the Grantee shall complete the development work in accordance with the State-approved development plans, specifications, and estimates or Force Account Schedule.

- 4. The Grantee shall make property or facilities acquired and/or developed pursuant to this Agreement available for inspection upon request by the State to determine if development work is in accordance with the approved plans, specifications and estimates or Force Account Schedule, including a final inspection upon Project completion.
- If the Project includes acquisition of real property, the cost of which is to be reimbursed with Grant moneys under this Agreement, the acquisition shall comply with Chapter 16 (commencing with Section 7260) of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government Code and any

other applicable federal, state, or local laws or ordinances. Documentation of such compliance will be made available for review by the State upon request. Eminent domain may not be used to acquire property using the Grant funds provided by this Agreement.

6. If the Project includes acquisition of real property, the purchase price shall be the fair market value of such property as established by an appraisal completed according to established current appraisal practices and methods as approved by both the Grantee and the State. The Grantee agrees to furnish the State with additional supportive appraisal material or justification as may be requested by the State to complete its review and approval of the fair market value.

The Grantee agrees to furnish the State with preliminary title reports respecting such real property or such other evidence of title which is determined to be sufficient by the State. The Grantee agrees to correct prior to or at the close of escrow any defects of title which in the opinion of the State might interfere with the operation of the Project.

C. Project Costs

- The Grant moneys to be provided to the Grantee under this Agreement shall be disbursed as follows, but not to exceed in any event one-hundred (100) percent of the allowable Project costs or the State Grant amount as set forth on page 1 of this Agreement, whichever is less:
- If the Project includes acquisition of real property, the State shall disburse to the Grantee the Grant moneys as follows, but not to exceed in any event the State Grant amount set forth on page 1 of this Agreement.

The State will disburse the amount of the State-approved purchase price together with State-approved costs of acquisition. Funds for acquisition shall only be released into an escrow account established for the acquisition.

D. Project Administration

- The Grantee shall promptly submit such progress, performance or other reports concerning
 the status of work performed on the Project as the State may request. In any event, the
 Grantee shall provide the State a report showing total final Project expenditures including
 State and all other moneys expended within one hundred-twenty (120) days after
 completion of the Project.
- 2. The Grantee shall make property and facilities maintained, operated, acquired or developed pursuant to this Agreement available for inspection by the State upon request.
- 3. The Grantee may be provided advanced payments for Grants. The Grantee shall place such moneys in a separate interest-bearing account, if legally able to do so, setting up and identifying such account prior to the advance. Interest earned on Grant moneys shall be used on the Project or paid to the State. If Grant moneys are advanced and not expended, the unused portion of the Grant (plus interest) shall be returned to the State within one hundred-twenty (120) days of completion of the Project or end of the Project performance period, whichever is earlier.

Income, after deduction for reasonable expenses associated with that income, that is earned by the Grantee from a State-approved non-recreational use on an acquisition Project, subsequent to taking title by the Grantee, but before use for OHV Recreation, must be used by the Grantee for recreational purposes at the Project.

- 4. The Grantee shall use any moneys advanced by the State under the terms of this agreement solely for the Project herein described.
- The Grantee will provide and maintain a sign on the Project site that identifies the funding source (Off-Highway Vehicle Fund) and the administering agency (California State Department of Parks and Recreation).

6. Equipment must be used solely for OHV-related purposes unless the Applicant is funding the portion of the purchase price not dedicated to OHV purposes, and that portion is not part of the total project cost.

E. Project Termination

- The Grantee may unilaterally rescind this Agreement at any time prior to the commencement of the Project. After Project commencement this Agreement may be rescinded, modified or amended by mutual agreement in writing.
- 2. Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder and reimbursement to the State of any Grant moneys already provided to the Grantee. However, such failure shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if, in the judgment of the State, such failure was due to no fault and beyond the control of the Grantee to prevent, mitigate or remedy.
- 3. Because the benefit to be derived by the State from the full compliance by the Grantee with the terms of this Agreement is the operation, development, preservation, protection and net increase in the quantity and quality of public outdoor recreation facilities available to the people of the State of California, and because such benefit exceeds to an immeasurable and unascertainable extent the amount of money furnished by the State by way of Grant moneys under the terms of this Agreement, the Grantee agrees that payment by the Grantee to the State of an amount equal to the amount of the Grant moneys disbursed under this Agreement by the State would be inadequate compensation to the State for any breach by the Grantee of this Agreement.
- 4. The Grantee further agrees, therefore, that the appropriate remedy in the event of a breach by the Grantee of this Agreement shall be the specific performance of this Agreement, unless otherwise agreed to by the State. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in the event of a breach of this Agreement, or any portion thereof, which is due to no fault and beyond the control of the Grantee to prevent, mitigate, or remedy, the State's sole remedy shall be the reimbursement of any funds advanced or paid that pertain to the breached term or terms of this Agreement.

F. Hold Harmless

- The Grantee hereby waives all claims and recourse against the State including the right to contribution of loss of damage to persons or property arising from, growing out of or in any way connected with or incident to this Agreement except claims arising from the concurrent or sole negligence of the State, its officers, agents and employees.
- 2. The Grantee shall protect, indemnify, hold harmless and defend the State, its officers, agents and employees against any and all claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses or liability costs arising out of the acquisition, development, construction, operation or maintenance of the property described as the Project which claims, demands or causes of action arise under Government Ceode Section 895.2 or otherwise except for liability arising out of, and attributable to, the concurrent or sole negligence of the State, its officers, or employees.
- 3. In the event the State is named as codefendant under the provisions of Government Code Section 895 et seq., the Grantee shall notify the State of such fact and shall represent the State in the legal action unless the State undertakes to represent itself as codefendant in such legal action in which event the State shall bear its own litigation costs, expenses, and attorney's fees.
- 4. In the event of judgment against the State and the Grantee because of the concurrent negligence of the State and the Grantee, their officers, agents, or employees, an apportionment of liability to pay such judgment shall be made by a court of competent jurisdiction. Neither party shall request, and each party hereby waives its right to, a jury apportionment.

G. Financial Records

- The Grantee shall retain for inspection all financial accounts, documents, and records for three (3) years from the expiration date of the Project Agreement, or three (3) years from the start of an audit engagement, whichever comes first, and until an audit started during the three (3) years is completed, a report published and any Audit findings are resolved and/or payment or other correction made with regard to any Audit findings contained in the final Audit report.
- 2. During regular office hours each party hereto and their duly authorized representatives shall have the right to inspect and make copies of any books, records or reports of the other party pertaining to this Agreement or matters related thereto.

H. Use of Facilities

- The Grantee shall, without cost to the State, except as may be otherwise provided in this Agreement or any other Grant agreement, operate and maintain the property acquired or developed pursuant to this Agreement in the manner of and according to the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation Act and any related regulations, or any other applicable provisions of law.
- Use of the facilities shall comply with all applicable laws, including, but not limited to, the
 requirements for registration of all day use-vehicles with the Department of Motor Vehicles
 or identified under the Chappie-Z'berg Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Law of 1993.

I. Nondiscrimination

- 1. The Grantee shall not discriminate against any person on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin, religion, ancestry, or physical handicap in the use of any property or facility acquired or developed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 2. The Grantee shall not discriminate against any person on the basis of residence except to the extent that reasonable differences in admission or other fees may be maintained on the basis of residence and pursuant to law.

J. Application Incorporation

1. The Application and any subsequent change or addition approved by the State is hereby incorporated in this Agreement as though set forth in full in this Agreement.

K. Severability

 If any provision of this Agreement or the application thereof is held invalid, that invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

L. Governing Law

- 1. This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with and be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any legal action arising out of the terms of this Agreement shall take place in the county wherein the Project funded by this Agreement is located. If the Project is located in or among two or more counties, any legal action shall be taken in the county wherein the largest land area of the Project is located.
- 2. The Grantee shall comply with all Federal, State, and/or Local laws, regulations, ordinances and executive orders that are applicable during the performance period.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Ratify and approve the agreement between First 5 Inyo County and First 5 Mono County for the provision of Improve and Maximize Programs so All Children Thrive (IMPACT) Legacy Program services in an amount not to exceed \$56,639.01 for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026, and authorize the First 5 Director to sign the agreement.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

This item is being brought forward for ratification because the State's release of the IMPACT Legacy Contract to First 5 Mono was delayed, which in turn delayed the execution of the local agreement between First 5 Mono and First 5 Inyo. Additional time was required for both the Inyo and Mono Children and Families Commissions to review and approve the terms of the contract to ensure alignment with program and fiscal requirements. Inyo's Children and Families Commission minutes indicate that the First 5 Director, Katelyne Lent, is authorized to sign the agreement, which is why that request is also coming before the Board of Supervisors for approval.

This annual agreement supports implementation of the First 5 California IMPACT Legacy Program in Inyo County. Under the agreement, First 5 Inyo will perform, or subcontract with the Inyo County Office of Education to perform, activities aligned with the IMPACT Legacy Scope of Work, focusing on quality improvement efforts for early learning and care environments serving children ages 0–5. Activities include professional development, coaching, and support for early learning providers to enhance nurturing adult-child interactions, children's social-emotional well-being, culturally responsive family engagement, and inclusive practices for multilingual learners.

The total contract amount is \$56,639.01 for Fiscal Year 2025–26. Funding supports direct program costs such as quality improvement, outreach, and data collection, as well as administrative costs not exceeding 15% of direct costs.

This partnership with First 5 Mono ensures Inyo County's continued participation in the regional Quality Counts California system, strengthening early learning environments and supporting equitable access to high-quality care for young children and their families. On September 24, 2025, the Inyo County Children

and Families Commission approved the agreement and authorized Katelyne Lent, Inyo First 5 Director, to sign the agreement.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN FIRST 5 MONO AND FIRST 5 INYO COUNTY FOR THE PROVISION OF IMPACT LEGACY PROGRAM SERVICES

INTRODUCTION

WHEREAS, First 5 Mono (hereinafter referred to as "First 5") may have the need for IMPACT Legacy Program services of First 5 Inyo County, a California Governmental Agency (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor"), and in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, terms, and conditions hereinafter contained, the parties hereby agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. SCOPE OF WORK

Contractor shall furnish to First 5, upon its request, those services and work set forth in Attachment A, attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein. Requests by First 5 to Contractor to perform under this Agreement will be made by the Director of First 5 Mono, or an authorized representative thereof. Requests to Contractor for work or services to be performed under this Agreement will be based upon First 5's need for such services. First 5 makes no guarantee or warranty, of any nature, that any minimum level or amount of services or work will be requested of Contractor by First 5 under this Agreement. By this Agreement, First 5 incurs no obligation or requirement to request from Contractor the performance of any services or work at all, even if First 5 should have some need for such services or work during the term of this Agreement.

Services and work provided by Contractor at First 5's request under this Agreement will be performed in a manner consistent with the requirements and standards established by applicable federal, state, and county laws, ordinances, and resolutions. Such laws, ordinances, regulations, and resolutions include, but are not limited to, those that are referred to in this Agreement.

This Agreement is subject to the following Exhibits (as noted) which are attached hereto, following all referenced Attachments, and incorporated by this reference. In the event of a conflict between the terms of an attached Exhibit and this Agreement, the terms of the Exhibit shall govern:

2. TERM

The term of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 2025 until June 30, 2026, unless sooner terminated as provided below.

3. CONSIDERATION

- A. <u>Compensation</u>. First 5 shall pay Contractor in accordance with the Schedule of Fees (set forth as Attachment B) for the services and work described in Attachment A that are performed by Contractor at First 5's request.
- B. <u>Travel and Per Diem</u>. Contractor will not be paid or reimbursed for travel expenses or per diem that Contractor incurs in providing services and work requested by First 5 under this Agreement, unless otherwise provided for in Attachment B.
- C. <u>No Additional Consideration</u>. Except as expressly provided in this Agreement, Contractor shall not be entitled to, nor receive, from First 5, any additional consideration, compensation, salary, wages, or other type of remuneration for services rendered under this Agreement. Specifically, Contractor shall not be entitled, by virtue of this Agreement, to consideration in the form of overtime, health insurance benefits, retirement benefits, disability retirement benefits, sick leave, vacation time, paid holidays, or other paid leaves of absence of any type or kind whatsoever.
- D. <u>Limit upon amount payable under Agreement</u>. The total sum of all payments made by First 5 to Contractor for services and work performed under this Agreement shall not exceed \$56,639.01, plus the amount of any change order(s) approved in accordance with authority delegated by the First 5 Commission (hereinafter referred to as "Contract Limit"). First 5 expressly reserves the right to deny any payment or reimbursement requested by Contractor for services or work performed that is in excess of the Contract Limit.
- E. <u>Billing and Payment</u>. Contractor shall submit to First 5 quarterly, by October 15, April 15, January 15, and July 15 of each year, an itemized statement of all services and work described in Attachment A, which were done at First 5's request. All statements submitted in request for payment shall identify the date on which the services and work were performed and describe the nature of the services and work which were performed on each day. Invoicing shall be informative but concise regarding services and work performed during that billing period. Upon finding that Contractor has satisfactorily completed the work and performed the services as requested, First 5 shall make payment to Contractor within 30 days of its receipt of payment from First 5 California. Should First 5 determine the services or work have not been completed or performed as requested and/or should Contractor produce an incorrect statement, First 5 shall withhold payment until the services and work are satisfactorily completed or performed and/or the statement is corrected and resubmitted.

F. Federal and State Taxes.

- (1) Except as provided in subparagraph (2) below, First 5 will not withhold any federal or state income taxes or social security from any payments made by First 5 to Contractor under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- (2) First 5 shall withhold California state income taxes from payments made under this Agreement to non-California resident independent contractors when it is anticipated that total annual payments to Contractor under this Agreement will exceed One Thousand Four Hundred Ninety-Nine dollars (\$1,499.00).
- (3) Except as set forth above, First 5 has no obligation to withhold any taxes or payments from sums paid by First 5 to Contractor under this Agreement. Payment of all taxes and other assessments on such sums is the sole responsibility of Contractor. First 5 has no responsibility or liability for payment of Contractor's taxes or assessments.

(4) The total amounts paid by First 5 to Contractor, and taxes withheld from payments to non-California residents, if any, will be reported annually to the Internal Revenue Service and the California State Franchise Tax Board.

4. WORK SCHEDULE

Contractor's obligation is to perform, in a timely manner, those services and work identified in Attachment A that are requested by First 5. It is understood by Contractor that the performance of these services and work will require a varied schedule. Contractor, in arranging his/her schedule, will coordinate with First 5 to ensure that all services and work requested by First 5 under this Agreement will be performed within the time frame set forth by First 5.

5. REQUIRED LICENSES, CERTIFICATES, AND PERMITS

Any licenses, certificates, or permits required by the federal, state, county, or municipal governments, for Contractor to provide the services and work described in Attachment A must be procured by Contractor and be valid at the time Contractor enters into this Agreement. Further, during the term of this Agreement, Contractor must maintain such licenses, certificates, and permits in full force and effect. Licenses, certificates, and permits may include, but are not limited to, driver's licenses, professional licenses or certificates, and business licenses. Such licenses, certificates, and permits will be procured and maintained in force by Contractor at no expense to First 5. Contractor will provide First 5, upon execution of this Agreement, with evidence of current and valid licenses, certificates and permits that are required to perform the services identified in Attachment A. Where there is a dispute between Contractor and First 5 as to what licenses, certificates, and permits are required to perform the services identified in Attachment A, First 5 reserves the right to make such determinations for purposes of this Agreement.

6. OFFICE SPACE, SUPPLIES, EQUIPMENT, ETC

Contractor shall provide such office space, supplies, equipment, vehicles, reference materials, support services and telephone service as is necessary for Contractor to provide the services identified in Attachment A to this Agreement. First 5 is not obligated to reimburse or pay Contractor for any expense or cost incurred by Contractor in procuring or maintaining such items. Responsibility for the costs and expenses incurred by Contractor in providing and maintaining such items is the sole responsibility and obligation of Contractor.

7. FIRST 5 PROPERTY

- A. <u>Personal Property of First 5</u>. Any personal property such as, but not limited to, protective or safety devices, badges, identification cards, keys, uniforms, vehicles, reference materials, furniture, appliances, etc. provided to Contractor by First 5 pursuant to this Agreement is, and at the termination of this Agreement remains, the sole and exclusive property of First 5. Contractor will use reasonable care to protect, safeguard and maintain such items while they are in Contractor's possession. Contractor will be financially responsible for any loss or damage to such items, partial or total, that is the result of Contractor's negligence.
- B. Products of Contractor's Work and Services. Any and all compositions, publications, plans, designs, specifications, blueprints, maps, formulas, processes, photographs, slides, videotapes, computer programs, computer disks, computer tapes, memory chips, soundtracks, audio recordings, films, audio-visual presentations, exhibits, reports, studies, works of art, inventions, patents, trademarks, copyrights, or intellectual properties of any kind that are created, produced, assembled, compiled by, or are the result, product, or manifestation of, Contractor's services or work under this Agreement are, and at the termination of this Agreement shall remain, the sole and exclusive property of First 5. At the termination of the Agreement, Contractor will convey possession and title to all such properties to First 5.

8. INSURANCE

Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder and the results of that work by the Contractor, his agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.

- (2) **Primary Coverage:** For any claims related to this contract, the Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary and non-contributory and at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects First 5, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by First 5, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it. This requirement shall also apply to any Excess or Umbrella liability policies.
- (3) Umbrella or Excess Policy: The Contractor may use Umbrella or Excess Policies to provide the liability limits as required in this agreement. This form of insurance will be acceptable provided that all of the Primary and Umbrella or Excess Policies shall provide all of the insurance coverages herein required, including, but not limited to, primary and non-contributory, additional insured, Self-Insured Retentions (SIRs), indemnity, and defense requirements. The Umbrella or Excess policies shall be provided on a true "following form" or broader coverage basis, with coverage at least as broad as provided on the underlying Commercial General Liability insurance. No insurance policies maintained by the Additional Insureds, whether primary or excess, and which also apply to a loss covered hereunder, shall be called upon to contribute to a loss until the Contractor's primary and excess liability policies are exhausted.
- (4) **Notice of Cancellation**: Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to First 5.
- (5) **Waiver of Subrogation**: Contractor hereby grants to First 5 a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Contractor may acquire against First 5 by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not First 5 has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.
- (6) Self-Insured Retentions: Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by First 5. First 5 may require the Contractor to purchase coverage with a lower retention or provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or First 5. The CGL and any policies, including Excess liability policies, may not be subject to a self-insured retention (SIR) or deductible that exceeds \$500,000 unless approved in writing by First 5. Any and all deductibles and SIRs shall be the sole responsibility of Contractor or subcontractor who procured such insurance and shall not apply to the Indemnified Additional Insured Parties. First 5 may deduct from any amounts otherwise due Contractor to fund the SIR/deductible. Policies shall NOT contain any self-insured retention (SIR) provision that limits the satisfaction of the SIR to the Named. The policy must also provide that Defense costs, including the Allocated Loss Adjustment Expenses, will satisfy the SIR or deductible. First 5 reserves the right to obtain a copy of any policies and endorsements for verification.
- (7) **Acceptability of Insurers**: Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to First 5.
- (8) Claims Made Policies: If any of the required policies provide claims-made coverage:

- a. The Retroactive Date must be shown, and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- b. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
- c. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claimsmade policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Contractor must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of work.
- (9) Verification of Coverage: Contractor shall furnish First 5 with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsements Pages of the CGL and any Excess policies listing all policy endorsements. All certificates and endorsements and copies of the Declarations & Endorsements pages are to be received and approved by First 5 before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Contractor's obligation to provide them. First 5 reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time. First 5 reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.
- (10) **Special Risks or Circumstances**: First 5 reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.

9. STATUS OF CONTRACTOR

All acts of Contractor, its agents, officers, and employees, relating to the performance of this Agreement, shall be performed as an independent contractor, and not as an agent, officer, or employee of First 5. Contractor, by virtue of this Agreement, has no authority to bind or incur any obligation on behalf of, or exercise any right or power vested in, First 5, except as expressly provided by law or set forth in Attachment A. No agent, officer, or employee of First 5 is to be considered an employee of Contractor. It is understood by both Contractor and First 5 that this Agreement shall not, under any circumstances, be construed to create an employer-employee relationship or a joint venture. As an independent contractor:

- A. Contractor shall determine the method, details, and means of performing the work and services to be provided by Contractor under this Agreement.
- B. Contractor shall be responsible to First 5 only for the requirements and results specified in this Agreement, and except as expressly provided in this Agreement, shall not be subjected to First 5's control with respect to the physical action or activities of Contractor in fulfillment of this Agreement.
- C. Contractor, its agents, officers and employees are, and at all times during the term of this Agreement shall represent and conduct themselves as, independent contractors, and not employees of First 5.

10. DEFENSE AND INDEMNIFICATION

Contractor shall defend with counsel acceptable to First 5, indemnify, and hold harmless First 5, its agents, officers, and employees from and against all claims, damages, losses, judgments, liabilities, expenses, and other costs, including litigation costs and attorney's fees, arising out of, resulting from or in connection with, the performance of this Agreement by Contractor, or Contractor's agents, officers, or employees. Contractor's obligation to defend, indemnify, and hold First 5, its agents, officers, and employees harmless applies to any

actual or alleged personal injury, death, damage or destruction to tangible or intangible property, including the loss of use. Contractor's obligation under this paragraph extends to any claim, damage, loss, liability, expense, or other costs that are caused in whole or in part by any act or omission of Contractor, its agents, employees, supplier, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone for whose acts or omissions any of them may be liable.

Contractor's obligation to defend, indemnify, and hold First 5, its agents, officers, and employees harmless under the provisions of this paragraph is not limited to, or restricted by, any requirement in this Agreement for Contractor to procure and maintain a policy of insurance and shall survive any termination or expiration of this Agreement.

11. RECORDS AND AUDIT

- A. <u>Records</u>. Contractor shall prepare and maintain all records required by the various provisions of this Agreement, federal, state, county, municipal, ordinances, regulations, and directions. Contractor shall maintain these records for a minimum of four (4) years from the termination or completion of this Agreement. Contractor may fulfill its obligation to maintain records as required by this paragraph by substitute photographs, micrographs, or other authentic reproduction of such records.
- B. <u>Inspections and Audits</u>. Any authorized representative of First 5 shall have access to any books, documents, papers, records, including, but not limited to, financial records of Contractor, that First 5 determines to be pertinent to this Agreement, for the purposes of making audit, evaluation, examination, excerpts, and transcripts during the period such records are to be maintained by Contractor. Further, First 5 has the right, at all reasonable times, to audit, inspect, or otherwise evaluate the work performed or being performed under this Agreement.

12. NONDISCRIMINATION

During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor, its agents, officers, and employees shall not unlawfully discriminate in violation of any federal, state, or local law, against any employee, or applicant for employment, or person receiving services under this Agreement, because of race, religious creed, color, ancestry, national origin, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, sex, age, or sexual orientation. Contractor and its agents, officers, and employees shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code section 12900, et seq.), and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder in the California Code of Regulations. Contractor shall also abide by the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) and all amendments thereto, and all administrative rules and regulations issued pursuant to said Act.

13. TERMINATION

This Agreement may be terminated by First 5 without cause, and at will, for any reason by giving to Contractor thirty (30) calendar days written notice of such intent to terminate. Contractor may terminate this Agreement without cause, and at will, for any reason whatsoever by giving to First 5 thirty (30) calendar days written notice of such intent to terminate.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, if this Agreement is subject to General Conditions (set forth as an Exhibit hereto), then termination shall be in accordance with the General Conditions and this paragraph shall not apply.

14. ASSIGNMENT

This is an agreement for the personal services of Contractor. First 5 has relied upon the skills, knowledge, experience, and training of Contractor as an inducement to enter into this Agreement. Contractor shall not

assign or subcontract this Agreement, or any part of it, without the express written consent of First 5. Further, Contractor shall not assign any moneys due or to become due under this Agreement without the prior written consent of First 5.

15. DEFAULT

If Contractor abandons the work, fails to proceed with the work or services requested by First 5 in a timely manner, or fails in any way as required to conduct the work and services as required by First 5, then First 5 may declare Contractor in default and terminate this Agreement upon five (5) days written notice to Contractor. Upon such termination by default, First 5 will pay to Contractor all amounts owing to Contractor for services and work satisfactorily performed to the date of termination.

For contracts that renew annually, termination for failure to provide required insurance certificates and endorsements shall be as set forth in paragraph 8.

16. WAIVER OF DEFAULT

Waiver of any default by either party to this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent default. Waiver or breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach, and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement unless this Agreement is modified as provided in paragraph 22.

17. CONFIDENTIALITY

Contractor agrees to comply with various provisions of the federal, state, and county laws, regulations, and ordinances providing that information and records kept, maintained, or accessible by Contractor in the course of providing services and work under this Agreement, shall be privileged, restricted, or confidential. Contractor agrees to keep confidential, all such privileged, restricted or confidential information and records obtained in the course of providing the work and services under this Agreement. Disclosure of such information or records shall be made by Contractor only with the express written consent of First 5.

18. CONFLICTS

Contractor agrees that he/she has no interest, and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, that would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of the work and services under this Agreement. Contractor agrees to complete and file a conflict-of-interest statement.

19. POST-AGREEMENT COVENANT

Contractor agrees not to use any confidential, protected, or privileged information that is gained from First 5 in the course of providing services and work under this Agreement, for any personal benefit, gain, or enhancement. Further, Contractor agrees for a period of two (2) years after the termination of this Agreement, not to seek or accept any employment with any entity, association, corporation, or person who, during the term of this Agreement, has had an adverse or conflicting interest with First 5, or who has been an adverse party in litigation with First 5, and concerning such, Contractor by virtue of this Agreement has gained access to First 5's confidential, privileged, protected, or proprietary information.

20. SEVERABILITY

If any portion of this Agreement or application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, or if it is found in contravention of any federal, state, or county statute, ordinance, or regulation, then the remaining provisions of this Agreement, or the application thereof, shall not be invalidated thereby, and shall remain in full force and effect to the extent that the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

21. FUNDING LIMITATION

The ability of First 5 to enter into this Agreement is based upon available funding from various sources. In the event that such funding fails, is reduced, or is modified, from one or more sources, First 5 has the option to terminate, reduce, or modify this Agreement, or any of its terms within ten (10) days of notifying Contractor of the termination, reduction, or modification of available funding. Any reduction or modification of this Agreement effective pursuant to this provision must comply with the requirements of paragraph 22.

22. AMENDMENT

This Agreement may be modified, amended, changed, added to, or subtracted from, by the mutual consent of the parties hereto, if such amendment or change order is in written form, and executed with the same formalities as this Agreement or in accordance with delegated authority therefor, and attached to the original Agreement to maintain continuity.

23. NOTICE

Any notice, communication, amendments, additions or deletions to this Agreement, including change of address of any party during the term of this Agreement, which Contractor or First 5 shall be required, or may desire to make, shall be in writing and may be personally served, or sent by prepaid first-class mail or email (if included below) to the respective parties as follows:

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

The Grant Award Notification for the First 5 California Small Population County Funding Augmentation (SPCFA) provides First 5 Inyo County with one year of funding, from July 14, 2025, through June 30, 2026. Ratification of this agreement is required because it was issued on September 9, 2025. The Children and Families Commission held a special meeting on September 24, 2025, to ratify and approve the authorization for the First 5 Director, Katelyne Lent to sign the Grant Award Notification.

The SPCFA aims to strengthen the capacity of small counties to effectively implement Proposition 10 and ensure it remains a truly statewide initiative benefiting young children across California. For counties with low annual birth rates, base Proposition 10 funding alone is insufficient to sustain a fully operational commission or comprehensive First 5 programs. SPCFA funding bridges this gap, allowing small counties like Inyo to continue promoting, supporting, and improving the early development of children ages 0 to 5.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

This contract comes to the Board late due to multiple internal iterations. Dr. James A. Richardson has served his current term as Inyo County Health Officer since December 2016. During this time, he has been responsible for all Health Officer duties mandated by California Health and Safety Codes and other California regulations, including, but not limited to: oversight of communicable disease issues, reporting and prevention; enforcement of local orders and ordinances pertaining to public health; declaration and/or provision of leadership during a local health emergency/disaster preparedness for those situations in which a local public Health Officer may declare a local health emergency; and ensuring that immunizations are available to the public.

Dr. Richardson also serves as the Corrections Medical Director, as required by CA Code of Regulations Title 15, which is separate from, and in addition to, his Health Officer duties. As the Corrections Medical Director, Dr. Richardson provides health services to the Inyo County Jail and Juvenile Center (when in use), including 24/7 medical oversight and availability to correctional and on-call nursing staff.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN COUNTY OF INYO AND JAMES RICHARDSON, MD FOR THE PROVISION OF PERSONAL SERVICES AS INYO COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER/JAIL MEDICAL DIRECTOR

INTRODUCTION

WHEREAS, James Richardson, MD (hereinafter referred to as "Officer") has been or will be duly appointed as Health Officer for Inyo County and to serve as Jail Medical Director for the County's jail and juvenile facility; and

WHEREAS, the County of Inyo (hereinafter referred to as "County") and Officer desire to set forth the manner and means by which Officer will be compensated for performance of duties.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, terms, and conditions hereinafter contained. County and Officer hereby agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

SCOPE OF WORK.

The Officer shall furnish to the County those services and work set forth in Attachment A, attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein.

Services and work provided by the Officer under this Agreement will be performed in a manner consistent with the requirements and standards established by applicable federal, state, and County laws, ordinances, resolutions, and directions.

2. TERM.

The term of this Agreement shall be from July 1, 2025 until June 30, 2026, unless terminated as provided below.

3. CONSIDERATION.

- A. <u>Compensation</u>. County shall pay Officer in accordance with the Schedule of Fees (set forth in Attachment B) for the services and work described in Attachment A which are performed by Officer.
- B. <u>Travel and Per Diem</u>. Officer shall be entitled to Travel and Per Diem as set forth in Attachment B.
- C. <u>No Additional Consideration</u>. Except as expressly provided in this Agreement, Officer shall not be entitled to, nor receive, from County, any additional consideration, compensation, salary, wages, or other type of remuneration for services rendered under this Agreement.
- D. <u>Manner of Payment</u>. Officer will be paid in the same manner and on the same schedule of frequency as other County officers and employees.
- E. <u>Federal and State Taxes</u>. From all payments made to Officer by County under the terms and provisions of this Agreement, County shall withhold all appropriate federal and state income taxes (resident and non-resident).

4. WORK SCHEDULE.

Officer's obligation is to perform the services and work identified in Attachment A which are needed within the County. It is understood by Officer that the performance of these services and work will require a varied schedule. Officer, in arranging her schedule, will coordinate and make arrangements to fulfill the requirements of the services and work which is necessary.

5. REQUIRED LICENSES, CERTIFICATES, AND PERMITS.

Any licenses, certificates, or permits required by the federal, state, county, or municipal governments for Officer to provide the services and work described in Attachment A must be procured by Officer and be valid at the time Officer enters into this Agreement or as otherwise may be required. Further, during the term of this Agreement, Officer must maintain such licenses, certificates, and permits in full force and effect. Licenses, certificates, and permits may include, but are not limited to, driver's licenses, and professional licenses or certificates. Officer will provide County, at County's request, evidence of current and valid licenses, certificates and permits which are required to perform the services identified in Attachment A. Where there is a dispute between Officer and County as to what licenses, certificates, and permits are required to perform the services identified in Attachment A, County reserves the right to make such determinations for purposes of this Agreement.

6. OFFICE SPACE, SUPPLIES, EQUIPMENT, ETC.

County shall provide Officer with such supplies, reference materials, telephone service, and staff as is deemed necessary by the County for Officer to provide the services identified in Attachment A to this Agreement.

7. COUNTY PROPERTY.

- A. <u>Supplies, Equipment, etc.</u> All supplies, equipment, tools, protective or safety devices, badges, identification cards, keys, uniforms, vehicles, reference materials, furniture, appliances, etc. provided to Officer by County pursuant to this Agreement are, and at the termination of this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of County. Officer will use reasonable care to protect, safeguard and maintain such items while they are in Officer's possession.
- B. Products of Officer 's Work and Services. Any and all compositions, publications, plans, designs, specifications, blueprints, maps, formulas, processes, photographs, slides, video tapes, computer programs, computer disks, computer tapes, memory chips, soundtracks, audio recordings, films, audio-visual presentations, exhibits, reports, studies, works of art, inventions, patents, trademarks, copyrights, or intellectual properties of any kind which are created, produced, assembled, compiled by, or are the result or product of, Officer's services or work under this Agreement are, and at the termination of this Agreement remain, the sole and exclusive property of the County. At the termination of the Agreement, Officer will convey possession and title to all such properties to County.

8. WORKERS' COMPENSATION.

County shall provide workers' compensation coverage to Officer for all acts performed in the course and scope of providing the services described in Attachment A to this Agreement. In the event a claim is made by Officer for injuries received in the course and scope of providing such services, County's liability shall be limited to workers' compensation benefits payable under the California Labor Code.

9. STATUS OF OFFICER.

All acts of Officer relating to the performance of this Agreement shall be performed by Officer as the Health Officer/jail medical director of the County. Officer has no authority to bind, incur any obligation on behalf of, or exercise any right of power vested in, the County, except as expressly provided by law or set forth in Attachment A.

10. DEFENSE AND INDEMNIFICATION.

In the event the Officer is sued for acts performed within the course and scope of providing services and work described in Attachment A of this Agreement, County shall defend, indemnify, and hold the Officer harmless from any and all liability arising from such acts as required by law.

11. TERMINATION AND DISCIPLINE.

Officer's services under this Agreement may be terminated by County without cause, and at will, for any reason by giving to Officer one hundred eighty (180) days written notice of such intent to terminate.

Officer may terminate this Agreement without cause, and at will, for any reason whatsoever by giving thirty (30) days written notice of such intent to terminate to County.

12. ASSIGNMENT.

This is an agreement for the personal services of Officer. County has relied upon the skills, knowledge, experience, and training of Officer as an inducement to enter into this Agreement. Officer shall not assign or subcontract this Agreement, or any part of it, without the express written consent of the County.

13. NONDISCRIMINATION.

Officer agrees to comply with various provisions of the federal, state, and county statutes, laws, and ordinances applicable to the County, and providing that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, religion, ancestry, sex, age, physical handicap, or national origin, be subjected to discrimination.

14. CONFIDENTIALITY.

Officer agrees to comply with various provisions of the federal, state, and county laws and ordinances providing that information and records kept, maintained, or accessible by the County, shall be privileged, restricted, or confidential. Disclosure of such confidential, privileged, or protected information shall be made by Officer only as allowed by law.

15. CONFLICTS.

Officer agrees that Officer has no interest, and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of the work and services under this Agreement. Officer agrees to complete and file appropriate conflict of interest statements.

16. POST AGREEMENT COVENANT.

Officer agrees not to use any confidential, protected, or privileged information which is gained from the County in the course of providing services and work under this Agreement, for any personal benefit, gain,

Further, Officer agrees for a period of two years after the termination of this Agreement, not to seek or accept any employment with any entity, association, corporation, or person who, during the term of this Agreement, has had an adverse or conflicting interest with the County, or who has been an adverse party in litigation with the County, and concerning such, Officer by virtue of this Agreement has gained access to the County's confidential, privileged, protected, or proprietary information.

17. AMENDMENT.

This Agreement may be modified, amended, changed, added to, or subtracted from, by the mutual consent of the parties hereto, if such amendment or change is in written form, and executed with the same formalities as this Agreement, and attached to the original Agreement to maintain continuity.

18. NOTICE.

TERM:

FROM: JULY 1, 2025 TO: JUNE 30, 2026

SCOPE OF WORK:

Perform the duties and functions of County Health Officer for Inyo County, as set forth in Division 105, Part 1, Chapter 3 (commencing with section 120175) and Division 101, Part 3, Chapter 2, Article 1 (commencing with section 101025) of the California Health and Safety Code. This includes, but is not limited to:

- a) Providing clinical oversight of licensed public health staff, contractors.
- b) Supporting public health activities to ensure the effectiveness of community health services including, but not limited to: communicable disease control, maternal and child health services. Children's Medical Services, tuberculosis control, HIV case management, emergency services and disaster planning, laboratory services, and environmental health.
- c) Conducting assessments and report on the health status of the community, using multiple epidemiological survey and statistical methods.
- d) Providing consultation to public health staff on public health planning.
- e) Providing consultation and contributing to the development of emergency preparedness plans, exercises and drills, protocols and after-action reports as a member of the public health disaster planning team, as appropriate.
- f) Acting as a liaison between Inyo County HHS Public Health programs and the CA Department of Public Heath, as applicable.
- g) Providing liaison services between the Inyo County HHS Public Health programs and California Conference of Local Health Officers (CCLHO), including, but not limited to, participation in some CCLHO meetings and monitoring and tracking verbal and written communications.
- h) In consultation with Health & Human Services Administration, Officer may additionally provide communication of public health issues by releasing public health bulletins and answering media inquiries.
- i) Participating in Regional Public Health Office meetings as designated by the HHS Deputy Director of Public Health and Prevention.
- j) Providing health and medical-related consultation with authorized County representatives as needed.
- k) Attending periodic appropriate local inter-agency meetings as defined by the HHS Director or Deputy Director, Public Health & Prevention, or their designees.
- I) Providing 24/7 availability for any public health need and coordination with the deputy health officer.

Serve as Jail Medical Director, as set forth in Title 22, section 79775 of the California Code of Regulations, for the Inyo County Jail and Juvenile Facility, including, but not limited to:

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

The Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) issued the California Children's Services (CCS) contract to counties for renewal slightly later than usual. In addition, the County was awaiting confirmation of budget details necessary to complete the contract package prior to submission. As a result, this agreement is being presented to the Board at this time for ratification and approval effective July 1, 2025, to ensure continuity of services and alignment with the fiscal year.

The California Children's Services (CCS) program provides diagnostic and treatment services, medical case management, and physical and occupational therapy services to children under age 21 whose parents are unable to pay for services and who have CCS-eligible medical conditions. Examples of CCS-eligible conditions include, but are not limited to, chronic medical conditions such as cystic fibrosis, hemophilia, cerebral palsy, heart disease, cancer, traumatic injuries, and certain infectious diseases. Mandates require Inyo County to assist in seeking and enrolling eligible children through cooperative efforts with local public and private agencies. The CCS program is funded through the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS).

Non-compliant and aging equipment in the fleet will continue to become more obsolete as the operable hours and mileage become limited by law. The new equipment will meet all CARB requirements. The equipment that is being replaced will be sold at an upcoming surplus sale.

Pursuant to Inyo County Purchasing Manual Section III(B)(5), the Road Department may purchase this equipment via Sourcewell / Coastline Equipment without soliciting bids. Authorize a purchase order in an amount not to exceed \$90,979.09, payable to Volvo Construction Equipment, Government Sales, CA for a Volvo Asphalt Roller.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

The Road Department reached out to a trusted sales representative based in California to inquire about acquiring a used asphalt roller on our behalf. He provided us with information on a machine that met our specifications and was offered at a competitive price.

The Road Department is continuing its effort to bring its fleet into compliance with California Air Resource Board (CARB) laws and requirements. Non-compliant and aging equipment in the fleet will continue to become more obsolete as the operable hours and mileage become limited by law. The new equipment will meet all CARB requirements. The equipment that is being replaced will be sold at an upcoming surplus sale.

The Road Department is utilizing Sourcewell, a cooperative purchasing program that provides nationally leveraged discount pricing through Volvo Construction Equipment & Sales. Pursuant to Inyo County Purchasing Manual Section III(B)(5), the Road Department may purchase this equipment via Sourcewell / Volvo Construction Equipment & Sales without soliciting bids. Each quote includes warranties, delivery, taxes and registration.

The Road Department remains committed to maintaining a modern, efficient, and environmentally compliant fleet. By replacing outdated equipment with CARB-compliant models through the Sourcewell cooperative purchasing program, the department ensures continued operational reliability while adhering to state regulations. This strategic investment not only supports sustainability goals but also maximizes cost-effectiveness by leveraging competitive pricing and streamlined procurement. The sale of surplus equipment will further offset costs and contribute to responsible asset management.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

- A) Change the salary grade for the Senior Transportation Planner from Grade 14 (\$6,790.88 \$8,823.20 / month) to Grade 17 (\$7,861.29 \$10,213.96 / month).
- B) Change the current Senior Transportation Planner from Grade 14, Step G (\$8,823.20 / month) to Grade 17, Step D (\$8,960.74 / month).
- C) Direct staff to update the publicly available pay schedule accordingly.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

Historically, the Senior Transportation Planner and the Senior Planner in the Planning Department have been aligned in terms of scope, responsibility, and compensation. Both positions require similar qualifications and perform comparable levels of professional planning work within their respective departments.

However, the County's recent global adjustment to salaries and grades placed the Transportation Senior Planner at Grade 14, while the Senior Planner in Planning was placed at Grade 17. This misalignment breaks the County's long-standing practice of maintaining parity between these two classifications and creates an internal equity concern.

To correct for this, staff recommends adjusting the Transportation Senior Planner classification to Grade 17. And in order to do no harm to the employee currently in that position, staff further recommends changing the current Senior Transportation Planner from Grade 14, Step G to Grade 17, Step D, effective retroactively to July 31, 2025. This change will restore equity, support employee morale, and help ensure retention of qualified staff across departments.

BACKGROUND / SUMMARY / JUSTIFICATION:

Inyo County, in partnership with the Eastern Sierra Council of Governments (ESCOG), Mono County, the Town of Mammoth Lakes, and the City of Bishop, is conducting a comprehensive regional housing needs study and action plan in partnership with BAE Urban Economics. This initiative aims to address the growing housing challenges in our communities by gathering data, engaging residents and stakeholders, and identifying strategies for implementable workforce housing solutions.

The first step of this process has been one of gathering data through extensive public participation. BAE Urban Economics has hosted two community meetings, conducted one-on-one and group interviews with more than 20 local expert stakeholders, including real estate brokers and property managers, housing advocates, policy makers, and housing program administrators; and has administered a widespread survey for Eastern Sierra residents and workers, and another for employers, to ensure that the needs of business are accounted for in the housing study.

During this presentation, BAE Urban Economics will present the results of their public outreach and will solicit feedback from the Board of Supervisors prior to entering phase II of the Study - preparation of the Eastern Sierra Housing Action Plan.

History:

In 1990, the Inyo County Capital Asset Leasing Corporation (CALC) issued Certificates of Participation (COPs) in the total amount of \$5,000,000.00 for the primary purpose of financing a new County Jail and Juvenile Detention Facility. In 1999, the County paid down the outstanding COP principal by \$900,000.00 and issued refunding COPs in the amount of \$2,940,000.00 in order to take advantage of lower interest rates, and thereby reduce the County's interest costs and annual debt (lease) payments. The County posted Assessor's Parcel Number 002-133-02 (new County Jail land and improvements) as collateral on the 1999 Refunding COPs.

Cash Assets:

On February 1, 2011, the final payment on the financing for the County Jail and Juvenile Facility was made, effectively bringing the Reserve fund to a zero balance, and closing the account. There are currently no cash assets.

Current Standing:

The Capital Asset Leasing Corporation currently has no issuances. The Corporation remains in effect and positioned to provide services for any future debt service financing the County may enter into.

Please note that the Consolidated Office Building was not financed through the CALC. This Corporation is for issuing debt and the County of Inyo did not issue debt to finance the building.
